To the Chairman and Members of the
Newmarket Urban District Council

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for your district for the year ended 31st December, 1969. Dr. J.R.M. Murdoch, your Medical Officer of Health, resigned in September having only served the authority and the adjoining districts for one year. Accordingly, the work of the Medical Officer of Health has been carried out by myself and associates in the public health medical service. Repeated attempts have been unsuccessful in obtaining a qualified Medical Officer of Health to succeed Dr. Murdoch and it may quite well be that the probable delay over local government and health service re-organisation, coupled with the current difficulties over conditions of service, have created an air of uncertainty amongst qualified public health doctors which is affecting morale in the service. Until the position of local government is clarified it would appear that there is little prospect of recruiting a qualified public health doctor to the service.

The estimated population of 12,190 shows little significant increase on the previous estimate in 1968 of 12,090. The birth rate of 16.0 compares with that of 16.3 for England and Wales. This rate when corrected for age and sex distribution is in excess of England and Wales (11.9). Whilst the infant mortality rate of 24.6 is significantly in excess of 18 for England and Wales many firm deductions cannot be drawn from relatively small figures. A very significant number of deaths are due to diseases of the heart and other circulatory disorders. The number of notifiable diseases coming to the attention of the department was low. One matter which did attract attention during the year was the occurrence of a case of rabies in a dog which had been imported from Pakistan. Whilst the main action was taken by veterinarians the department was involved in seeing that the contacts were given prophylactic treatment for the condition.

Your Chief Public Health Inspector and Mrs. Blyth have done much towards the recording of the information which is given in the main body of the report and as usual it deals with matters which are covered by official instructions from the Department of Health regarding annual reports.

My personal thanks are due to the Urban District Council staff for the sustained help they give in the district and for the happy co-operation which exists with adjoining local authorities in dealing with problems of mutual interest.

SECTION B

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

- (a) LABORATORY SERVICES. The Public Health Laboratory, Tennis Court Road, Cambridge, provides an excellent bacteriological service and most readily discusses and advises on any epidemiological or similar problem.
- (b) AMBULANCE FACILITIES. These services are provided by the County Council under the direction of Dr. D.A. McCracken, the County Medical Officer of Health.
- (c) NURSING IN THE HOME. The West Suffolk County Council District Nurse-Midwives carry out these duties.
- (d) CLINICS AND TREATMENT CENTRES. County Council Infant Welfare Clinics were held at the Health Clinic, Newmarket, each Tuesday, and at the Scout Hall, Exning, on one Thursday each month. Outpatient Clinics are held at the Newmarket General Hospital as follows :-

SECTION D

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

WATER

The Urban District is supplied with water by the Ely, Mildenhall & Newmarket Water Board. Only five houses, all in remote parts of the district, are without a main water supply. The Board has three reservoirs at Warren Hill having a total capacity of about 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ million gallons. These are linked together and under normal conditions receive water from pumping stations at Chippenham and Southfields and supply a large part of the Newmarket Rural District as well as the Urban District. In emergencies water can also be brought into this system from the pumping stations at Lower Links and Moulton.

The waters from all these stations are derived from the chalk and are very similar in character.

Eight samples of water were taken from the well at Southfields Pumping Station and nine samples were taken from the mains for bacteriological examination. The results of these samples showed the quality of the water to be satisfactory.

A sample of water was taken by the Water Board from the well at Southfields Pumping Station for chemical analysis. The Analyst's report indicated that the water conformed to the highest standard of organic quality, that it was pure and wholesome and suitable for public supply purposes.

The information given below relating to Drainage, Sewerage, Public Conveniences and Public Cleansing has been supplied by the Engineer and Surveyor, Mr. Ivan Stimson.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The contract for the construction of a new sewage disposal works is scheduled to start in September this year incorporating the joint sludge de-watering arrangements with Cambridge City. The site investigation contract has been completed and the contract, in advance of the main contract, for the laying of a new sewer across Studlands Park is proceeding.

