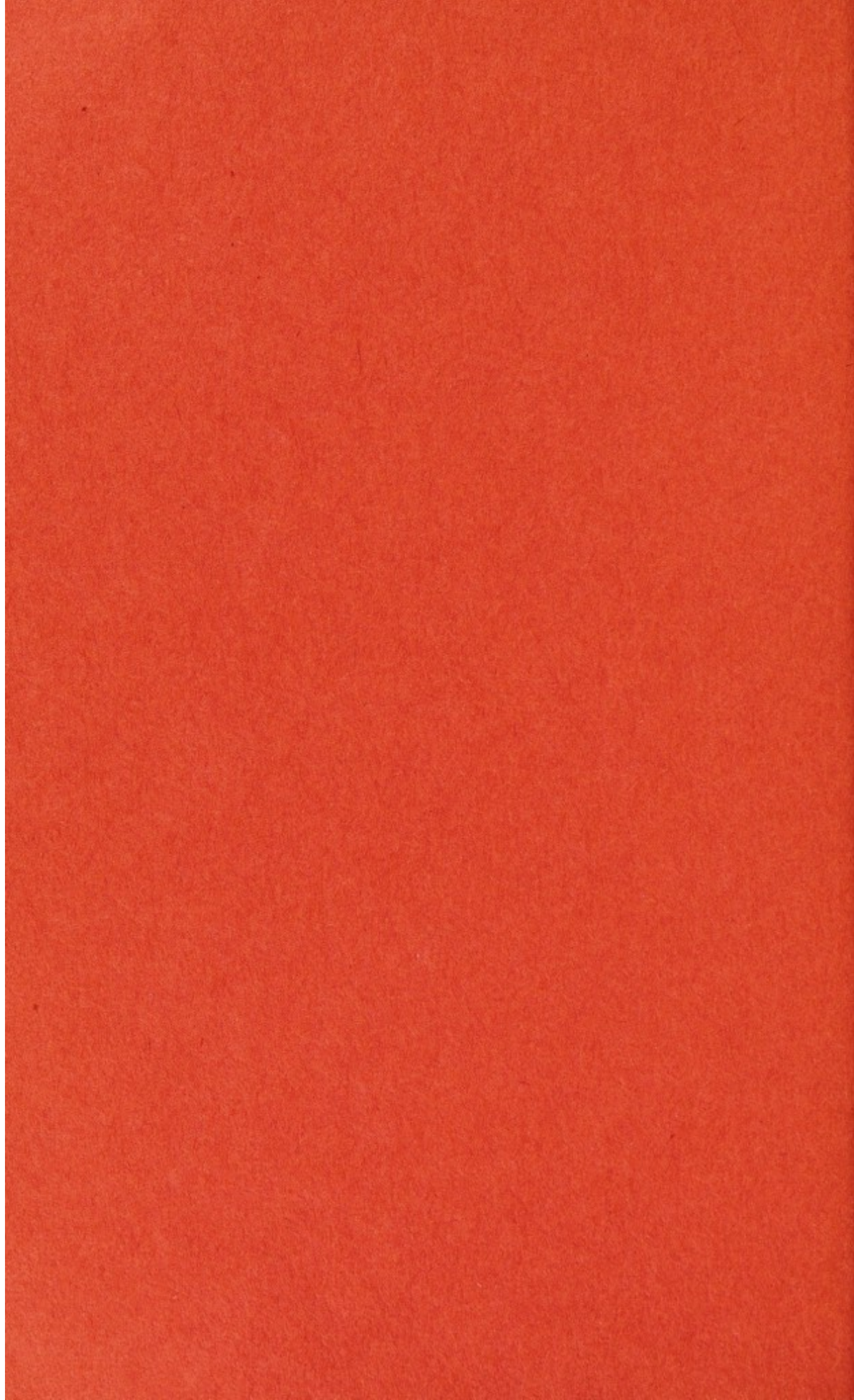

Laboratory Facilities. Laboratory Facilities are provided by the Hospital Laboratory, Friarage Hospital, Northallerton.

Ambulance Facilities.

Housing Acts. Improvement Grants

The 1971 Housing Act, which came into force on the 23rd June, 1971, increased the maximum grant from 50% to 75% of the cost and the Standard Grant to £300. 138 Grants (Discretionary) were approved amounting to a total of £156,194.00. 22 Standard Grants amounting to a total of £6,599.50. 90% of the money spent on these grants is made available by the Treasury and the remaining 10% out of the local Rate Fund.

