Annual Report on the Health of the Area during 1967

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

I beg to present, herewith, the Annual Report on the Health of the Borough during 1967, drawn up in accordance with the requirements of the Ministry of Health Circular 1/68 dated January, 1968. Included in the Report is the report of your Public Health Inspector and Surveyor.

There have been three amenities added to those already existing in the Borough i.e. the opening of the new very fine swimming pool, the inauguration of the highly successful Meals-on-Wheels Service operated by the Women's Royal Voluntary Service, and the commencement of the Cervical Cytology Clinic in the Health Centre for the early detection of cervical cancer.

On the other hand, no progress has been made towards the provision of an adequate modern Sewage Disposal Works, as I considered it an inauspicious time to press the Ministry (on Public Health grounds) for this, in view of the economic situation prevailing. This matter will be pursued as soon as the time is ripe for success. Also there was cause for complaint regarding the refuse tip, particularly at the time of the foot and mouth disease epidemic in other parts of the country. This instigated the burning of the tip which has been a satisfactory solution to the problem. In passing it may be noted that this refuse tip would be in the catchment area if a reservoir should be situated at Gorhuish.

The estimated population mid-year was the same as in 1966 i.e. remains static. The Standardised Birth Rate of 14.2 per 1,000 population is lower than last year's (17.8) and than the National Rate of 17.2. However, the Standardised Death Rate of 11.2 per 1,000 population is lower than that of 1966 (11.7) and is the same as the National Rate of 11.2. As expected, the majority of deaths (27 out of 64) were due to cardio-vascular diseases.

Relatively few Infectious Diseases were notified, measles being the most prevalent, and there were no cases of poliomyelitis, diphtheria or food poisoning.

You are to be congratulated on your efforts to bring to the notice of the public (including Youth organisations) the dangers of 'Exposure on Dartmoor' by purchasing the leaflet 'Exposure' B.M.C. 380, 1964, for distribution to hotels, etc., and exhibition on notice boards, following the death from exposure of a boy Cadet on Dartmoor. Unfortunately, this was followed by two more deaths from exposure occurring in Cadet Officers later in the year.

The general health of the Borough has been good during 1967.

Finally, I should like to thank the Mayor, Aldermen, Councillors and Staff, for their continued consideration and support.

SECTION 'B'

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES

1. Hospitals

There are two hospitals in the town, The Memorial Hospital (including maternity beds) and the Castle Hospital (for chronic sick and Geriatric cases). Both of these serve the town and also the large rural area outside the town.

2. County Council Health Services

Under the National Health Service Act, 1946, the County Council provides the following services (based largely on the Okehampton Health Centre (Okehampton 731) in the grounds of the Memorial Hospital, also providing accommodation for the General Practitioners in the town):

Domiciliary Midwifery, Home nursing, Health Visitors, supervisory care of expectant and nursing mothers and children under five, School Medical Service, Home Help Services, Chiropody, Occupation Therapy, Speech Therapy, Dental service for children up to school leaving age, expectant and nursing mothers; Mental Health Service, Vaccination and immunisation procedures. A Cervical Cytology Clinic for early detection of cervical cancer was started during 1967.

The Ambulance Service is run under delegated powers by the St. John's Ambulance Brigade, providing a 24 hour cover for the whole district.

3. Meals on Wheels

This service was inaugurated in early 1967 by the W.R.V.S. and during this time 1,850 meals were served to 43 people (3 husbands and wives, 6 men and 34 women). At present meals cooked in a mobile kitchen are delivered twice a week on Tuesdays and Thursdays. It is hoped that if better kitchen facilities can be made available the service may be extended during 1968 to possibly Folly Gate, North Tawton, Hatherleigh and Bridestowe.

5. Laboratory Services

Bacteriological examinations of specimens and of samples of milk, water ice cream, etc., are carried out at the Public Health Laboratory at Exeter, and any chemical analyses by the Public Analyst at Exeter.

6. Health Centre, Okehampton

In addition to the Services mentioned in 2 above, the Orthopaedic Clinic is held each Monday on the premises.

7. Mass Radiography Unit

The Unit continues to visit every other week, as advertised in the local press. 396 persons attended for Chest X-Rays as follows:

SECTION 'C'

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

Water Supply Sources

Mr. E. A. Robb, the Chief Engineer of the North Devon Water Board, has supplied the following information of his Board's progress during the year:

OKEHAMPTON BOROUGH

The supply for the Borough is obtained from Black-a-Ven and Red-a-Ven intakes with treatment at Brackentor Works for the central and western areas, and from Taw marsh with treatment at Belstone Works for the eastern area of the Borough. During times of low yield from the Taw marsh source, it has been found necessary to serve the whole Borough from Brackentor works.

Several mains renewals were carried out and distribution mains laid to

the new developments which have now been erected.

Work has proceeded on restoring the distribution system which is now on

a satisfactory footing.

Chemical and bacteriological samples have been taken throughout the period and were satisfactory at all times.

Sewerage

The end of the year finds the Borough still not provided with a modern means of sewage disposal and in view of the current restriction on capital expenditure it is difficult to foresee any progress in this direction within the near future.

In previous annual reports mention has been made of this lack of modern sewage disposal arrangements and the continual growth of the town makes this facility all the more desirable. However, further approaches have been made to the Ministry during the year and representations will continue to be made.

Public Conveniences.

During the year a new toilet block has been provided in Market Street utilising a portion of the former cattle market premises.

These modern facilities will be of particular benefit to visitors to the town, being sited near to the principal car park.

Rodent Control

Treatments of the sewer systems have again been carried out by the Council's staff in conjunction with the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries & Food. In this way effective control of rat infestation in the sewers is ensured and very little infestation has in fact been found during the year.

Five complaints have been received and dealt with.

Refuse Collection and Disposal

The domestic refuse collection arrangements in the Borough continue to operate satisfactorily providing for one collection per week from all domestic premises.

At the end of the year, due to the National outbreak of Foot and Mouth Disease the disposal of all the refuse at the refuse tip by burning was found to be the most effective way of minimising any potential danger from this source and it is hoped that burning will continue. Control of the refuse tip can be more effectively carried out when refuse is burnt and the quantities of covering material required are thereby considerably reduced.

Frequent inspections continue to be made and very few problems from either rat or fly infestation have been encountered during the year, however,

periodic test treatments are carried out as a precautionary measure.

Inspection of the District and Public Health Services

The number of complaints regarding public health matters received, recorded and dealt with during the year was 17.

Improvement Grants

Four applications for Standard Improvement Grants under the provisions of the House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959 as amended by the Housing Act, 1961 and 1964 were received and approved. Seven have been completed during the year.

Council Housing

NEW Houses

During the year all the houses on the Pikes Mead Estate at High Street, totalling 34 houses, together with garages and car parking spaces, have been

completed and brought into occupation.

Negotiations have continued throughout the year for a scheme to provide an Estate of 75 houses with garages and car parking spaces at Moyses Meadow, High Street. The negotiations with the Ministry of Housing and Local Government and with the prospective Contractors, Messrs. Selleck Nicholls Williams Ltd., have reached, at the end of the year, a fairly advanced stage and it is anticipated work will commence during the coming year.

Maintenance and Repairs

Normal maintenance and repairs have been carried out during the year and all except electrical repairs have been carried out by the Council's maintenance staff. No particular problems have been encountered and all repairs have been minor in character.

Repairs are carried out as speedily as possible and during the year 320 reports were received and/or dealt with.
