ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1957.

To the Chairman and Members of the Northallerton Rural District Council:

Mr. Chairman, Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report on the health of the district for the year 1957.

The vital statistics for the district are very similar to those for England and Wales with the exception of the stillbirth rate which is considerably higher. Whilst year to year fluctuations of vital statistics in small populations are to be expected, the following is significant. The infantile mortality rate in England and Wales has fallen in the last ten years from 34 to 23 per 1,000 livebirths but in the same period the stillbirth rate has remained virtually unchanged; a challenge to the medical services of this country.

The attention of the Council is now turning away from water supplies and is being focussed on sewerage and sewage disposal in the outlying villages. Slow but steady progress has been maintained during the year.

The rate at which the unfit houses in the area are demolished, closed or converted to other uses is slowly improving. 6 houses were dealt with during the year and it is hoped to increase this figure next year.

In conclusion, I should like to express my appreciation to the Members and Officials of the Council for the help and support I have received from them during the year.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948.

Action was taken in two cases under Section 47 of the above Act which gives the Council power to remove to suitable premises, persons who are not able to devote to themselves and are not receiving from other persons, adequate care and attention. Both cases were in the aged and chronic sick category and both were removed into hospital.

SECTION B.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICE IN THE AREA.

The details of the staff are given at the beginning of the report.

Laboratories Facilities.

Laboratory facilities are provided at the Public Health Laboratory, The Friarage Hospital, Northallerton.

Ambulances Facilities.

The North Riding of Yorkshire County Council supply ambulance services from their station in Brompton Road, Northallerton.

Hospital Facilities.

Local Hospital accommodation is provided in the area by the Northallerton Hospital Management Committee of the Newcastle Regional Hospital Board.

In addition a considerable number of residents in the area are treated in Darlington and Middlesbrough hospitals.

Nursing in the Homes.

The Home Nursing and Domiciliary Midwifery Service is under the general direction of the County Council with day to day administration dealt with by the Wensleydale Area Local Health Sub-Committee through the Area Medical Officer. The staff operating in the Northallerton Rural District comprises five District Nurse/Midwives and one health visitor.

Domestic Help Service.

This is provided by the County Council, the day to day administration again being dealt with by the Area Sub-Committee through the Area Medical Officer. A whole-time equivalent of 0.99 homehelps was employed in the area and a total of 2,260 hours was worked during the year assisting 15 households.

SECTION C.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES.

Water Supplies.

Details are to be found in the Public Health Inspector's Section.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal.

Slow progress was made during the year on the proposed scheme for Appleton Wiske. Certain objections to the suggested site for the works will necessitate an inquiry. Schemes for Ainderby and Morton-on-Swale, East Cowton and Borrowby are being prepared by the consultant engineer. Complaints regarding the drainage at Great Smeaton and their subsequent investigation indicate that a sewerage and sewage disposal scheme is required in this village as soon as practicable.

Refuse Collection and Disposal.

Details are to be found in the Public Health Inspector's Section.

SECTION D.

Housing.

No houses were completed by the Council during the year and only limited number planned for 1958. Of the unfit houses in the district, 6 were either demolished, closed or converted to uses other than housing. It is hoped that it will be possible to report a speeding up of slum clearance in next year's report.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

The following figures indicate the immunisation state of the child population in the area of the Wensleydale Local Health Sub-Committee in which the Northallerton Rural District is included.

Age Group	Immunised
0-4 years	53%
5-14 years	91%

The percentage immunised in the pre-school group could be raised with advantage and every effort must be made to increase the number of children immunised in this group. Ideally this should be done in the first year of life and parents are strongly urged to have this done either by their own doctor or at the local child welfare clinic.

Smallpox Vaccination.

31% of the children born during the year have been vaccinated against

smallpox (38% in 1956).

The rate of smallpox vaccination is still too low. Reactions to vaccination are minimal in the first few months of life and parents are asked to consult their own doctor about having their children vaccinated when about two or three months old.

Poliomyelitis Vaccination.