The improvement of the 56 Pre-war Council Houses and the scheme for the central heating of 97 Aged Persons Bungalows was nearing completion at the end of 1973.

Qualification Certificates (1972)

The Housing Act, 1969 also introduced Qualification Certificates which enable a landlord to apply to a local authority for a Certificate stating that the house is in a satisfactory state of repair and provided with all the amenities. The issue of such a Certificate enables the landlord to approach the Rent Officer with a view to having rent decontrolled and hence increased.

Streams and Watereourses

Streams have been cleansed at Morton-on-Swale, East Cowton, Thrintoft, Thornton-le-Beans and Welbury.

The Council have now virtually provided schemes of sewerage and sewage disposal for all the villages and there should not be minimal risk of pollution of streams by settlements. It is, however, fair to state that sewage disposal works at East Cowton and Appleton Wiske require improvements owing to the rapid expansion in these villages.

The economics of the agricultural industry may dictate a growing intensification with consequent heavy disposals and it is a problem which cannot be ignored.

Rodent Control.

In exercise of their responsibilities under the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949, the Council employ a full-time operator.

Dwelling houses may receive a free service for the eradication of rats and mice, but not farms and business premises. The services of the operator are available to farmers, etc., on either a contract or casual basis.

During 1973, 12 months contracts were secured in respect of 71 farms. The total value of the contracts was £543.35. The highest contract was £18.90, and the lowest £3 : the average contract figure being £7.65.

Water Supplies.

Piped water is supplied throughout the area by the Northallerton and The Dales Water Board. The water is pressure-filtered, chlorinated, and is of a high degree of purity.

- (a) Throughout the year the water supply for the area was satisfactory both in quality and in quantity ; the latter only so far as essential use is concerned. Boreholes at Ainderby Steeple were brought into use to augment the supply.

(b) Any contamination of the supply was dealt with by extra chlorination and flushing of the mains.

6 chemical analysis was made during the year and proved satisfactory.

Refuse Collection and Disposal

An incentive bonus scheme was introduced in June, 1972 which resulted in the reduction of the vehicles from three to two and the number of men employed from 11 to 8.

The Council now run two Shelvoke and Drewery 35 cu. yd. Fore and Aft Tippers operated by 2 loader drivers and 5 collectors.

A weekly collection of bins and pans is made from all but the very isolated properties and tipped at the Council's central tip in Yafforth Road where a tractor driver is employed.

Apart from a few initial collection troubles the new system is working satisfactorily.

The total weight of meat and offal condemned was 226 lbs. Carcasses affected with *Cysticercus Bovis* from other areas are held at the Cold Store, Romanby for compulsory freezing as per Meat Inspection Regulations.

The Meat (Sterilization) Regulations, 1969 (came into force in November, 1969), and these replace previous legislation and require all unfit meat to be sterilized before removal from the slaughterhouse. The only exemption from these Regulations is for unfit meat in transit to a processor or zoo etc., and it must be in locked containers bearing the words—"MEAT UNFIT FOR HUMAN CONSUMPTION" or similar.

A 100% meat inspection service is carried out by your officers and the slaughter-houses are maintained very satisfactorily.

Swimming Baths and Pools.

There are none within the rural area to which the public have access. There are three private swimming pools : 1 at Osmotherley, 1 at Great Smeaton and 1 at Welbury.

In conclusion of this my 33rd Annual Report and my last one, I should like to express my appreciation of the support which has been given to me over the years by members of the Council, my fellow Officials, and members of the outside manual staff.

In June, 1941, when I was appointed, I was the only full-time officer of the Council and the outside manual staff consisted of one labourer. The refuse collection service was by way of annual contracts with farmers in the villages who provided their own labour and horse-drawn vehicles. Mains water services existed only in the villages of Brompton, Romanby, Osmotherley West Rounton and Nether Silton.

The village of Osmotherley was the only one which possessed a recognisable sewage disposal system.

The Council possessed 50 houses only. It may well be, (albeit in a small way), the Council were the first rural authority in the North Riding to build two bungalows for aged persons.

Street lighting outside the villages of Brompton, Romanby, Osmotherley and East Harlsey was virtually non-existent.

The Council are to be congratulated that, in handing over to the successor authority, they have furnished their area with modern essential sanitary services and should be rightfully proud of their stewardship.
