To The Chairman and Members of the Committee for Education, Nuneaton:

Madam Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit to you the Annual Report on the School Health Service for the year 1950.

The general health of the school children remained good, though an epidemic of measles and the seasonal prevalence of other infectious diseases interrupted their attendance at school.

The total number of children seen at Medical Inspections was 6,503, almost exactly the same as the previous year; the majority of these inspections were of children in the prescribed age groups, since a large deficit from the previous year was outstanding, and while this was worked-off during the year it automatically reduced the number of special inspections, which are mostly follow-up examinations.

The general condition of pupils inspected is estimated to have improved considerably since last year and the one before, but there have been many changes of staff which render this

arbitrary assessment liable to criticism.

The proportion of pupils found to have some defect is smaller on the average, and this improvement is accounted for by the younger children only, the third age group being a little worse than last year.

In view of the changes of staff, and diminished numbers during the earlier part of the year, it is gratifying to be able to report that not only was this total number of inspections achieved, but also more pupils were inspected per session than in 1949.

The school clinics for minor ailments and dental treatment, and indeed most of the consultative clinics, have been attended by many more pupils than in 1949, the figures being in many cases comparable to those for 1948. It is probable that the exceptionally fine weather in 1949 accounted for much of this fluctuation.

Certain facilities, such as Speech Therapy, have been expanded during the last few years, but in spite of this there is the most striking contrast between attendances at clinics before and after 1948—the medical clinics have doubled and the dental clinics been quartered—which can hardly fail to be at least partly related to the National Health Service Act, 1946, coming into operation in 1948.

I wish to thank all members of the staff for their willing services during the year, and am most grateful to you, Madam Chairman, your predecessor, the late Alderman W. T. Smith, and members of your committee for many kindnesses.

REPORT BY DR. SYLVIA REID ON THE WORK AT THE CHILD GUIDANCE, RIVERSLEY PARK, CLINIC

1950

During the year 1950 we moved into the new Child Guidance Clinic premises at Riversley Park. We have excellent facilities in the new playroom and the rooms for individual interview and treatment are free from the disturbance of the playrooms. We are very pleased that a drain has been put in at one end of the room, since it is essential that the children indulge in waterplay.

We are again fortunate in having the services of another Australian psychologist—Miss Joan Cooper—who is of invaluable assistance in taking charge of the playroom.

We also have a new psychiatric social worker in Mrs. Iris Stuart-Taylor, who joined our staff on the 16th October, 1950.

It is of great advantage to have the children's homes visited before they attend the clinic, and it is due to Mrs. I. Stuart-Taylor and her predecessor, Mrs. Joan Williams, that we get excellent co-operation from the majority of the children's parents.

I am sorry to report that my own association with this clinic comes to an end next month, and would like to take this opportunity of thanking Dr. Kershaw for his co-operation and help during the time I have worked at this clinic. The School and Mental Health Services are always most courteous and helpful.