Poliomyelitis vaccination proceeded steadily throughout the year. The comparatively slow rate at which children were vaccinated was due to the uncertain delivery of vaccine often in very small amounts. However by the end of the year some 31% of all children aged under 15 years in the Wensleydale Local Health Area (of which the Northallerton Rural District is part) had been vaccinated with two injections.

It is anticipated that this figure will be doubled by the end of 1958.

There were 24 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis and no cases of non-pulmonary tuberculosis on the register as at the 31st December, 1957. This gives a rate of 2.80 cases of tuberculosis per 1,000 population as compared with 2.80 in 1956.

Housing Act, 1949, Improvement Grants.

The Council implement the provision of the above Act whereby financial assistance can be made out of Public Funds to owners of dwelling houses effecting suitable defined improvements.

During the year 66 applications were approved amounting to a total monetary value of £13,494. Threequarters of the money is made available by the Treasury and the remaining quarter out of the local Rate Fund.

Streams and Watercourses.

Streams have been cleansed at Thrintoft, Morton-on-Swale, Appleton Wiske and East Cowton.

Rodent Control.

The Council employ a part-time operator.

During the year a large number of farm properties in the area were surveyed and most of the area has now been inspected. Dwelling houses are treated as a free service but a charge is made for treatment executed on farms and business premises.

The amount of £79 17s. 8d. was recovered in respect of treatments carried out at 25 farms.

A comprehensive piped water system of approximately 90 miles of water mains covers the whole area.

During the year the following new supplies were installed :-

An extension to the Council's Area Distribution Scheme was completed during the year for the Parish of West Harlsey. The extension was primarily to serve the needs of agriculture and involved the laying of approximately 4,600 lin. yards of asbestos cement pipes 3" diam. together with incidental fittings.

The final cost of the scheme, less fire hydrants, was £4,456 10s. 8d. and a grant of £1,200 has been promised by the Ministry of Housing and Local Government; also capital contributions are being made by the farmers concerned.

Refuse Collection and Disposal.

The Council continue to operate two Karrier refuse collection vehicles. There are times, due to the new houses now erected, that extreme difficulty is experienced in maintaining an adequate service with the existing appliances and staff. The Council will need to give consideration to the re-organisation of this service.

Although the refuse tip at Yafforth Road was re-shaped during the year tipping space is becoming limited and the Council will, in the near future, need to acquire an alternative site.

Food Hygiene Regulations.

42 inspections were carried out at food premises. The conditions generally were found to be good. 9 informal notices were served, mostly for the provision of a hot water supply. The majority of these notices have been complied with.

Licenced Premises. Total 27.

Following joint consultations between the Licensing Justices and the Local Authority the majority of the Licenced Premises have now been brought up to the necessary standard.

Meat Inspections.

Five privately owned slaughterhouses are leased to the Council on a 2 year lease, the occupiers being the Managers thereof. Scales of Charges for the use of the Slaughterhouses and services provided therein have been fixed by the Council and full control is exercised by the Local Authority.

The slaughterhouses are situate at :-

Brompton Danby Wiske Morton-on-Swale Great Smeaton West Rounton

During the year 1957 the following animals were killed in the five slaughterhouses, and this also includes casualty animals inspected on farms. 382 inspections were carried out.

505 beasts. 482 pigs. 1,173 sheep. 6 calves.

Meat Condemned.

11 cwts. 10 st.

Tuberculosis was found in 2 beasts representing 4% of total inspected. and ,, 2 pigs ,, 42% ,,

111 tins of food were condemned, mostly at the Cold Store, Romanby, a total weight of 4 st. 2 lbs.

The condemned meat is stained and removed to the local Knackers Yard for rendering and the recovery of non-edible fats.

Drainage and Sewerage.

The Council possess a small portable cesspool emptying appliance and during the year settling tanks were cleaned out in all the villages.

Private septic tanks are also cleaned out on application, the cost of which service is recovered. 20 private tanks were dealt with during the year and a total of 179 hours were worked on same.
