

6 deaths of infants under 1 year occurred, (3 males and 3 females all legitimate). 2 deaths from maternal causes (Heading 30), 22 deaths from Cancer and no deaths from Measles, Whooping Cough or Diarrhoea (under 2 years) were recorded.

On the following page is a Table giving the causes and the number of deaths occurring at the various age groups. The totals correspond with the Registrar General's figures. The deaths are classified under the Headings given in the Manual of the International List of Causes of Deaths - 1938.

Both the Birth Rate and the Death Rate of 1942 are higher than those for the previous six years. It may be noted that of the 132 Deaths 80 = 61% occurred at age 65 years or over and of these, 33 = 25% of the total occurred at age 80 years or over.

## (ii) (a) LABORATORY FACILITIES.

The Emergency Public Health Laboratory Service at Cambridge, under the Directorship of Dr. A.W. Downie, carried out, in addition to the usual public health bacteriological examinations, the examination of 279 water samples, 74 milk samples and provided diphtheria immunization materials and measles serum.

### SECTION C.

## SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

### 1. (1) WATER.

181 samples of water were analysed to supervise the public supply. The high standard of bacteriological purity maintained by the Newmarket Water Company is indicated by the fact that not one of these 90 samples from the well proper at Southfields Pumping Station and 91 samples from various points on the public mains was found unsatisfactory.

4 samples analysed from the White Lodge Hospital well were all satisfactory but other sources which may have to be used as emergency water supplies did not give like results - of 56 samples analysed 9 only were satisfactory, 6 were suspicious and 41 unsatisfactory. The policy of relying on boiling of water from emergency sources under blitz conditions has therefore been decided and the public informed of this through the Fress and by notice on the back of the Rate Demand Note. Cards and posters stressing this policy are ready for issue should the need arise.

## (11) DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

224,000 gallons of crude gas liquor were carted by the Newmarket Gas Company to the Sewage Disposal Works thereby assisting in the prevention of pollution of rivers and streams.

# 3. (1) CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

128 inspections in connection with water closets were made during the year.

# (ii) PUBLIC CLEANSING.

The cleansing of streets and road gulleys and the collection of house refuse and salvage is carried out by direct labour under the supervision of the Surveyor and Sanitary Inspector.

The collection of house refuse, shop refuse and salvage, including removal of refuse from premises occupied by military authorities, is carried out weekly with the Council's 12 cubic yard Scammell Moving Floor Refuse Collection vehicle.

Salvage materials are sorted (and where applicable are baled) at the Refuse Dostructor Works and sold. During the year the undermentioned materials were sold, the receipts amounting to £1,781,15

Paper 140 tons; Rags 10 tons; Tins 245 tons; Bones 4 tons; Ferrous metals 39 tons; non-ferrous metals 2 tons; Rubber 22 tons.

703 lorry loads of house refuse and 114 lorry loads of shop refuse were collected and disposed of in the Council's 3 cell Manlove Alliott Refuse Destructor which is worked in conjunction with the Babcock and Willcox Water Tube Boiler for raising steam to operate the Sewage Pumping Plant. - 4 -

### (vii) SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS.

The Council have taken on lease a privately owned swimming bath of modern design and recent construction in the Town. The water, obtained from the Newmarket Water Company's mains, is during the open season continuously circulated through a Bell horizontal sand filter and is heated and chlorinated by suitable plant. Facilities for sun-bathing are provided. The bath is well patronised by the public and used regularly by the several schools.

The Bath is under the supervision of the Surveyor and Sanitary Inspector and frequent visits are made to ascertain that the water, towels, cubicles and sanitary conveniences are being kept in a satisfactory condition. 38 samples of water taken from the Bath were all satisfactory except 7 taken at one period when the cholrination plant was temporarily out of order.

# (viii) ERADICATION OF BED BUGS.

Disinfestation of 4 Council houses was carried out by the Council's workmen using using Fuminol. A block of 5 Council houses was disinfested with Hydrogen Cyanide by Associated Fumigators Ltd. 15 private houses have been disinfested by the Council's workmen using Fuminol. Disinfestation from FLEAS was carried out at one private house by the Council's workmen using Fuminol and Thermatex.

### 4. SCHOOLS.

The washing and sanitary accommodation was examined during 12 inspections.

40 cases remained on the Tuberculosis Register at the end of the year, Respiratory Male 16, Female 12, and Non-respiratory Male 5, Female 7.

The number of notifiable diseases (other than Tuberculosis) in 1942 was 45. This was a considerable improvement on the 410 notified in 1941.

Parents continued to respond very well to the advice to have their children immunized to protect them from Diphtheria. By the end of 1942 80% of children under 5 years of age and 92% of children between 5 and 15 years of age had completed the immunization course.

During 1942 87 cases of Scabies were treated - 46 under the old arrangements at Bury St Edmunds and 41 at the Centre equipped and staffed by this Authority and opened in Newmarket during September.
