

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1962

To the Chairman and Members of the Northallerton Rural District Council:

Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen.

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report on the health of the district for the year 1962.

In 1962 the state of Public Health in the Northallerton Rural District was very satisfactory. The vital statistics compare very favourably with those for England and Wales and do not call for any special comment.

During the year, progress made towards providing the villages in the area with sewerage and sewage disposal facilities has continued to be slow owing to statutory difficulties concerned with the disposal of farm wastes pending the application of the provisions of the Public Health Act, 1961 These difficulties are now being sorted out and an early start is expected in providing a scheme for Ainderby, Morton, Thrintoft, and others will follow.

There is not a high proportion of unfit houses in the district. 8 houses were either closed, demolished, or converted to other uses. Most of the unfit houses are occupied by aged persons and the provision of suitable housing for these people is proceeding. During the year 83 houses deemed unfit have been brought up to satisfactory standards.

In conclusion, I should like to express my appreciation to the Members and Officials of the Council for the help and support I have received from them during the year.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948.

One female was removed under the 1951 Amendment of Section 47 of the above Act which gives the Council power to remove to suitable premises persons who are not able to devote to themselves, and are not receiving from other persons, adequate care and attention and voluntarily stayed in accommodation where she could be adequately cared for.

Laboratories Facilities.

Laboratories facilities are provided at the Public Health Laboratory, The Friarage Hospital, Northallerton.

Ambulance Facilities.

The North Riding of Yorkshire County Council supply ambulance services from their station in Brompton Road, Northallerton.

Hospital Facilities.

Local Hospital accommodation is provided in the area by the Northallerton Hospital Management Committee of the Newcastle Regional Hospital Board.

In addition a considerable number of residents in the area are treated in Darlington and Middlesbrough hospitals.

Nursing in the Homes.

The Home Nursing and Domiciliary Midwifery Service is under the general direction of the County Council with day to day administration dealt with by the Wensleydale Area Local Health Sub-Committee through the Area Medical Officer. The staff operating in the Northallerton Rural District comprises five District Nurse/Midwives and one health visitor.

Domestic Help Service.

This is provided by the County Council, the day to day administration again being dealt with by the Area Sub-Committee through the Area Medical Officer.

Since a good proportion of the old people in the district live in unfit houses, the building of bungalows might well be the best method of rehousing and at the same time of dealing with the unfit houses.

Vaccination and Immunisation.

The following figures indicate the immunisation state of the child population in the area of the Wensleydale Local Health Sub-Committee in which the Northallerton Rural District is included.

Age Group	Immunised
0-4 years	49%

Again, although it is pleasing to see that a considerable number of children have received a booster dose against diphtheria before starting school, it is distressing to find that a number of parents will not allow their children to be immunised at this age. Most of these children were never protected against diphtheria in infancy. Several outbreaks of diphtheria have recently been reported from different parts of the country. Parents should remember that although poliomyelitis has stolen the limelight in recent years, diphtheria can recur at any time with all the dangers and complications that were commonplace twenty years ago.

Smallpox Vaccination.

61% of the children born in the Wensleydale Local Health Area during the year have been vaccinated against smallpox (66% in 1961).

The rate of smallpox vaccination is improving. Reactions to vaccination are minimal in the first year of life and parents are asked to consult their own doctor about having their children vaccinated at that age.

Poliomyelitis Vaccination.

By the end of the year, 8,506 children aged under 15 years in the Wensleydale Local Health Area (of which the Northallerton Rural District is part) had been vaccinated with two injections. This figure represents some 94% of all children under 15 years of age compared with 89% in 1961.

In addition some 3,991 older persons had also received two injections and 10,764 children and adults had received a third injection.

There were 13 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis and 4 cases of non-pulmonary tuberculosis on the register as at the 31st December, 1962. This gives a rate of 1.9 cases of tuberculosis per 1,000 population as compared with 1.61 in 1961.

Housing Acts. Improvement Grants.

During the year, 26 'Discretionary' grants were approved amounting to an estimated value of £11,207 and 15 'Standard' grants amounting to an estimated value of £1,845. Three-quarters of the money spent on these grants is made available by the Treasury and the remaining quarter out of the local Rate Fund.

