ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1954.

To the Chairman and Members of the Northallerton Rural District Council:

Mr. Chairman, Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report for the year 1954.

As you are aware, I was appointed Medical Officer of Health on January 1st, 1955, hence this report covers the work carried out by my predecessor, Dr. W. Sharpe.

The health of the district was satisfactory during the year under review. The birthrate and deathrate were very similar to the figures for England and Wales and whilst infantile mortality compared very favourably with the national figure (7.58 to 25.5) too much importance should not be attached to this because in a small community, the figures can vary widely from year to year without any special significance being attached to the variations.

Now that the water supply problem has been largely solved, the outstanding need of the district is for the provision of sewerage and sewage disposal works in many of the villages. The problem will become progressively more and more acute as the number of bathrooms and lavatories increase. As stressed by Dr. Sharpe, a priority scheme should be drawn up in order that a start can be made in those villages where the most unsatisfactory conditions exist.

The only other problem on which I should like to touch is that of housing. A considerable number of houses in the outlying villages are unfit for human habitation and steps should be taken to rehouse the occupants at the earliest opportunity.

It was not necessary to take action under Section 47 of the above Act which deals with the compulsory removal to a place of safety of persons in need of care and attention.

SECTION B. GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

The details of the staff are given at the beginning of the report.

Laboratory Facilities.

Laboratory facilities are provided at the Public Health Laboratory, The Friarage Hospital, Northallerton. Ambulance Facilities.

The North Riding of Yorkshire County Council supply ambulance services from their station in East Road, Northallerton.

Hospital Facilities

Local Hospital accommodation is provided in the area by the Northallerton Hospital Management Committee of the Newcastle Regional Hospital Board.

In addition a considerable number of residents in the area are treated in Darlington and Middlesbrough hospitals.

Nursing in the Homes.

The Home Nursing and Domiciliary Midwifery Service is under the general direction of the County Council with day to day administration dealt with by the Wensleydale Area Local Health Sub-Committee through the Area Medical Officer. The staff operating in the Northallerton Rural District comprises six District Nurse/ Midwives.

Domestic Help Service.

This is provided by the County Council, the day to day administration again being dealt with by the Area Sub-Committee through the Area Medical Officer. A whole-time equivalent of 1 8 homehelps was employed in the area and a total of 4,026 hours was worked during the year.

SECTION C.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES.

Water Supplies.

The water distribution scheme for the district was completed during the year. A table showing the progress made in connecting properties to the mains is to be found in the Sanitary Inspector's section.

Sewerage and Sewage disposal.

There has been no progress during the year in this sphere. As already stressed it is becoming imperative for a start to be made in providing schemes for villages in the rural areas.

SECTION D.

Housing.

Progress has been maintained during the year in the provision of new houses in the larger centres of population—notably at Romanby. However no headway has been made in dealing with the unfit houses in the area. Now that the housing survey is completed, a plan for eliminating this property should be drawn up.

Further details regarding housing are to be found in the Sanitary Inspector's section.

It will be seen from the above statistical table that there was no undue prevalance of any infectious disease during the year.

DIPHTHERIA AND SMALLPOX.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

The following figures relate to the immunisation state of the child population :—

Vaccination.

Of the children born during 1954, only 15% have been notified as having been vaccinated against smallpox.

I should like to repeat the warning given by Dr. Sharpe regarding the inadequate protection of the pre-school child against diptheria and smallpox.

The figure for the schools is very satisfactory, due of course to the fact that immunisation procedure is carried out at school and requires very little effort on the part of the parents. The number of children under 5 years, however, who are protected against this serious disease is well below the safety level and every effort must be made to get this figure raised to at least 75%.

When we consider the number of infants being protected against smallpox, the position is much more alarming since only 15% of the children born during 1954 have been notified as having been vaccinated. I would like to emphasize the importance of having this simple procedure carried out in infancy, when reactions are minimal, and protection is offered early in life.

