I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year 1967.

#### Vital Statistics

The figures call for no comment as there is little change from previous years.

#### Infectious Diseases

Apart from the expected measles epidemic, the year was singularly quiet. With an adequate measles vaccine now available and official approval for its widespread use, one hopes to see the regular epidemic becoming less severe and eventually a thing of the past.

#### Health Education

While a wide variety of health topics are publicized and discussed, each year a particular theme is emphasized. The theme for 1967 was 'Prevention of Cancer'. Special use was made of Mothers Clubs to link this with the opening of L.H.A. cervical cytology clinics in North Bucks. These clinics, together with the service provided by General Practitioners should enable all women in the 'high risk' groups to undergo testing.

#### Staffing

The Public Health Department, for the first time a separate department had a most difficult year. From the beginning it had no Inspector, then in May, Mr. J.Y. Anderson occupied the post for two months, leaving a vacancy unfilled until November when Mr. R. Pickford took office. During the intervals we were helped by the Inspectors from Newport Pagnell Rural District Council and Wolverton Urban District Council whom I would like to thank. Fortunately Mr. Pickford is an experienced Inspector who will have a great deal of backlog to pick up, especially in matters relating to property fitness, food hygiene and the Offices, Shops & Railway Premises Act.

2. SEWERAGE AND SEWERAGE TREATMENT

A. SEWERAGE

The length of sewer in the Wolverton Road and Colchester Street area has proved to be inadequate and surplusage of sludge. Sewer has been provided in the extension for the purpose of providing a larger sewer to this area. The length of sewer in the Priory Street / Clifford Street area also displayed a lack of capacity at times of excess flow.

The sewerage works improvements and water supply works were completed during the year. Phases 2, 3 & 4 which include the provision of a new pumping station and sewerage scheme in Wolverton Road and Colchester Street and a final decision as to the siting of the pumping station.

During 1967 a new river crossing was constructed to serve the new estate development and work to relieve the Priory Street / Clifford Street area was also carried out.

B. SEWERAGE TREATMENT

In December 1967 some of the work was incomplete but work was in progress as mentioned above, and completion was expected by April, 1968. The extension scheme for the sewerage works was limited to a 5 year period from 1966, in order to allow for additional factors due to the development of the new city of Milton Keynes to be taken into account.

It is estimated that 2,033 houses with a population of 5,460 are supplied with water from the public mains direct to the houses. 3 houses with a population of 10 people are not supplied with mains water.

The length of sewer in the Wolverton Road and Caldecote Street area has proved to be inadequate and surcharges at times. Money has been provided in the estimates for the purpose of providing a larger sewer to this area. The length of sewer in the Priory Street / Tickford Street area also displayed a lack of capacity at times of excess flow.

The sewage works improvements and extensions under phase one were completed during the year. Phase 2,3 & 4 which include the provision of a new pumping station and sewerage scheme in Wolverton Road and Lakes Lane await a final decision as to the siting of the pumping station.

During 1967 a new river crossing was constructed to serve the new estate development and work to relieve the Priory Street / Tickford Street area was also carried out.

##### B. SEWAGE DISPOSAL

In December 1967 means of disposal were inadequate but work was in progress as mentioned above, and completion was expected by April, 1968. The extension scheme for the disposal works was limited to a 5 year period from 1966, in order to allow for additional factors such as the development of the new city of Milton Keynes to be taken into account.

The length of sewer in the Wolverton Road and Colchester Street area has proved to be inadequate and surcharges at times. Money has been provided in the estimates for the purpose of providing a larger sewer to this area. The length of sewer in the Priory Street / Tickford Street area also displayed a lack of capacity at times of excess flow.

The sewerage works improvements and extensions under phase one were completed during the year. Phase 2, 3 & 4 which include the provision of a new pumping station and sewerage scheme in Wolverton Road and Colchester Street await a final decision as to the siting of the pumping station.

Transport continues to be provided by one Shelvoke and Drewery fore and aft tipper with back loading attachments for business premises. In addition the Karrier side loader refuse collection vehicle provides extra transport when required.

The life of the existing tip at Willen Road is limited to a 2 to 2½ year period, new proposals are to be considered during the coming year.

It has been the practice of the Council to deal with empty properties by the acceptance of informal undertakings. The effect of this has been for an increasing number of properties to stand vacant and become derelict, consideration should be given to following formal procedure as laid down in the Housing Act.

The large number of empty and derelict properties in the town gives cause for concern. They provide a harbourside for vermin, a site for rubbish, and create an atmosphere of neglect and depression. The problem is aggravated by prospective and development schemes envisaged by the Bucks. County Council but which appear to have no firm date of commencement. The situation could continue for some considerable time and become increasingly ugly unless some vigorous action is taken by both local and County Authorities. A greater stride in the appearance of our surroundings seems to be called for.

4. IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

7 Standard Improvement Grants and 12 Supplementary Improvement grants were approved during 1967. Improvement grants are administered by the Surveyor's Department.

WASTE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

During the year two new housing estates and a block of Council flats have been provided with paper sacks but the intended extension of the scheme has been delayed.

