To the Chairman and Councillors of the Urban District of Newquay.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Circumstances of the District for the year 1948.

This is the first Annual Report to be presented since the coming into force on 5th July 1948 of the National Health Service (1946) Act, and has been compiled with some difficulty owing to the change of Medical Officers.

From 5th July, 1948, Newguay has been included with St. Austell Urban, St. Austell Rural, Fowey and Lostwithiel Districts in No. 1V Health Area of the County of Cornwall with a Health Area Office established at 34a Fore Street, St. Austell, for the purpose of carrying out the duties for which the County Health Authority has assumed the responsibility which include Care of Mothers and Young Children, Midwifery Service, Health Visiting Service, Home Nursing Service, Vaccination and Immunisation, County Ambulance Service, Prevention of Illness, Care and After Care, Domestic Help Service, Mental Health Service.

The review of the Health and Vital Statistics for 1948 is very satisfactory. The Birth Rate is 14.38 per thousand compared with 17.9 per thousand for England and Wales. The total number of Deaths assigned to this District was 112 corresponding to a Death Rate of 11.00 compared with 10.8 per thousand for England and Wales. Both the above Rates for Births and Deaths work unfavourably for Newquay because the Town by reason of its equable climate is chosen by invalids and old people as their home.

Applications for Council Houses still come in to swell the formidable list of those families requiring better accommodation, but the general standard of housing in the Town is high, there being no areas which could by any means be termed "slums" although there are several individual houses which seem to have almost reached the end of their useful existence. Progress in the erection of Council Houses is still very slow, but it is hoped that the end of 1949 will see a large increase in the number of occupied houses owned by the Council.

The new Sewer at Crantock is still in course of being laid and the work when completed will be a great asset to that part of the District. Many properties in the District were connected with both Main Water Supply and proper Drainage System and this work is still being carried on with much success.

The large increase in population in Summer presents many difficulties to your Health Department, the members of which look back on 1948 with a certain amount of satisfaction because of the amount of work done and the low preventable illness incidence.

Thanks are due to Mr. Pickering, the Chief Sanitary Inspector of the Council, and his Staff for their work during the year and for their assistance in the preparation of this Report. It is also a pleasure to record our gratitude to the Members of the Public Health Committee and other Committees for their interest in and sympathetic support of the various Schemes submitted to them. I would also like to thank Heads of Departments, Hospitals and Institutions and all their Staffs for their loyal co-operation throughout the year.

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SECTION A.

NATURAL AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

AREA - (In acres) 5,290. The District consists of the Town of Newquay with a surrounding District entirely Rural in character with Agriculture and Dairy Farming as the main Industries. The Town itself is a very popular summer resort with fine amenities and caters for many thousands of visitors during the holiday season.

POPULATION - The Registrar General has estimated the population for the mid year 1948 to be 10,150, an increase of 150 over the population for the previous year.

NUMBER OF INHABITED HOUSES - According to the Rate Book, the number of Inhabited Houses in the District is 2,955, the Rateable Value being £118,766 which represents £482 for a Penny Rate.

From information gleaned from other sources, it appears to me that Newquay adequately maintained its reputation as a Holiday Resort during 1948, and from personal observation the Town is wonderfully endowed with great natural beauty which it is our duty and pleasure to preserve to the best of our ability.

The Meteorological Officer's Report for 1948 makes very interesting reading and I quote the following particulars:-

"The prevailing wind was south westerly.

The year was distinguished by unusual warmth, the mean temperature being 52.2 degrees Fahrenheit, ranging from 86 degrees on July 28th to 21.2 degrees on February 22nd.

Rainfall was 32 inches for the year, the wettest month being January with 5.53 inches and the driest month being February with 0.87 inches.

Out of a possible 4,418 hours sunshine, there was actually 1,699 hours when the sun did shine".

Taking the whole of this Report into consideration, it appears to me that natural conditions in Newquay were well above those in the Country as a whole, and I have no reason to think that 1948 was in any way exceptional.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES.

PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICERS OF THE LOCAL AUTHORITY.

LABORATORY FACILITIES. - Facilities for Laboratory investigation are to be had at the Royal Cornwall Infirmary where all material for investigation is sent.

DIPHTHERIA ANTITOXIN. - The supply of Antitoxin is maintained at the Health Area Office, St. Austell, and can be obtained by Medical Practitioners for use within the district.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES. - Under the provisions of the National Health Service Act, 1948, the maintenance of an adequate Ambulance Service in Newquay as elsewhere in Cornwall became the liability of the County Council as from the 5th July, 1948.

