

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1955.

To the Chairman and Members of the Northallerton Rural District Council :

Mr. Chairman, Gentleman,

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report on the Health of the District for the year 1955.

The birth-rate and the death rate were very similar to those for England and Wales at 16.4 per 1,000 population for the former and at 11.5 per 1,000 population for the latter. The infantile mortality rate (35.7 per 1,000 live births) was considerably above the national figure (24.9) but this is of no special significance in a small community.

With regard to the infectious diseases, there was an epidemic of measles during the year, but otherwise there was nothing worthy of comment.

The outstanding need is a programme to correlate the provision of sewerage and sewage disposal schemes with future housing and slum clearance in the district. I hope that next year I shall be able to report a real start on slum clearance. Most of this property comprises either individually unfit houses or groups of two or three houses. This being so, no drastic demolition schemes are required and it should be possible for this property to be eliminated without throwing much strain on the Council's resources.

In conclusion, I should like to express my gratitude to the Members and Officials of the Council for the help and support I have received from them during the year.

It was not necessary to take action under Section 47 of the above Act which gives the Council power to remove to suitable premises, persons who are not able to devote to themselves and are not receiving from other persons, adequate care and attention.

SECTION B.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

The details of the staff are given at the beginning of the report. Laboratory Facilities.

Laboratory facilities are provided at the Public Health Laboratory, The Friarage Hospital, Northallerton.

Ambulances Facilities.

The North Riding of Yorkshire County Council supply ambulance services from their station in East Road, Northallerton.

Hospital Facilities.

Local Hospital accommodation is provided in the area by the Northallerton Hospital Management Committee of the Newcastle Regional Hospital Board.

In addition a considerable number of residents in the area are treated in Darlington and Middlesbrough hospitals.

Nursing in the Homes.

The Home Nursing and Domiciliary Midwifery Service is under the general direction of the County Council with day to day administration dealt with by the Wensleydale Area Local Health Sub-Committee through the Area Medical Officer. The staff operating in the Northallerton Rural District comprises five District Nurse/Midwives and one health visitor.

Domestic Help Service.

This is provided by the County Council, the day to day administration again being dealt with by the Area Sub-Committee through the Area Medical Officer. A whole-time equivalent of 1.4 homehelps was employed in the area and a total of 3,108 hours was worked during the year.

SECTION C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES.

Water Supplies.

Progress continued throughout the year in connecting properties to the Council's mains, though naturally at a much slower rate than formerly. A table showing this progress is to be found in the Sanitary Inspector's Section.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal.

This is one of the outstanding public health problems in the district. No progress was made during the year and conditions in the villages tend to deteriorate as more and more houses come on to a piped water supply. Whilst agreeing that Appleton Wiske presents the greatest health hazard, it is essential in my opinion that a programme should be drawn up showing which villages are to have priority. This priority should be related to future housing needs of the district and with the present day trend towards depopulation of rural areas, those villages on the main lines of communication seem the obvious places for development.

Housing.

This presents the other major problem in the district. There are approximately 126 unfit houses in the district and the only progress to report during the year, was the representation of a small clearance area in Brompton comprising two houses. The programme of slum clearance should be related to the Council's housing programme which in turn is intimately connected with the provision of sewerage and sewage disposal schemes.

SECTION E.

The Food and Drugs Act, 1955, consolidated previous legislation relating to Food and Drugs, under this Act, the Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955, were made and these are to become effective from January 1st, 1956. These regulations enable the standard of food hygiene to be considerably improved.

Details of meat inspection, etc., are to be found in the Sanitary Inspector's section.

The measles epidemic in the period April to July was the prominent feature. The four cases of food poisoning occurred amongst the members of one family and no special comment is necessary.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

The following figures indicate the immunisation state of the child population in the district :--

Smallpox Vaccination.

28% of the children born during the year were notified as having been vaccinated against smallpox (15% in 1954).

The figure for diphtheria immunisation in the pre-school group is still not satisfactory and every effort must be made to increase the number of children immunised in this age-group. Ideally this should be done in the first year of life and parents are strongly urged to have this done either by their own doctor or at the local child welfare clinic.

Although the rate for vaccination has improved the percentage is still much too low. Reactions to vaccination are minimal in the first few months of life, and parents are asked to consult their own doctors about having their children vaccinated when about two or three months old.

TUBERCULOSIS.

There were 24 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis and no cases of non-pulmonary tuberculosis on the register as at the 31st December, 1955. This gives a rate of 2.82 cases of tuberculosis per 1,000 population as compared with 2.94 in 1954.

Housing Act, 1949. Improvement Grants.

During the year the Council decided to implement the Provisions of the above Act whereby financial assistance can be made out of Pubic Funds to owners of dwelling houses effecting suitable and defined improvements.

By the end of the year 51 applications were approved amounting to a total monetary value of $\pounds 10,200$. Three quarters of the money is made available by the Treasury and the remaining quarter out of the local Rate Fund.

Shops.

During the year 26 routine inspections were made. There were 8 instances of contraventions or improvements effected.

Streams and Watercourses.

Streams have been cleansed at Ainderby, Thrintoft, Morton-on-Swale, Appleton Wiske, Great Langton and Danby Wiske.

Rodent Control.

Since the passing of the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949, the Rural and Urban Councils have employed a full-time Rodent Operator, his time being shared equally between the two Authorities.

Dwelling houses are treated as a free service but a charge is made for treatment executed on farms and business premises.

It may be in the future that the Council will need to give consideration to the re-organisation of this service to provide better results.

Refuse Collection and Disposal.

The Council continue to operate two Karrier refuse collection vehicles. There are times, due to the new houses now erected, that extreme difficulty is experienced in maintaining an adequate service with the existing appliances and staff. The Council will need to give consideration to the re-organisation of this service.

Although the refuse tip at Yafforth Road was re-shaped during the year tipping space is becoming limited and the Council will, in the near future, need to acquire an alternative site.

Milk and Ice Cream (Heat Treatment) Regulations.

There were 10 registered milk-sellers in the area during the year. 12 inspections of premises were made.

There are 13 dealers in ice-cream registered by the Council; 4 Osmotherley, 3 Romanby and 6 Brompton. 11 dealers sell prepacked products and 2 dealers bulk ice-cream which is obtained from manufacturers in Northallerton. There are no manufacturers in the Rural area, 9 inspections were made.

Food Inspections.

Five privately owned slaughterhouses are leased to the Council on a 5 year lease, the occupiers being the Managers thereof. Scales of Charges for the use of the Slaughterhouses and sevices provided therein have been fixed by the Council and full control is exercised by the Local Authority.

The slaughterhouses are situate at :---

Brompton Danby Wiske Morton-on-Swale Great Smeaton West Rounton

Animals slaughtered in the year :---

444 Beasts 10 Calves 367 Pigs 679 Sheep

404 inspections were made during the year and 664 lbs. of meat and/or offals were surrendered as unfit for human consumption.

The quality of the animals killed in the rural area is very high, and evidence of tuberculosis was rarely found.

Drainage and Sewerage.

The Council possess a small portable cesspool emptying appliance and during the year settling tanks were cleaned out in all the villages.

Private septic tanks are also cleaned out on application, the cost of which service is recovered.




Swimming Baths and Pools.
