ANNUAL REPORT of the Medical Officer of Health. for the Year 1925.

To the Chairman and Members of the Newport Pagnell Urban District Council.

I beg to place before you my Annual Report on the Public Health and Sanitary Conditions prevailing in your District for the Year 1925.

The Report is a Survey Report and has been compiled in accordance with the instructions indicated in a Memorandum issued by the Ministry of Health. It is divided into the following sections:

- 1. Natural and Social Conditions.
- 2. General Provision of Health Services.

NATURAL and SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

Area 3,432 acres. Population. 1921 Census 4,142 1925 estimated 4,104

The town is situated upon the banks of the Great Ouse and its tributary the Lovat and that part of the twon near the rivers is liable to flood. Number of Inhabited Houses 1921 1,073. Number of Families in separate occupiers 1,077.

The town is the market town for the surrounding agricultural district. A cattle market is held every Wednesday. A few agricultural labourers reside in the town, but this only accounts for a small proportion of the population. A large number of the inhabitants are employed at the L.M.S. Railway carriage works at Wolverton. Others are employed at Messrs Salmons & Sons Motor Carriage Works, at Mineral Water Factory and at the Flour Mills.

Hospital and other Gratuitous Medical Relief.

Inhabitants requiring Hospital Treatment are sent to the Northampton General Hospital and large subscriptions are sent to this Institution. Applicants are only admitted on producing a Subscribers Letter, but one of the townsmen has very generously endowed a bed to which admission can be obtained without.

All the Pulmonary Deaths had been notified. That from other forms had not.


GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES.

Hospitals.

Fever. There is no Isolation Hospital for the District. Cases of infectious disease are treated in their own homes. The cases are isolated as far as possible but this is often very inefficient owing to the lack of sufficient accommodation and also to want of care on the part of the parents. An Isolation Hospital would be of great value especially in times of epidemic.

<u>Small Pox</u>. This is administered by a Joint Committee the members of which are elected by the various Councils concerned. No use has been made of this Hospital.

No Institutional Provision is made for unmarried mothers, illegitimate infants and homeless children. Any such cases are sent to the Union Infirmary if necessary.



Ambulance Facilities. There is a motor ambulance kept at Messrs Salmons & Sons Motor Works which serves for several districts of North Bucks. It is under the supervision of the County Director of V. A. Ds. It is used for infectious, non-infectious and accident cases.

The fees for its use are paid by those employing the Ambulance.

There is an Orthopaedic Clinic where deformities of all kinds are seen and treated. It is supported by voluntary contributions and does most valuable work.

CLINICS and TREATMENT CENTRES.

Maternity and Child Welfare Centre. This Centre continues to do good work. A session is held every Wednesday afternoon. The attendance varies, but on an average about 20 infants are brought by their mothers. A record card is kept of every child attending. The weight, mode of feeding and condition of clothing are recorded as well as any illness the child may have had. Each child is seen and examined by the Medical Officer in attendance and appropriate advice given. On alternate Wednesdays a "Talk" is given to the mothers on some health subject. Nurse Dixon is in charge of the Centre and is assisted by a body of voluntary workers. Marse Dixon is also Health Visitor and Midwife. On being engaged for a case she visits the expectant mother from time to time and gives advice. If she considers it necessary she advises the mother to consult her own doctor or to attend at the centre for advice. Thus the expectant mothers are under skilled supervision throughout their pregnancy. As Health Visitor Nurse Dixon visits all, infants whether attended by her or not and encourages the mothor to bring her infant to the Centre. As Midwife she attends about 50 cases a year. I think the town is very fortunate in having such a capable midwife. The standard of her n work is very high, and in dificult cases she is invaluable to the Medical man in attendance.

School Clinics. Dental Clinic.

Clinic for operations on Throat.

These are administered by the Education Committee.

<u>Tuberculosis</u>. There is a Tuberculosis Dispensary in Union Street where the Tuberculosis Officer attends on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays in the month. This is under the administration of the County Council.

Public Health Officers.

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
One Medical Officer of Health part time. One Sanitary Inspector who also holds the office of Surveyor.

<u>Professional Nurses in the Home</u>. This is carried out by the Good Samaritan Society. This is a voluntary association and employs two nurses who visit the patients in their own homes, and work under the local practitioners. The work of these nurses is most valuable and contributes largely in promoting the health of the inhabitants. These nurses are prohibited from attending infectious cases, the relatives of such cases having to make their own arrangements.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES.

Water.

The water is derived from 2 wells situated on high ground on the outskirts of the District. From these wells the water is pumped by means of Gas Engines and wing motor power with a tank at the top of the water tower. The capacity of this tank is 38,000 gallons. The quantity of water pumped during the year has been 29,837,550 gallons. Of this 24,219,285 gallons were pumped by the Engines and 5,618,265 gallons by the wind motor.

The supply is constant and all houses in the town are supplied. The quantity has been sufficient during the year. The quality of the water is excellent but MEME.it is hard.

