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



As will be seen from the above table the only two diseases to reach epidemic proportions during the year were measles and whooping cough neither of which show a significant incidence above the national rate.

Once again there has been no case of diphtheria notified during the year but I would point out that the absence of the disease has removed the most potent stimulus we had in the production of a high immunisation rate amongst the child population. There is a growing tendency for parents to neglect this very simple and efficient method of protecting their offspring against a very serious disease, and I cannot overstress the importance of immunisation if this scourge is to be kept at bay. There is no room for complacency since the present records show that the percentage immunised in the district is considerably below the desired level.

The foregoing remarks apply even more poignantly to the prevention of smallpox by vaccination. There has been a steady decline in the vaccination rate for a considerable number of years which has been accelerated since the removal of compulsion by the National Health Act which came into force in 1948. With the ever increasing rapidity of international communications the danger of the introduction of smallpox from endemic zones becomes increasingly more easy, and there have been a few examples recently where major disasters having only been prevented by the vigilence and industry shown by the preventive health services in the control of this disease. The situation would call for much less anxiety if only all parents could be persuaded to have their children vaccinated in infancy.

TUBERCULOSIS.

There were 22 cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis and 16 cases of Non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis on the register at the 31st December, 1951, which gives a rate of 4.63 cases of Tuberculosis per thousand population.

National Assistance Act, 1948.

It has not been necessary to take action under Section 47 of the above Act which deals with the compulsory removal to suitable premises of persons in need of care and attention.

ENVIRONMENTAL HYGIENE.

Water Supplies.

These supplies remain as in previous reports but work commenced during the year on the new distribution scheme will ultimately supply piped water to all villages and hamlets in the area which are at present mostly watered by shallow wells. The majority of these wells are an ever present menace to the health of the community and it will be a considerable relief when they can be closed.

Sewage Disposal.

Work has proceeded during the year on the new sewage disposal scheme for the parishes of Brompton and Romanby but due to unforseen delays and difficulties in construction, the completion of the scheme has been considerably delayed. It is sincerely to be hoped that the system will be in full operation before the end of 1952, and so terminate the existing nuisance in the River Wiske. With the advent of a piped water supply to the villages in the district it is important that plans should be prepared for sewering these villages and a system of priorities introduced for the whole area.

Milk.

There are seven registered retail Milk Sellers in the area, who are supervised by the Sanitary Inspectors.

Ice Cream.

There are no manufacturers of ice cream in the district but there are nine registered dealers who are supervised to ensure that they comply with the Ice Cream Regulations.

Meat and Food.

The slaughter and inspection of animals intended for human consumption is centralised at the abattoir in Northallerton and, as in previous years, your Sanitary Inspector has carried out relief duties on meat inspection when required.

In connection with the National Campaign to improve the standard of hygiene in the display and handling of food stuffs, periodic visits have been made during the year to all premises used for the purpose of food distribution.

Factories and Workshops.

The few Factories and Workshops in the district have been visited regularly and advice given on the improvement of sanitary and ablution facilities. In most cases the managements have been interested in the welfare of their employees, and co-operated willingly when constructive criticism was offered.

Refuse Collection and Disposal.

A regular collection of household refuse from every village in the area was maintained throughout the year, although at times it was found to be impossible to keep to the recognised schedule of weekly collections in the larger villages and fortnightly collections in the more rural areas.

I must once again stress the necessity for improved tipping facilities. The central tip at Yafforth Road is far from satisfactory and should be closed at the earliest opportunity for the reasons stated in previous reports. Every attempt should therefore be made to acquire a more suitable tipping area.

Rodent Control.

The present joint scheme whereby the same operative covers the Northallerton Rural and Urban areas has worked very satisfactorily during the year. There has been some increase in the number of business premises treated and it would appear from the number of enquiries received that the local population are becoming more rat conscious. Details of the work carried out are to be found in accompanying report of the Sanitary Inspector.

Rivers and Streams.

There is still considerable pollution in a number of the streams in the area due to the discharge into them of undesirable sewage effluent.

Any major improvement must await the construction of modern sewage disposal plants.

Housing.

I must again draw the attention of the Council to the public health problem of families who are overcrowded or living in unfit and sub-standard houses and some regard should be given to the rehousing of these families in order that a start can be made on the improvement or demolition of houses which are definitely prejudicial to health. There is no doubt that some of the older houses are progressively falling into a state of decay through lack of a positive programme regarding this side of the housing problem.

Shops.

During the year 61 routine inspections were made. There were 11 instances of contraventions or improvements affected.

Streams and Water Courses.

Streams have been cleansed at Thrintoft, East Cowton, Mortonon-Swale and East Harlsey.

The Beck at Water End, Brompton, was cleansed by the Internal Drainage Board during the year and this should receive some attention annually to avoid deterioration.

Rodent Control.

Consequent upon the passing of the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949, the Rural and Urban Councils appointed a full-time Rodent Operator. He commenced duties in November, 1950, and divides his time equally between the two Authorities. Apart from dwelling houses, farms and the Council's own property, *i.e.* refuse tips, sewers, and sewage works, treatments were carried out for British Railways.

The Council having accepted the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries financial grant scheme under Circular N.S. 19 give a free service to all private dwellings for the eradication of Rats and Mice. A charge is made for any treatment executed on business premises based on the labour involved, cost of baits and poison, travelling expenses, etc.

Water Supplies.

In August, work commenced on the Council's water supply distribution scheme and fair progress is being made.

It has been decided to afford a temporary piped supply of water to the village of Great Langton by utilising the private estate supply of Kiplin Hall. This is expected to be accomplished during 1953. Seasonal shortages of water occurred during the year, particularly in the late summer and early autumn, but it was not found necessary to lead water to affected parishes.

Refuse Collection and Disposal.

During the year, the Council operated two Karrier refuse vehicles : one ten cubic yards capacity and the other seven cubic yards capacity. Each village in the rural area is served by the vehicles.

The delivery of a new twelve cubic yard capacity Karrier is expected by January, 1952 to replace the seven cubic yard capacity Bantam Karrier and this should effect an improvement in the service which for some months past has been badly strained.

As mentioned previously, an effort should be made by the Council to obtain a new refuse tip sufficiently central yet removed from habitation. The existing claypit off the Yafforth Road (within the Urban area) is not ideally placed and, indeed, is fast becoming filled up.

Milk and Ice-Cream (Heat Treatment) Regulations.

There are 7 registered retail milk-sellers in the area during the year 14 inspections of premises were made.

There are 9 dealers in ice-cream registered by the Council, 2 Osmotherley, 2 Romanby, and 5 Brompton. 7 dealers sell pre-packed products and 2 dealers bulk ice-cream, which is obtained from manufacturers in Northallerton. There are no manufacturers within the Rural area. 20 inspections were made and 2 samples procured. Both samples proved satisfactory (Grade 1).

Food Inspection.

The slaughter of animals for human consumption is centralised in Northallerton, and the Council's Sanitary Inspectors undertake relief duties at the abattoir when the Urban District Sanitary Inspector is away.

Drainage and Sewerage.

During the year, the settling tanks were emptied in the Parishes of Ainderby Steeple, Morton-on-Swale, Thrintoft, Yafforth, Danby Wiske, East Cowton, Great Smeaton, Hornby, West Rounton, Appleton Wiske, Welbury and Borrowby.

The tanks in Brompton were pumped off and cleansed twice during the year.

The Brompton/Romanby Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme remained uncompleted at the end of the year and it is to be hoped that this scheme is finished soon as conditions at the point of discharge at Romanby are far from satisfactory.
