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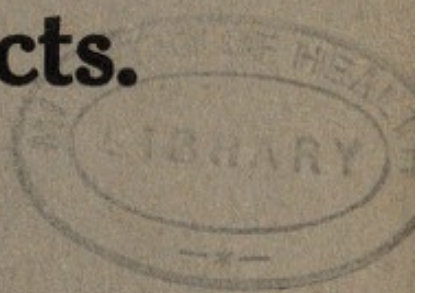

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# North Oxon Combined Sanitary Districts.



*To the Chairmen and Members of the Joint Committee, and the respective Chairmen and Councillors of the several constituent Authorities in the Combined Area.*

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit my annual Report for the Year 1925, being the fifth Joint Report for the Combined Districts, which follows the lines laid down in Circular 648 of the Ministry of Health.

Infectious Diseases again show a decline, 109 as compared with 162 in the preceding year, and 170 in 1923, the average for the past five years being 180.2 this is shown in table I. D.

**ANTHRAX.** One case was notified during the year.

**DIPHTHERIA.** Three (none fatal) as compared with eleven (none fatal) in 1924, the death rate for England and Wales in 1925 being .07.

**ENCEPHALITIS LETHARGICA.** Six cases were notified, three of which terminated fatally, as compared with ten in the preceding year, one of which was fatal.

**ENTERIC FEVER.** Four notifications were received during the year, the same number as in 1924, no fatality occurred.

**EPIDEMIC CEREBRO-SPINAL MENINGITIS.** One case was notified as compared with two in the preceding year, a good recovery ensued.

**ERYSIPELAS.** Sixteen cases were notified as compared with twenty in 1924, no fatality occurred.

**OPHTHALMIA NEONATORUM.** Six notifications were received as compared with twenty in 1924, no fatality occurred.

**PNEUMONIA.** Twenty-three cases were notified as compared with fifty-six in 1924, twenty-five deaths occurred as against twenty-nine in 1924.

**PUERPERAL FEVER.** One case was notified during the year as compared with one in 1924.

**SCARLET FEVER.** Forty-eight notifications were received, none of which proved fatal, compared with fifty in 1924, one of which terminated fatally. The death-rate for this disease in England and Wales in 1925 = .02.

**TUBERCULOSIS.** Fifty-five cases were notified, as compared with sixty-four in the preceding year. Twenty-five deaths occurred from Pulmonary Tuberculosis, and twelve from Non-Pulmonary forms of the disease.

Particulars of all the above cases will be found in the sections of this Report relating to the several districts where they occurred.

Less anxiety was felt generally as regards Small Pox in 1925, I was only called in to see one suspicious case during the year, which happily proved to be only a severe case of Chicken Pox. All the districts as mentioned in my former Reports are provided with isolation hospital accommodation for this disease.

There appears to be an increasing readiness to send the more urgent cases of Scarlet Fever and Diphtheria to an isolation hospital. At the present time cases are sent to the isolation hospitals of Banbury Borough and Abingdon Joint Hospital. It would be much more satisfactory if the Combined Districts possessed one of their own.

No cases of Dysentery, Malaria, Polioencephalitis, or Poliomyelitis Anterior Acuta were notified during the year.

The Sale of Food and Drugs Acts ; Notification of Births Act ; Midwives, Clinics for V.D., and Tuberculosis, Maternity and Child Welfare Centres, and the domiciliary treatment of Tuberculosis are undertaken by the County Council. Arrangements are also made by the County Council for the payment of cases of Ophthalmia Neonatorum treated at the Oxford Eye Hospital.

SCHOOLS. These are managed by the County Authorities, but there is close co-operation between the School Medical Officer and the Health Authorities, duplicate notifications of all cases of sickness being sent to the School Medical Officer and the Medical Officer of Health.

The Rural District Councils (Slaughter Houses) Order 1924, and the Public Health Meat Regulations 1924, came into operation on 1st April, 1925, and the Milk and Dairies (Consolidation) Act 1915, on 1st September, 1925.

## DEATHS FROM TUBERCULOSIS.

Thirty-seven deaths were registered from Tuberculosis as compared with thirty-eight in the preceding year, twenty-five (M. 17, F. 8) being of the Pulmonary variety, and twelve (M. 5, F. 7) Non-Pulmonary.

## DEATHS FROM CANCER AND OTHER FORMS OF MALIGNANT DISEASE.

One hundred and four deaths (M. 52, F. 52) were recorded from these diseases, giving a death rate of 1.8, compared with 1.4 in 1924.