The maintenance of the two existing sewage works, four pumping stations and one temporary sewage treatment plant has, as previously, been carried out by direct labour under the direction and supervision of the Engineer and Surveyor.

During the year the Council has operated a cesspool emptying service to those properties within the Urban District not yet connected to a public sewer using the 1,000 gallon capacity gully emptier. The two free emptyings given by the Council to each of these properties cost approximately £450 last year.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

The Council maintain two public conveniences in the town centre with plans for a new public convenience in Exning Road to be present shortly to the Public Health Committee.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

A joint scheme for pulverising refuse from Newmarket R.D.C. and the Urban District has again been fully investigated and agreed to by both Councils. The Engineer and Surveyor is at present preparing a scheme for presentation to the joint committee and then to both Councils using an existing building at the U.D.C. depot to house a new plant. At the moment controlled tipping of crude refuse is carried out at Kennett under the direction and supervision of the Engineer and Surveyor, with the tip being treated regularly by the Public Health Department for the control of rats, flies and other insect pests. When pulverised refuse is tipped at Kennett less frequent visits by the Public Health Department will be necessary as the rat, fly and insect nuisance will be considerably reduced.

The cleaning of some 35 miles of highways, road gullies and the collection of domestic and trade refuse has, as previously, been carried out by direct labour under the direction and supervision of the Engineer and Surveyor.

The information given below relating to drainage, sewerage, Public Conveniences and Public Cleansing has been supplied by the Engineer and Surveyor, Mr. Ivan Stewart.

SEWERAGE AND DRAINAGE SYSTEMS

The contract for the construction of a new sewerage system in the Urban District has been fully investigated and approved by both Councils. The Engineer and Surveyor is at present preparing a scheme for presentation to the joint committee of both Councils with an existing holding of the U.D.C. at the present time. It is proposed to construct a new plant at the present time under the direction and supervision of the Engineer and Surveyor, with the slip being

A joint scheme for universal refuse collection from houses has been fully investigated and approved by both Councils. The Engineer and Surveyor is at present preparing a scheme for presentation to the joint committee of both Councils with an existing holding of the U.D.C. at the present time. It is proposed to construct a new plant at the present time under the direction and supervision of the Engineer and Surveyor, with the slip being

CARAVANS

There are no licensed camping sites in the district.

At the beginning of the year the problem caused by the unauthorised use of a car park by gypsies, referred to in the Annual Report for 1968, continued. All the gypsies left the site at the end of January and there was no further occupation of the site except for a few days at Christmas.

CLEAN AIR ACTS

One complaint of nuisance caused by the emission of smoke from a chimney serving an oil-fired boiler was dealt with by informal action.

NOISE ABATEMENT

An ice cream vendor was warned for operating a loudspeaker in his vehicle contrary to Section 2 of the Noise Abatement Act 1960.

Two complaints of nuisance from noise were investigated and the noise was reduced following informal action.

SWIMMING POOL

The Council own a modern open-air swimming pool, water for which is obtained from the mains. Circulation of the water is continuous, the water being passed through a Bell horizontal sand filter and chlorinated.

The Pool was open from the 10th May to the 13th September 1969. The number of tickets sold was 34,298 of which 10,862 were issued to adults and 23,436 to children. In addition there were 8 adult and 42 children season ticket holders.

Arrangements were made with the West Suffolk Education Committee and the Cambridgeshire Education Committee for use of the swimming pool by school children on each morning, Monday to Friday, during the school summer term.

Five samples of water were taken from the pool for bacteriological examination. The results showed that a satisfactory standard was maintained.

Six inspections were made regarding cleanliness of dressing cubicles, sanitary accommodation and pool surrounds.

RODENT CONTROL

The Council employ one rodent operator.

Inspections and treatments of premises were carried out where infestations were notified by occupiers as well as general inspections of the district and treatment of premises where necessary.

Free treatments were given at dwelling houses. Treatments at business premises were charged for at the rate of 15/6d. per hour, inclusive of baits and poisons.