Streams and Watercourses.

Streams have been cleansed at Great Smeaton, Morton-on-Swale, Thrintoft and East Cowton.

As mentioned in previous reports, there is a continuing incidence of pollution of streams throughout the area and no marked improvement can be expected until sewage disposal schemes have been provided for the villages. The waste from farms, both in and out of the villages, play a large part in polluting conditions as such wastes are stronger than sewage from humans.

Rodent Control.

In exercise of their responsibilities under the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949, the Council employ a full-time operator.

Dwelling houses may receive a free service for the eradication of rats and mice, but not farms and business premises. The services of the operator are available to farmers, etc., on either a contract or casual basis.

During 1962, 12 months contracts were secured in respect of 64 farms. The total value of the contracts was £442. The highest contract was £12, and the lowest £3: the average contract figure being £6 18s. $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.

Casual treatments were carried out at 12 premises involving $39\frac{1}{2}$ hours at a total recoverable cost of £24 13s. 9d.

Water Supplies.

The Council's distribution scheme comprises some 89 miles of spun cast iron mains, two main service reservoirs of 400,000 and 200,000 galls. respectively, two high level tanks with ancillary pumping stations, and one water tower. Water is taken from the headworks and filter plant of the Northallerton and District Water Board on which authority the Council have equal representation with the Northallerton Urban District Council. The water supplied is pressure filtered and chlorinated, and is of a high degree of purity.

The Council supply water to the whole of their area with the exception of the Parishes of Brompton and Romanby which are within the statutory area of supply of the Northallerton Urban District Council. Some properties in Thimbleby and Kirby Sigston take a supply from the trunk main of the Urban District Council.

3 Samples of water were taken for bacteriological examination of which 2 proved to be unsatisfactory. 2 were in respect of private supplies and 1 from mains supply.

An adequate supply of water was maintained throughout the year with no restrictions whatsoever; indeed, this happy state of affairs has continued throughout the ten years since the district water scheme was completed. Furthermore, the Council were able to make water available to the Stokesley R.D.C. and the Bedale R.D.C. to augment their supplies.

Refuse Collection and Disposal.

The Council operate 2 refuse collection vehicles *i.e.* S.D. Fore and Aft Tipper 16/18 cubic yards capacity with diesel engine and Karrier Side Loader 12 cubic yard capacity with diesel engine. A weekly collection of bins and pans is made in every village throughout the area. All refuse is tipped at the Council's central tip in Yafforth Road. Bulk fuel is purchased by the Council with resultant economy.

The service has operated effectively and complaints from the public are virtually unknown. I must warn the Council, however, that properties continue to increase year by year and it will soon be necessary to review manpower arrangements.

It is a matter for regret that so much conbustible material, principally paper, has to be collected from householders. This material could be burnt by individuals with very little inconvenience and so facilitate collection and disposal with consequent economy.

The total weight of meat and offal condemned was 2 cwts. 50 lbs. In addition 45 tins of food (mainly corned beef) were condemned—principally at the Cold Store, Romanby—the total weight being 15st. 4 lbs.

All condemned meat is stained and removed to the premises of approved firms for rendering and the recovery of non edible fats and oils.

Drainage and Sewerage.

The most outstanding problem in the field of environmental sanitation continues to be the lack of proper sewerage and sewage-treatment facilities in the great majority of villages throughout the area. I must re-iterate the necessity of securing proper sewers and sewage works. It is appreciated that some delay has ensued recently in making a start on schemes through changes in legislation regarding the acceptance and treatment of farm wastes. It is now hoped, even though expenditure will be considerable, the Council will face the challenge with the same imagination and financial courage as was applied to the district water scheme.

The Council possess a small portable cesspool emptying appliance and settling tanks in the villages are cleaned out twice yearly or, in some cases, more frequently if circumstances warrant. In addition, private septic tanks are cleaned out on request and for which a charge is made. During the year, 36 private tanks received attention involving 46 working hours. The sum recovered was £40 13s. 2d. 38 village settling tanks were cleaned on two occasions during the year.