## DEATHS FROM RESPIRATORY DISEASES

*(Excluding Influenza and Tuberculosis)*

Eighty-seven deaths occurred (M. 30, F. 57) these were as follows: Bronchitis 47 (M. 14, F. 33); Pneumonia 25 (M. 9, F. 16); Other Respiratory Diseases 15 (M. 7, F. 8); giving a general Respiratory Death rate of 1.5.

## DEATHS FROM INFLUENZA.

Twenty-eight deaths were registered (M. 13, F. 15) giving a death rate of .49 as compared with .5 in the preceding year.

## DEATHS FROM VIOLENCE.

Two suicides occurred during the year (1 male, 1 female); and twelve from other forms of violence (M. 9, F. 3).

### PHYSICAL FEATURES AND GENERAL CHARACTER OF THE DISTRICT.

The principal geological formations are the Lower, Middle and Upper Lias beds, the alluvial valley of the Cherwell forming the boundary on the Eastern side. The region presents several "faults," which run in many directions, Wigginton, South Newington, Sibford Ferris, Sibford Gower, Epwell and Tadmarton are all situated on the Great Oolite series. The country is undulating in character, with many hills, several of which are steep, and capped by the Northampton sands or Stonesfield slate series.

The chief occupation is agriculture, there is also an iron ore industry at Bloxham, Hook Norton and Hornton which has increased of recent years although latterly it has shared in the general depression of the iron trade; at Shutford there is an ancient and important plush industry, where old hand looms are worked with machine looms in the same factory. Brewing is carried on at Hook Norton, there is also a boilerette and tin saucepan factory at North Newington.

These various occupations do not appear to have any marked adverse influence on the public health.

**DIPHTHERIA (2).** The first case occurred at Claydon in the month of April in a girl aet. 11, a positive swab was obtained; the second case was in a girl aet. 11 at South Newington, a swab taken was negative; both were isolated at home. Antitoxin was administered, no extension occurred.

**ENCEPHALITIS LETHARGICA (1).** This case was notified from Sibford Ferris in the month of May. The patient made a good recovery.

**ENTERIC FEVER (1).** This case occurred at Horley in May, notified as Paratyphoid B, a positive Widal reaction was obtained, the source of origin was obscure, the patient made a good recovery, no extension took place.

**ERYSIPELAS (4).** These cases occurred as follows: one at Barford in January, one at Bloxham in March, one at Adderbury in September, one at Epwell in November. All were of the mild sporadic type.

**PNEUMONIA (7).** These were notified as follows: one at Adderbury, one at Sibford Gower, one at Tadmarton in February; one at Wroxton in March; one at Shenington in June; one at Hook Norton in November; one at Great Bourton in December.

**PUERPERAL FEVER (1).** This case notified at Twyford, Adderbury, in November, was not connected with any sanitary defect, but was due to accidental retention of secundines.

**SCARLET FEVER (21).** Four cases occurred in a family at Adderbury, in January, the first case having escaped diagnosis until the others were infected, a case also occurred at Hornton in this month. A further case developed in February in the above-mentioned family at Adderbury.

An imported case was notified at South Newington in May, a motor driver from Walsall was taken ill at an Inn, he was isolated in a bedroom until his removal to the Borough Isolation Hospital.

Three cases occurred at Bloxham and one at North Newington in the month of June, one case was notified at Shenington in July, arrangements were made to remove the child to hospital but the parents declined to allow the child to leave home, two cases were notified at Adderbury in September, three were notified at Shutford in October. One case was notified at Shutford, one at Hornton, one at Wardington in November.

## WATER SUPPLIES.

The scheme to supply Wiggington with water was completed, and turned on for public use on August 19th. The supply is excellent and is much appreciated by the inhabitants, in addition to the six anti-freezing standpipes situated in the village streets, eleven houses have had a private service laid on.

At Claydon and Hook Norton new pumps have been fixed over public wells.

The Minister of Health has approved the raising of a loan for work in connection with the installation of an auxiliary Petrol engine at Shenington Waterworks.

## SEWERS AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

Two sites were purchased for sewage disposal works at Great and Little Bourton after arbitration conducted by Sir Anker Simmonds on February 4th.

The Minister of Health has sanctioned raising a loan of £1750 for the sewerage and sewage disposal works at Great and Little Bourton, since when the works have been put in hand.

At Bloxham 60 lineal yards of new 6 inch sewer were laid, replacing a defective rubble and stone one.

### PHYSICAL FEATURES AND GENERAL CHARACTER OF THE DISTRICT.

The district is open and undulating, being hilly in places, and is well wooded in the neighbourhoods of Chastleton, Heythrop, Great Tew, and the Wychwood Forest.