There were 24 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis and 1 case of non-pulmonary tuberculosis on the register as at the 31st December, 1954. This gives a rate of 2.94 cases of tuberculosis per 1,000 population as compared with 2.48 in 1953.

Shops.

During the year 20 routine inspections were made. There were 21 instances of contraventions or improvements effected.

Streams and Watercourses.

Streams have been cleansed at East Harlsey, Thrintoft, Morton-on-Swale and Appleton Wiske.

Rodent Control.

Consequent upon the passing of the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949, the Rural and Urban Councils appointed a full-time Rodent Operator. He commenced duties in November, 1950, and divides his time equally between the two Authorities. Apart from dwelling houses, farms and the Council's own property, *i.e.* refuse tips, sewers, and sewage works, treatments were carried out for British Railways. A free service is given to all private dwellings but a charge is made for any treatment executed on business premises.

Water Supplies.

During December, 1954, the Council's District Water Scheme was completed and piped water became available to every village, and to the vast majority of the farms in this agricultural district. To encourage and assist householders in the various villages to lay services to their houses, the villages were surveyed and economical schemes for groups of houses were prepared and fixed price-rates arranged with plumbing contractors. Each contractor participating in the scheme was given a particular district; the arrangements worked smoothly, houses were connected to the mains at a fast rate, and the whole of the cost was borne by the benefiting householders.

23 Samples of water were taken during the year. 7 were satisfactory and 16 unsatisfactory.

Refuse Collection and Disposal.

The Council continue to operate two Karrier refuse collection vehicles. During the year, a modern end-loading appliance was obtained on loan from Messrs. Shelvoke & Drewry and a time-study and costings were made of its operation in the Council's area over a period of one week. This type of vehicle has a greatly increased carrying potential as against the orthdox type of side-loading appliance, and in view of the fact that extreme difficulty is experienced at times in maintaining an adequate service with the existing appliances, the Council are advised to sell their oldest Karrier Vehicle and acquire an appliance similar to the one referred to above. This would involve no increase in refuse-collecting personnel.

During the year, the refuse tip at Yafforth Road was re-shaped and re-graded with consequent improvement.

Milk and Ice Cream (Heat Treatment) Regulations.

There were 10 registered milk-sellers in the area during the year. 20 inspections of premises were made.

There are 13 dealers in ice-cream registered by the Council; 4 Osmotherley, 3 Romanby, and 6 Brompton. 11 dealers sell prepacked products and 2 dealers bulk ice-cream which is obtained from manufacturers in Northallerton. There are no manufacturers in the Rural Area. 14 Inspections were made.

Food Inspections.

With the discontinuance of Meat rationing and slaughtering by the Ministry of Food, arrangements were made to provide slaughtering facilities in the rural area. Negotiations took place with the owners of 5 of the pre-war slaughterhouses situate within the district and contingent upon the owners carrying out specified works the Council entered into agreements with the owners for 5 year leases, the occupiers of the slaughterhouses being appointed managers thereof. Scales of Charges for the use of the slaughterhouses and services provided therein have been fixed by the Council and full control is exercised by the local authority.

The slaughterhouses are situate at :-

Brompton Danby Wiske Morton-on-Swale Great Smeaton West Rounton

198 inspections were made in the period July to the end of the year and 1,724 lbs. of meat and/or offals were surrendered as unfit for human consumption.

Animals slaughtered in the period July to the end of the year were:

210 Beasts 9 calves 190 pigs 264 sheep

The quality of the animals killed in the rural area is very high.

Drainage and Sewerage.

During the year, the settling tanks were emptied in the Parishes of Ainderby Steeple, Morton-on-Swale, Thrintoft, Yafforth, Danby Wiske, East Cowton, Great Smeaton, Hornby, West Rounton, Appleton Wiske, Welbury and Brompton.

The houses on Northallerton Road, Brompton, have been disconnected from septic tanks and connected to the main sewerage system.

A small portable cesspool-emptying appliance has been purchased and this will enable cesspools to be emptied by direct labour without resource to contractors.
