

It will be seen from the above statistical table that the only disease unduly prevalent in the district during the year was measles, the clinical severity of which was not great, there being no deaths associated with the outbreak.

I should again like to repeat my warning of the previous years regarding the inadequate protection of the pre-school child against diphtheria and smallpox. The immunisation state of the children in the district is as follows:—

0 to 4 years .. 50% immunised. 5 to 14 years .. 87% immunised.

The figure for school children is very satisfactory, due of course to the fact that immunisation procedure is carried out at school and requires very little effort on the part of the parents. The number of children under 5 years, however, who are protected against this serious disease is well below the safety level and every effort must be made to get this figure raised to at least 75%.

When we consider the number of infants being protected against smallpox, the position is much more alarming since only 18% of the children born during 1953 have been notified as having been vaccinated. I would again like to emphasize the importance of having this simple procedure carried out in infancy, when reactions are minimal, and protection is afforded early in life.

There were 20 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis and 1 case of non-pulmonary tuberculosis on the register as at the 31st December, 1953. This gives a rate of 2.48 cases of tuberculosis per 1,000 population as compared with 5.95 in 1952. The difference between these two rates is a result of the removal from the register of a number of persons who were written off as cured during the year or who had transferred to another district.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948.

Action was taken under Section 47 of the above Act in the case of two men who were living together and who were not receiving adequate care and attention. The removal was effected on an emergency order and accommodation was provided in a County Council Home for aged persons.

ENVIRONMENTAL HYGIENE.

Water Supplies.

Work proceeded throughout the year on the water distribution scheme which, when completed, will provide a piped supply for the entire district. It is hoped that the scheme will be completed early in 1954 and that most properties will be connected to the main before the end of that year. It will then be possible to close the existing shallow well supplies which are, of course, a constant threat to the health of the community.

Sewerage Disposal.

The disposal of sewerage from the main centres of population (Brompton and Romanby) is now satisfactory. The new treatment plant situated at Romanby is delivering an effluent of a very high standard, and has consequently improved the condition of the local water course which has been a continual nuisance for many years. There is now, of course, with the provision of a mains water supply, an urgent need for the provision of sewerage and sewage disposal works in the many villages throughout the district. It is appreciated that on economic grounds this is a problem which will have to be tackled in stages, and it is therefore important that a priority scheme should be drawn up, in order that a start can be made immediately in the villages where the problem is most acute.

Milk.

There are 9 registered retail milk sellers in the area, who are supervised by the Sanitary Inspectors.

Ice Cream.

There are no manufacturers of ice cream in the district but there are 13 registered dealers who are supervised to ensure that they comply with the Ice Cream Regulations.

Meat and Food.

All shops in the district dealing with food are visited regularly by the Sanitary Inspector and advice is given in an effort to improve the hygienic storage and handling of foodstuffs. Meat inspection throughout the year has continued at the abattoir at Northallerton where the slaughter of animals for the district is centralised this is a very satisfactory arrangement, and ensures a high standard of meat inspection.

As in previous reports your Sanitary Inspector has undertaken relief duties on meat inspection when required.

Factories and Workshops.

There are relatively few factories and workshops in the district but the important ones have been visited regularly with a view to improving the hygienic conditions. The full co-operation of the managements has been obtained when helpful criticism was offered.

Refuse Collection and Disposal.

The collection of refuse, which is weekly in the larger centres of population and fortnightly in the more scattered rural areas, is satisfactory but at times considerable strain has been imposed on the existing staff to maintain this service.

I can only repeat my previous comments regarding the tip at Yafforth Road. It is not a desirable tipping ground, and steps should be taken to acquire a new site.

Rodent Control.

The existing scheme of rodent control whereby a full time operator is shared with the Northallerton Urban Authority has worked satisfactorily during the year. Details of the work done will be found in the accompanying report of the Sanitary Inspector.

Rivers and Streams.

The pollution of water courses in the district remains as in previous reports except for the improvement following the completion of the Romanby Sewage disposal works. There is no liklihood of conditions improving in several areas until satisfactory sewage disposal schemes are provided.

Housing.

The building programme has continued during the year under review with the emphasis again laid on the provision of houses in the larger centres of population, notably Brompton and Romanby. It would appear that the demand for new houses in the purely agricultural areas has been nearly met, but it should be borne in mind, when planning future building programmes, that there are a considerable number of houses situated in the outlying villages which are unfit for human habitation and should be closed or demolished as soon as adequate provision can be made for re-housing the present occupants. It cannot be too strongly stressed the adverse effect sub-standard housing has on the physical and mental health of the occupants. I am convinced that a considerable percentage of the increase in psychoneurotic illness in recent years has inadequate housing conditions as a major contributory factor. A satisfactory house of one's own for every family in the district must be the target of the housing committee and only then can it afford to relax its efforts.

A small clearance area involving three terraced houses in the village of Brompton was ratified by the Ministry of Health during the year. This area has now been cleared.

Shops.

During the year, 26 routine inspections were made. There were 3 instances of contraventions or improvements effected.

Streams and Watercourses.

Streams have been cleansed at East Harlsey, Thrintoft, Mortonon-Swale and Appleton Wiske.

Rodent Control.

Consequent upon the passing of the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act 1949, the Rural and Urban Councils appointed a full-time Rodent Operator. He commenced duties in November, 1950, and divides his time equally between the two Authorities. Apart from dwelling houses, farms, and the Council's own property, *i.e.* refuse tips, sewers, and sewage works, treatments were carried out for British Railways. A free service is given to all private dwellings but a charge is made for any treatment executed on business premises.

Water Supplies.

Towards the end of the year under review, the District Water Scheme was practically completed. The whole of the mains and service reservoirs were adequately sterilized and steps were taken to induce potential consumers to make early connections to the Mains.

The Mains extension scheme to the Parish of Sowerby-under-Cotcliffe is expected to be completed early in 1954.

The following Table shows details of those Parishes with piped water supplies and, of course, shows very little variation of the position as it has existed for some years past. Future reports and the Tables accompanying should indicate a very different state of affairs as water mains are now reasonably available to all Parishes.

Refuse Collection and Disposal.

The Council continue to operate two Karrier refuse collection vehicles and although each village in the Rural Area is served by the vehicles, great difficulty is experienced at times in maintaining an adequate service. The time is rapidly approaching when the Council will have to consider operating an additional vehicle or alternatively experiment with one or other of the new types of appliances which are coming on to the market.

The tip at Yafforth Road, Northallerton, continues to be used but is far from satisfactory.

Milk and Ice-Cream (Heat Treatment) Regulations.

There were 9 registered milk-sellers in the area during the year. 22 inspections of premises were made.

There are 13 dealers in ice-cream registered by the Council, 4 Osmotherley, 3 Romanby, and 6 Brompton. 11 dealers sell prepacked products and 2 dealers bulk ice-cream, which is obtained from manufacturers in Northallerton. There are no manufacturers within the Rural area, 18 inspections were made.

Food Inspection.

The slaughter of animals for human consumption is centralised in Northallerton, and the Council's Sanitary Inspectors undertake relief duties at the abattoir when the Urban District Sanitary Inspector is away.

Drainage and Sewerage.

During the year, the settling tanks were emptied in the Parishes of Ainderby Steeple, Morton-on-Swale, Thrintoft, Yafforth, Danby Wiske, East Cowton, Great Smeaton, Hornby, West Rounton, Appleton Wiske, Welbury and Borrowby.

The tanks in Brompton were pumped off and cleansed twice during the year.

The Brompton Romanby Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme has been completed and is working satisfactorily.