The principal geological formations are the Lias, Inferior and Great Oolite series, many villages being situated at the outcrop of two formations, presumably on account of the springs issuing therefrom. Leafield is situated on an outlier of Oxford clay surrounded by Cornbrash and on this account presents a difficulty with reference to the water supply, which is it hoped will shortly be overcome. To the east of Swerford a "fault" branches, the northern arm of which runs in a westerly direction to a point mid-way between Great and Little Rollright, while the southern arm runs roughly parallel to it, and then bends in a southerly direction through Salford as far as Daylesford, from this two subsidiary faults run almost parallel through Cornwell.

The chief industry is agriculture, there is also gloving in Charlbury and district, saw mills at Milton-under-Wychwood, flour mills at Shipton-under-Wychwood, none of which appear to exercise any marked influence on the public health.

**ENCEPHALITIS LETHARGICA (1).** This case was notified from Littlemore Asylum in an inmate belonging to your district.

**ERYSIPELAS (1).** This was a case of facial Erysipelas notified at Leafield in the month of August and was of the sporadic type, a good recovery ensued.

**PNEUMONIA (2).** Both cases were notified in January, one at Foxcote, the other at Little Tew.

**SCARLET FEVER (2).** These cases were notified from the same house at Shipton-under-Wychwood in the month of April, they were efficiently isolated at home, no extension of the disease occurred.

**ENTERIC FEVER (1).** This case occurred at Fawler in the month of August, a well in the farmyard was found to be polluted, this has since been closed, and an excellent supply substituted. The patient made a good recovery.

#### WATER SUPPLIES.

The Ministry of Health held Public Inquiries with reference to Water supply schemes at Leafield and Over Norton, official sanction was granted to the former, but withheld from the latter pending negotiations for the purchase of the springs.

#### SEWERS AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

The Ministry of Health approved of the scheme submitted for the sewerage of Shipton-under-Wychwood, the work was carried out during the year and is working satisfactorily. A scheme was submitted by the Surveyor to the Council for the sewerage of Milton-under-Wychwood, following upon a complaint from the Thames Conservancy, but was postponed owing to the excessive cost.

Advertisements under the Milk and Dairies Act 1922 appeared in the Press in the month of May, the position remains the same as in 1924.

### PHYSICAL FEATURES AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE DISTRICT.

The district is bounded on the South by the alluvial valley of the Isis, on the East by the Evenlode, on the North by an irregular line running from the Evenlode at Handborough, through Wilcote, Ramsden, Fordwells and Taynton, which separates it from Chipping Norton Rural District, and on the West by the Gloucestershire border. The main geological formations are as follows, in the South Oxford clay, in the middle Cornbrash, in the North Great Oolite. At Swinbrook the Inferior Oolite obtains, and at Burford and Taynton there is, in addition, the Upper Lias Clay, the latter being much "faulted."

The chief occupation is agriculture, there is a brewery at Eynsham, engineering works at Clanfield, and a steam laundry at Aston. Gloving is done as homework.

**ENCEPHALITIS LETHARGICA (1).** This case was notified from Littlemore Asylum, in an inmate belonging to your district, and died in that Institution from Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

**EPIDEMIC CEREBRO-SPINAL MENINGITIS (1).** This was notified from Southleigh, a boy aet. 10, in the month of May, he was taken to the Radcliffe Infirmary in a public conveyance, the Meningococcus was found; unfortunately the mother insisted on bringing the child home and the patient was brought home in the same vehicle, this was disinfected, and the circumstances were reported to the Council, when the matter was considered, and the City Authorities communicated with.

**ENTERIC FEVER (1).** This was notified from the Cottage Hospital, Burford, as occurring in a boy aet. 14, from Chipping Norton, who was staying with an aunt at Burford. Investigations at the hospital and at Chipping Norton failed to discover the obvious cause; a good recovery ensued, no extension occurred.

**ERYSIPELAS (3).** The first case was notified from Hailey in January, the second from Eynsham in May, the third from Clanfield in August.

**PNEUMONIA (2).** The first case was notified from Eynsham in February, the second at Burford in November.

**SCARLET FEVER (8).** The first case occurred at Upton and Signett in February, in a maid who had been visiting a village in an adjoining county, where the disease was rife, she was removed to the isolation hospital at Abingdon, no extension occurred. A case was notified from Eynsham in September in a boy aet. 14, and removed to hospital,—a cousin on a visit from Southampton was found to be peeling on the soles of the feet. In October a boy aet. 4 was notified from Eynsham Hall Park, and was isolated at home, and a further case at the house in Eynsham where the case was notified in September also removed to Abingdon: Two cases at Northleigh, one case being isolated at home, the other being removed to Abingdon Isolation Hospital. In November a case was notified at Freeland in a boy aet. 5, he was removed to Abingdon: The last case was notified in December from Kencott in a boy aet. 14, he was isolated at home.