DRAINAGE & SEWERAGE.

The sewers are constructed of socketed pipes jointed in cement. There is a complete sewerage and drainage system. The sewage gravitates into an underground tank situated in the Council's Yard. From this it is pumped to the sewage farm which is situated about f mile outside the town. The system has worked well and no trouble has been experienced during the year. Nine new drains have been laid during the year.

RIVERS & STREAMS.

There is no pollution of the rivers in the district except from the unavoidable overflow from the sewage farm during heavy rainfall.

CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.


All the closets in the town are W.C.s and are cistern flushed.

SCAVENGING.

This is carried out by the Council's servants and carts. The weekly removal of house refuse has been maintained during the year.

SCHOOLS.

There is one Elementary School with departments for Boys, Girls, and Infants. Each department is under its own Head Teachers. The School Buildings are modern, well drained, well ventilated and well lighted. Radiators have recently been installed for heating the premises in place of open fireplaces.



HOUSING.

General Housing Conditions. These are on the whole, good.

Most of the houses are modern, properly constructed, well drained lighted and ventilated. However there are some houses which are old and do not conform to modern requirements.

The shortage of houses is not acute, but more houses are required as in some cases young married couples are living with their parents, or living in rooms.

During the last five years a considerable number of new houses have been built. The Councils Housing Scheme for the erection of 16 houses in Linford Lane has been completed. The scheme for the erection of houses on the London Road Site has been abandoned.

The following houses have been built by private enterprise:-

5 in Wolverton Road. 1 in Tickford Street. 1 Bungalow plong the Crawley Road.

Eight houses have been demolished as they were unfit and unsafe for habitation.

Fitness of Houses. As I have already stated the general standard is good. The chief defects found in the old houses are due to the general construction as low ceilings, deficent light and ventilation dampness owing to absence of damp course.

It will be seen from the Inspectors Report that 61 houses were rendered fit by informal ection by the Council or their Officers. On the whole no difficulty had been experienced in getting defects remedied by Owners without resort to Statutory Powers.

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INSPECTION & SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

MILK.

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The Milk produced and brought into the District is wholesome and of good quality. There are 13 Dairymen or Purveyors of Milk on the Register. Some of these procure their milk from farms outside the District. There are 6 Cowkeepers on the Register. In August 1925 your Council took proceedings against a cowkeeper and dairyman for contravention of Articles 7, 8 & 12 of the Dairies, Cowsheds Milkshop Order. Convictions were obtained in all cases and fines amounting to 19 guineas were imposed. 49 inspections of Dairies & Cowsheds were made during the year, 24 defects were found and remedied.

MEAT.

There are 4 Saughter Houses on the Register. 251 inspections were made. 12 defects were found and remedied. 195 lbs of unsound meat were surrendered and destroyed during the year. The coming into force of the Public Health (Meat) Regulations in April has been the means of further improvement in the conduct of the Slaughter houses.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.


The following is a table of the notifications of infectious diseases during the years 1921 to 1924 inclusive. These for 1925 are given below.

The District has been comparatively free from infectious diseases during the last 5 years as will be seen from the above Table, and there is nothing calling specially for comment.

Diphtheria Antitoxin. This is supplied by your Council free of charge to all practitioners requiring it. One of the Chemists in the town keeps a stock of it and it is available at all times. Very little has been required during the above period.

Encephalitis Lethargica. One case has occurred in the district. It was removed to the Isolation Hospital at Oakley Bedford where it was under treatment for some weeks.



<u>Pathological and Bacteriological Examinations</u>. This consists almost entirely of examination of swabs from the throat in suspected cases of Diphtheria. The examination is carried out by the Pathological Department of the Northampton Hospital and the result reported by phone or telegram in the first place followed later by a detailed written report. Very few specimens have been examined during the last 5 years.

No use has been made of the Schick and Dick tests for Diphtheria and Scarlet Fever respectively.

Notifiable Diseases (other than Tuberculosis) during 1925.

Scarlet Fever 8 Pneumonia 1 No cases have been admitted to Hospital. No deaths occurred.

A considerable number of cases of Measles occurred during the year. They were mostly confined to children attending the Infant School. For the most part they were mild and no serious complications occurred.

Chicken, Pox has been prevalent during the year. It occurred among scholar attending the Elementary School.



This concludes the Report. It will be seen that the Birth Rate 14.6 per 1,000 is considerably below that for the whole of England and Wales which is 18.3. On the other hand, the Death Rate 10.39 is below that for England and Wales which is 12.2. There has been very little Infectious Disease during the year and nothing of the nature of an epidemic. The standard of Housing is good, but there are still some houses of a low standard which I hope will be improved before long.

In conclusion I wish to place on record the excellent relations that exist between your officials and the harmony with which they work, and to show my appreciation of the assistance that has been given me by your Clerk, Mr Roberts, and Sanitary Inspector, Mr Budds by taking this opportunity of thanking them.


