### GENERAL COMMENT.

There has been no unusual or excessive mortality during the year, nor have there been any specially noteworthy causes of sickness or invalidity requiring comment.

### SECTION B.

### GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

### 1. LABORATORY FACILITIES.

The County Council have made arrangements for the examination of sputum, swabs and other pathological material at the Cheltenham General Hospital. As a war-time measure additional laboratory facilities are now available at the Emergency Public Health Laboratory, South Parks Road, Oxford.

#### 2. AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

- (a) Infectious cases. The ambulance service is provided by the Delancy Hospital, Cheltenham.
- (b) Other cases. The Cheltenham Ambulance Service is under agreement with the Council to serve the whole area. In addition, A.R.P. Services maintain five whole time ambulances and four part-time ambulances in the area. The service is adequate.

### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

# (a) Particulars of new sources of public supply.

During the year no new sources of supply were inaugurated, but the Council during 1944 anticipates preparing its post-war scheme for the supply of water throughout the area.

# Particulars of extensions of existing mains.

Extensions to the Council's distribution system were carried out during the year at the following places :-

- (1) Lansdowne Entry, Bourton-on-the-Water. (2) Guiting Power, where the main was extended to Guiting Grange.
- (c) Measures in force for the discovery of contamination.

Sampling of supplies, both public and private, in all Parishes. The Council's supplies are all sampled at regular intervals and the greatest care is taken to eliminate all possible sources of contemination, and in addition a considerable proportion of the water supplied is chlorinated

The total number of samples taken during the year was 89. Copies of two analyses, one each from the Council's two main sources of supply, i.e. Mill Cottage, Blockley, and Upper Swell, are set out below for general information :-

There are several parishes in the district where the supply is unsatisfactory either in quantity or quality. As pointed out above, however, the Council is anticipating the preparation of its post-war schemes during 1944, and is giving consideration to all places where the existing supplies are unsatisfactory. The Council will have under consideration during 1944 the preparation of its post-war plans for sewerage, when it is probable that a programme will be drawn up indicating those parishes which are to be sewered on modern lines immediately the opportunity occurs. No doubt, when this has been done, the preparation of detailed schemes for the places selected will be proceeded with immediately.

In the meantime, places which are in urgent need of proper sewerage and sewage disposal systems and will therefore receive careful consideration, are Mickleton, Willersey, Bourton-on-the-Hill and Bledington.

# (5) PUBLIC CLEANSING.

.All parishes in the district are covered by the system of refuse collection and disposal, and regular collections of refuse and salvage are made at intervals of a week in the largest parishes, fortnightly in others and monthly in the remainder.

During the year the Council ceased to undertake the emptying of latrine buckets for the troops stationed in the district, but

careful observation has been kept to ensure that those responsible for this work do not deposit the material either so as to be a nuisance or to cause pollution of any water supply.

Action taken.

Byelaws for tents, vans and sheds and fruit pickers lodgings are in operation, and very few instances were found during the year where conditions were such as to call for action under these bye-laws.

There are always cases where one or two tents are erected on roadside wastes and where men sleep "rough" in barns and sheds, but these instances are comparatively few and very rarely is the length of stay such that action is required under the appropriate provisions of the Public Health Acts and the bye-laws made thereunder.

The Council had under consideration the accommodation of the gypsies, who frequent Stow Fair in the spring and autumn of each year, but no real solution to this problem has yet been evolved. The gypsies with their vans and paraphernalia very rarely stay in the same spot for more than three days, when attending these fairs, and the provision of the bye-laws as to tents, vans and sheds do not, therefore, come into effect.

#### (i) Cowsheds and Dairies.

#### Action taken.

In spite of the greater difficulty in effecting building work and repairs, the improvement and modernisation of dairy premises has taken place in many instances. It cannot be too strongly stressed, however, that well constructed premises, whilst being helpful, are not the mainstay of clean milk production. Attention to cleanliness of premises, utensils, cows and milkers are the all-important factors, whilst adequate cooling is also an important item. An adequate supply of pure water is, as can easily be seen, therefore, a necessity, and this is being realised by milk producers.

The number of samples of milk taken for bacteriological examination during the year was 189 and by far the greater number were found to be satisfactory. Personal contact with producers, where there were unsatisfactory reports, with a full discussion on their methods of production, has been continued with success in many instances.

### Part IV. - Overcrowding.

Very similar observations can be made for 1943 as for 1942. In a district such as this and under existing wartime conditions it is a fluctuating problem which tends to increase with the increasing shortage of houses. It is impossible to give exact numbers of overcrowding cases which are in existance, but as will be seen from the remarks set out below, the matter is one which the Council hope to deal with at the earliest opportunity.

### Post-War Housing.

The Council has set up a Special Committee to deal with the problem of post-war housing, and during 1944 this Committee will tackle the various problems to be dealt with when circumstances permit, particularly with regard to the erection of new houses to relieve overcrowding, replace existing condemned houses and meet the needs of those returning from the war.

In the years prior to the war, the Council carried out a very extensive programme of re-housing, but at the outbreak of the war there were still many houses under consideration for demolition. With the tendency to increase the minimum standards of suitable housing and the lack of sufficient maintenance to many houses during the war the problem will be very formidable when the present ban on the condemnation of unfit houses is raised. The Council will, therefore, have all the many matters which the problem involves under careful consideration when drawing up its programme for the future, including the reconditioning of houses which, whilst not totally unfit, require extensive repairs and improvements. It is to be hoped that greater use will be made of the Housing (Rural Workers) Acts, under which the Council hopes to obtain delegated powers.

Observations have been made earlier in this report concerning milk production. There are no milk shops in the district and most retailers of milk in the area are producer retailers, who produce and retail in their own villages.

(b) Meat and other foods.

Meat for the district is obtained from two centralised slaughterhouses, one at Cheltenham and one at Evesham.

Periodical inspections of the meat on arrival in the shops are carried out, and it was not found necessary to condemn any butchers' meat during 1943.
