

Ambulance facilities.

The Council owns and maintains one ambulance for infectious cases and two ambulances for non-infectious, accident, and maternity cases.



REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTOR

FOR THE YEAR 1946.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit the report on the work of my branch of the Health Department for the year 1946.

On 1st. February, Mr. Kenneth Hilton took up his duties as idditional Sanitary Inspector, and it was largely due to him that the wort of the department proceeded smoothly despite the disruptive influences which were at work throughout the major portion of the year.

Miss Barbara Twiss succeeded Mrs. Kathleen Harwood as Sanitary Inspector's Clerk on 22nd March. Mrs. Harwood had been with the department for six years and her efficient and conscientious service was very much appreciated.

My sincere thanks are due to the Chairman and members of the Health Committee, Officials of the Council, and the staff of my Department for the willing assistance rendered throughout the year.

Several of the existing cases of overcrowding are concerned with families too large to be adequately re-housed in 3 bedroomed type houses. These cases are usually the most grossly overcrowded and existing multi bedroomed type Council houses should be reserved for them when available.

(B) Fitness of Houses. Shortages of materials again precluded any extensive repairs to dwellings. Action taken was under the Public Health Act rather than the Housing Act, and was limited to absolute essentials.

Two houses rendered dangerous by mining subsidence were demolished voluntarily by the owner.

The adulterated sample was deficient of 8% solids not fat and contained not less than 7.2% of extraneous water. Further samples were obtained and the vendor warned.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES - CONTROL.

Enquiries were made upon notification. Disinfection of rooms and bedding was carried out in all cases of removal of tuberculous patients. In other cases bedding was treated as routine, but rooms were dealt with only, on request.

4. VERMIN CONTROL.

The department used D.D.T. in its liquid and its powder form during the year with exceedingly good results.

Tenants were advised on cleanliness, care of furniture, and furnishings and it was stressed that their efforts were essential both in getting rid of infestation and in preventing re-infestation.

7. REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

Refuse Collection was carried out satisfectorily during the year and a weekly collection was maintained in spite of two of the vehicles being out of commission for long periods due to difficulties in obtaining spare parts.

The Wharf Road Tip neared completion and topping up and soiling will be necessary during 1947.

Salvage has been maintained and is likely to remain a prominent feature of refuse collection and disposal for many years.