**WATER SUPPLIES.** At Eynsham the water main has been extended. At Bampton an inspection of the well at the waterworks was carried out by the Council's engineer, with a view to increasing the supply.

**SEWERS AND SEWERAGE DISPOSAL.** A good deal of reconstruction has been carried out during the year, and the Council's undertakings maintained. A new filter has been constructed at Aston, part of Cogges sewer has been relaid, septic tanks at Eynsham and Burford have been cleaned out, at Langford the filter has been completely cleansed and new gravel provided.

### PHYSICAL FEATURES AND GENERAL CHARACTER OF THE DISTRICT.

The District is bounded on the North by a line corresponding with a geological fault, which runs roughly in an East and West direction from Clifton to Swerford ; on the East by the river Cherwell, with the exception of Hampton Gay and Hampton Poyle ; on the South by the Isis ; on the West by the Chipping Norton and Witney Rural Districts.

The geological formation of the central and largest part of the district consists of the Great Oolite, but in the North, and on the East side, as far as Northbrook Bridge, the subsoil consists of the Lower Lias Clay, the Mid Lias Marlstone and the Upper Lias Clay, while in the South part of the district Oxford Clay obtains ; Coombe is situated on an outlier of the same formation. An irregular band of Cornbrash runs obliquely from S.W. to N.E., extending from Bladon to Shipton-on-Cherwell.

Agriculture is the chief occupation in the district, but at Stonesfield there is a gloving workshop ; there is also gloving and kindred homework in this and other villages. The University Paper Mills at Wolvercote absorb a considerable amount of local labour. None of these occupations appear to have any marked adverse influence on the public health.

**DIPHTHERIA (1).** This case was notified at Davenant Road in the month of January in a boy aet. 10, a positive swab was obtained, Antidiphtheritic serum injected, a good recovery ensued, no extension of the disease occurred.

**ENCEPHALITIS LETHARGICA (2).** The first case occurred in April in a young man, aet. 18, at Kiddington, he was removed to the Radcliffe Infirmary and died there. The second case was notified from Littlemore Asylum in an inmate belonging to your district.

**ERYSIPELAS (6).** These cases were notified as follows: one in Feb. at Wolvercote, one in March at Middle Barton, one in June at Kidlington, one in August at Wolvercote, one in September at Middle Barton, one at Wolvercote in December.

**OPHTHALMIA NEONATORUM (5).** These were notified as follows: Clifton one in October, one at Deddington in May, one at Dunstew in January, one at Tackley in April, one at Yarnton in November.

**PNEUMONIA (10).** These cases were notified as follows: Bladon one in February, Cutteslowe one in March, Deddington two in October, one in November, Kidlington one in February, one in September, Steeple Aston one in April.

**SCARLET FEVER (10).** The first case was notified from Davenant Road, Wolvercote, in February in an adult female; she was isolated at home, no extension took place. The next case was notified from Church Road, Wolvercote; as there were other children and the accommodation limited the patient was removed to Abingdon and disinfection carried out, no spread of the disease occurred. A case was notified at Steeple Aston in April and was removed to the Isolation Hospital: a further case was notified in May but it was not found necessary to remove the patient: in neither case was there any extension of the disease. In October cases occurred as follows: one at Blenheim Palace Garage, one at Campsfield, and one at New Road, Hensington Without, the two former were removed to the Isolation Hospital. A case notified from Begbroke in November was also removed to the Isolation Hospital as the father was a milkman. In December a case was notified at Wolvercote, and a further case at Blenheim Palace Garage, both were removed to the Isolation Hospital, no extension occurred.

**WATER SUPPLIES.** The proposed scheme for Steeple Barton has been abandoned. The proposed scheme for Clifton is in the hands of a civil engineer and it is hoped to proceed with it as soon as possible. An additional pump has been provided for Bladon village.

**SEWERS AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.** Twelve new earth closets and twenty-eight w.c.'s were constructed during the year, and during the same period fifty-five old-fashioned closets were converted to a more approved type.

**COWSHEDS.** At Yarnton, Mr. Putt's, at Jackson's Farm, Cowshed, additional lighting, concrete floor and drainage provided. At Middle Barton, Mr. T. A. Robinson's shed, a concrete floor and drainage channel provided. At Hampton Gay, Mr. H. Bartlett's shed has had a concrete floor laid down.