This has been continued, however, on substantially the same lines as those operating before that date, viz: one two-berthed Ambulance operated by a full-time driver with the invaluable assistance and co-operation of the Newquay Division of the St. John Ambulance Brigade and Cornwall No. 6 Detachment of the British Red Cross Society to whom we extend our thanks for their willing co-operation.

The demands made on the Service have increased considerably with the greater use being made of specialists' clinics and centralised treatment centres under the Health Service Act, and during the period 5th July to 31st December, 1948, the Newquay Ambulance has dealt with 312 cases of all types for a total

mileage of 8,330.

NURSING IN THE HOME. - Prior to 5th July, 1948, the Newquay District Nursing Association carried out these duties in a very satisfactory way. A midwife was also employed by the County Council. With the coming into operation of the Act, the County Council are now responsible for all these duties. The take-over was smooth as could be expected from an Association which had been doing such excellent work for so many years.

HOSPITALS. - The year is notable for the transfer of the Newquay
Hospital to its new position under the Regional Hospitals Board.
To the staff of the Hospital we extend cordial greetings and best
wishes for the continued success of their work under the new regime.
Infectious cases which require isolation are removed to the
Isolation Hospital at Truro.

SECTION C.

SANITARY CONDITIONS OF THE DISTRICT.

WATER.

The Urban District is supplied by the Newquay and District Water Company, a Statutory Company, and is derived from the following sources:--

(a) A Main Supply is obtained from deep adits at Indian Queens and Ruthers by gravitation, and the water is conveyed by iron pipes to Quintrel Downs, and then by pipe line to Newquay.

(b) A main supply from Trewollack, obtained by pumping from old mine shafts and adits, the water afterwards being conveyed to aeration and filtration plants at Fairpark.

(c) A supplementary supply at Mount Wise, Newcuay, obtained from a shaft by pumping.

(d) An additional supply is derived from the Porth Stream and is a chlorinated water.

Filtration and Pumping Plants, together with chlorination works are in operation at Rialton. This station is then connected to the existing pumping Main from Trewollack, and thence to Fairpark Service Reservoir.

Monthly reports are submitted from the Company and confirm that the Supply is wholesome water suitable for a Public Supply. Vith the exception of the occasional supply from Mount Wise, all the main water is mixed at Fairpark Tank Reservoir, and this supply is now chlorinated water.

Monthly Analyses are regularly made by the Local Authority through the laboratory at the Royal Cornwall Infirmary.

Thirty-five samples of the Public Water Supply were taken by the Sanitary Inspector during the year for bacteriological examination. These reports have all been excellent with not one adverse report.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The routine testing and inspection of drains and sewers have been carried out and the results are to be found in the Annual Report of the Sanitary Inspector which is attached.

The undermentioned Sewage Works were inspected during the year. Several of these Works require repair. They are all under the control of the Surveyor's Department and they are also inspected at intervals by Officers of the County Council.

The new sewerage and sewage disposal scheme for Crantock is well on the way to completion and should prove a valuable addition to Public Works at Crantock.

DISINFECTION

Concurrent and terminal disinfection by means of gaseous and liquid disinfectants is carried out in homes where Infectious Disease is notified.

DISINFESTATION

In three cases disinfestation of premises was carried out following complaints of their verminous condition.

RIVERS AND STREAMS

Preventable pollution of the streams at Porth and Watergate has been investigated and many house and hotel properties are converting their sewage disposal arrangements to the septic tank system.

CLOSET ACCOMMODATION

All areas in the District are now on main water supply and inspections are being made to see that all closet accommodation is brought up to proper standard.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

The collection and disposal of refuse; street cleansing; and supervision of public conveniences is now under the control of the Surveyor's Department with regular inspecting visits from your Sanitary Inspector.

There is still a great need for more Public Conveniences in the centre of the town, but I am informed there is one to be erected in 1949 near the Western National Omnibus Depot and Offices.

LITTER

During 1948, a number of litter baskets have been erected and more are to be provided in 1949.

There is still need for education of the public in the use of these baskets, as the streets are used for the disposal of litter even when a receptacle is very near.

RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACT, 1919

During the year, Rat Destruction has been carried out in all parts of the District (see Sanitary Inspector's Report for details).

SECTION D.

HOUSING

The Housing shortage is still very acute in Newquay and the Waiting List for Council Houses increases yearly. It is hoped that many more houses will be available for occupation during the coming year.