Transport continues to be provided by one Shelvick and Bryony fore and aft tipper with back loading attachments for business premises. In addition the Kaituma also loader refuse collection vehicle provides extra transport when required.

The life of the existing tip at Wiffen Road is limited to 2 to 2½ years. Period, new proposals are to be considered during the coming year.

## SECTION E

### HOUSING ACT

#### 1. NEW DWELLINGS

During the year 42 new Council dwellings were completed comprising 11 dwellings on the Whitethorns Estate and 31 units of accommodation for old people at Tickford Street. This accommodation is provided with a communal hall and warden service. The complete unit consists of 28 one bed. flats and 11 bed-sitters. It has been found that elderly people do not readily accept bed-sitter accommodation and the inclusion of such accommodation in any future scheme should be questioned. The provision of further 3 storey flats should also be queried, applications for transfer have been received from tenants with children who occupy 1st and 2nd floor flats.

#### 2. UNFIT PROPERTIES

It has been the practice of the Council to deal with unfit properties by the acceptance of informal undertakings. The effect of this has been for an increasing number of properties to stand vacant and become derelict, consideration should be given to following formal procedure as laid down in the Housing Act.

The large number of empty and derelict properties in the town gives cause for concern, they provide a harbourage for vermin, a site for rubbish, and create an atmosphere of neglect and depression. The problem is aggravated by prospective road development schemes envisaged by the Bucks. County Council but which appear to have no firm date of commencement. The situation could continue for some considerable time and become increasingly worse unless some vigorous action is taken by both Local and County Authorities. A greater pride in the appearance of our surroundings seems to be called for.

It has been the practice of the Council to deal with unit properties by the acceptance of informal undertakings. The effect of this has been for an increasing number of properties to stand vacant and become derelict. Consideration should be given to following formal procedures as laid down in the Housing Act.

The large number of empty and derelict properties in the town gives cause for concern, they provide a harborage for vermin, a site for rubbish, and create an atmosphere of neglect and deterioration. The problem is aggravated by prospective road development schemes envisaged by the Bucks. County Council but which appear to have no firm date of commencement. The situation could continue for some considerable time and become increasingly worse unless some vigorous action is taken by both local and County Authorities. A Greater pride in the appearance of our surroundings seems to be called for.

Fleet, 61 High Street, Newport Pagnell. This has necessitated the checking of the carcasses into and out of the cold store and the stamping of the meat in accordance with the Regulations.

6. CARAVAN SITE

In June, 1967 a 2½ acre plot of land adjoining the River Ouse was let by the Council to the Caravan Club Limited, as a site for 35 touring caravans. The site is exempt from the provisions of the Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act and is provided with a water supply, disposal points for chemical closets, firepoints and means for disposing of waste water. A 9 ft. wide road circles the site. Although the site is intended primarily for club members a condition has been included in the tenancy agreement that non-members shall be accommodated when necessary.

MEAT INSPECTION

There are no abattoirs within the Urban District but towards the end of the year arrangements were made to convey carcasses allotted with Cysticercus bovis, slaughtered at the Bedford Meat Company's abattoir in the Keston Urban District, to the cold store of Messrs. T. & H. Street, Newport Spire. This has necessitated the checking of the carcasses into and out of the cold store and the stamping of the meat in accordance with the Regulations.

CARAVAN SITE

In June, 1957 a 2 1/2 acre plot of land adjoining the River Ouse was let by the Council to the Caravan Club Limited, as a site for 25 touring caravans. The site is exempt from the provisions of the Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act and is provided with a water supply, disposal points for chemical wastes, firepoints and means for disposing of waste water. A 9 ft. wide road circles the site. Although the site is intended primarily for club members a condition has been included in the tenancy agreement that non-members shall be accommodated when necessary.



7. PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS

Rodent control was undertaken by the North Bucks. Area Rodent Committee until March of this year when the Committee was discontinued and the work was transferred to the Council. A member of the Surveyor's outside staff was appointed to carry out this work, half his time being devoted to rodent work and half to other duties. Difficulty has been experienced in carrying out effective treatment due to the fact that the present operative has received no special training and is not a suitable person to receive training. It is hoped that in 1968 it may be possible to appoint a person better able to carry out these duties.

Towards the end of the year it became apparent that the rodent problem required greater attention and an endeavour is being made to carry out more block treatments. No sewer treatments were carried out during the year due to the fact that 'no takes' had been recorded.

An attendance of 23,399 swimmers and 4,430 spectators were recorded making a total of 27,829 persons who used this facility. The heating of the water was approved in principle but awaits more favourable economic circumstances.

Robert control was undertaken by the North Bucks. Area Robert Committee until March of this year when the Committee was discontinued and the work was transferred to the Council. A member of the Surveyor's outside staff was appointed to carry out this work, half his time being devoted to Robert work and half to other duties. Difficulties have been experienced in carrying out effective treatment due to the fact that the present operative has received no special training and is not a suitable person to receive training. It is hoped that in 1963 it may be possible to appoint a person better able to carry out these duties.

Towards the end of the year it became apparent that the Robert problem required greater attention and an endeavour is being made to carry out more block treatments. No sewer treatments were carried out during the year due to the fact that no records had been recorded.
