
Mr Chairman and Councillors,

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I present my report for the year ended 31st. December, 1958. The Corrected death rate shows a rise from 10.17 per 1000 total population in 1957 to 11.3 in the year under review. Two hundred and forty six deaths occurred as opposed to two hundred and ten in 1957, but whereas the age at death in 1957 was 69.43 years, in 1958 it was 72.66. An increase of over three years.

Deaths in infants under one year show an increase from four in 1957 to six in 1958. The Infant Mortality rate, i.e. the number of deaths in infants under one year per 1000 related live births, rose correspondingly from 17.02 to 30.61 - a considerable increase. If the two years are taken together, however, the Infant Mortality rate would not be much above the rate for the whole of England and Wales which for 1958 was 22.6. Fluctuations such as this are inevitable when figures applicable to relatively small populations are compared with those for the Country as a whole.

The incidence of Infectious Disease shows a fall from seven hundred and sixty four cases notified in 1957 to seventy four in the year under discussion. This decrease is almost entirely due to the fall in the number of cases of Measles from six hundred and sixty eight to thirty nine. The small incidence of cases of Measles follows the usual course of the disease in that it normally reaches epidemic proportions in alternate years. No cases of Poliomyelitis occurred. To what extent this is due to the vaccination programme it is not possible to say.

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL:

Mr. Chairman and Councillors,

I submit herewith the Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1958.

During 1958 the rehousing of tenants from the courts etc commenced and demolition took place in Salem Place, Exeter Road and Little Bradley. Thus with little comment a major event in appearance and indeed the history of the town took place.

A considerable amount of work was also carried out in connection with improvement grants and the Rent Act 1957.

A further improvement was also made at the Public Abattoir, a chill room being installed, and during the period of its operation it proved a considerable asset to the property.



RODENT CONTROL :-

A member of the manual labour staff of this department has continued to be employed on a part-time basis on this section of work. As in previous years two trearments of the sewerage system of the town were carried out, approximately 35 manholes being baited and poisoned on each occasion.

In addition 44 premises were treated for rat infestation involving 573 visits.
