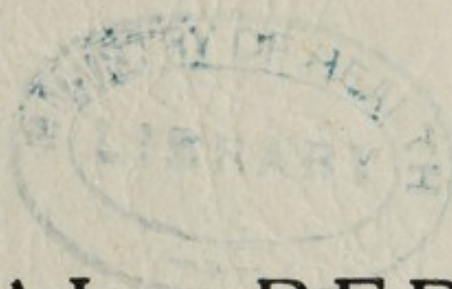

To the Chairman and Members of the Orrell Urban District Council.

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report on the Health of the Urban District of Orrell for the year 1950.

Comment is required on the following matters of the report. The number of births increased, the total for 1950 being 145 as against 130 in 1949, producing an Annual Birth Rate of 16.0 per 1,000 of the population, an increase of 1.8 over the preceding year. The Birth Rate for England and Wales is 15.8. There was a decrease in the Infant Mortality Rate from 48 per 1,000 live births in 1949 to 21 in 1950. The actual number of deaths of Infants under 1 year of age during 1950 was 3 compared with 7 in 1949. The Infant Mortality Rate for England and Wales is 29.8.

The General Death Rate is lower at 14.2 per 1,000 estimated population than the preceding year which was 15.3.

The Maternal Mortality Rate was again Nil for 1950.

I take this opportunity of tendering my best thanks to the Officials of the Council, the Staff of the Health Department and especially to the Sanitary Inspector for valuable help and co-operation at all times.

I desire to express to the members of the Health Committee my appreciation of the courtesy and consideration they have always displayed towards me.

2.—GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

Laboratory Arrangements.—Bacteriological examinations are carried out by the Pathological Department of the Wigan Infirmary and the Public Health Laboratory, Monsal Hospital, Manchester.

Ambulance Services.—Infectious, non-infectious, accident and maternity cases are dealt with by the Motor Ambulances belonging to the Wigan Corporation under an agency agreement with the Lancashire County Council.

The arrangements are adequate and satisfactory.

National Assistance Act, 1948.—No action was taken under section 47 of the National Assistance Act, 1948.

3.—SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply.—The water supply is mainly derived from an old mine shaft at Dean Wood. The supply has been constant and of good quality as shown by frequent bacteriological examinations. The water is chlorinated before being supplied direct to the houses by public mains. Additional plant was in the course of construction for filtration and aeration of the water, together with a new storage reservoir of 120,000 gallons capacity.

All the houses in the district have a piped supply of water, and the mains are flushed regularly to remove "ochre" deposits.

Drainage and Sewerage.—Sewage is treated by Wigan County Borough at their sewage disposal works at Hoscarr.

There are approximately 50 houses in the Abbey Lakes area not drained to a public sewer due to being below the level of the present sewerage system. Sewage disposal at these houses is by means of small septic tanks and filters, almost all of which are situated in the gardens of the houses.

Sanitary Accommodation. There are 38 privy middens with 63 closets serving 71 houses in the district. No conversions were carried out during the year. The Council approved a grant towards the cost of converting 6 privy middens to waterclosets in Oxhouse Road, and the owner agreed to carry out this work. In spite of frequent requests to the contractor to expedite the conversion the work still remained outstanding at the end of the year. Other owners of property where privy middens exist were also approached during the year in attempt to secure conversion, but little success was achieved. This is probably due to the fact that most of the properties concerned are old and considerably sub-standard in other ways.

Public Cleansing.—Three men are engaged full time on Street Cleansing under the supervision of the Surveyor.

One 7 cubic yard Karrier Bantam Refuse Collection Vehicle and six men are engaged on refuse collection and disposal which is under the supervision of the Sanitary Inspector. It is becoming difficult to maintain even a fortnightly collection of refuse, particularly during the winter months.

The refuse is disposed of by tipping along Captain's Clough on the southern boundary of the district.

Fire broke out on the tip and caused considerable nuisance to the occupants of the houses nearby. Unfortunately the tip has become a playground for children who light fires, fill the brook with refuse and litter the surrounding fields with broken glass. Complaint was made by the Lancashire Rivers Board concerning the amount of rubbish in Smithy Brook, as a result of which one man had to be taken off refuse collection for two or three weeks during the summer in attempt to clean out the brook. More supervision is required on the tip to prevent unauthorised persons sorting over and carting away articles from the tip, and to control the tip generally.

Schools.—The six schools in the district are all supplied with a piped supply of water from the public supply and five are provided with separate water closets with separate provision for flushing. At one of the schools, however, automatic flushing of the closets still exists.

Offensive Trades.—There are no offensive trades in the district nor any premises in which rag flock is manufactured or sold.

Common Lodging Houses.—There are no common lodging houses in the district and no houses let in lodgings.

Factories.—28 inspections were made of the factories in the area. The condition of the factories was generally satisfactory. Two outworker's premises were visited and found satisfactory during the year.

Tents, Vans and Sheds.—There are no camping sites within the district and no moveable dwellings were licensed by the Council during the year. One caravan, even though an application by the owner for licensing was refused by the Council was still stationed on unlicensed land at the end of the year.

Shops.—95 Inspections of shops were made during the year under the provision of the Shops Act, 1934. Conditions were found to be generally satisfactory.

Atmospheric Pollution.—No action was taken during the year.

Swimming Bath and Pools.—There are none in the district.

4.—HOUSING.

Statistics.—88 Permanent traditional type houses were completed and tenanted at Rivers Street, Ash Grove and Cedar Grove.

70 houses and 12 bungalows remain to be constructed to complete the Moor Road Housing Site.

The greater portion of the dwelling houses in the district have been constructed since 1925. Many of the older houses are sub-standard and if it was not for the general shortage of housing accommodation would certainly be scheduled for demolition. Unfortunately these houses are having to be kept "alive," and only the most urgent of repairs are carried out, often at considerable expense to the owners. The chief defects of this type of house are dampness, defective roofs, absence of adequate food storage, unsatisfactory sanitary accommodation, and general dilapidation of the structure.

Many houses, from which the tenants are being re-housed by the Council and which are unsuitable for re-occupation, are being re-let to persons, against the advice of the Council, who undertake to carry out all repairs to the property. This is a bad practice and will probably result in considerable hardships to the tenants.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

1. *Milk Supply*.—At the end of 1950 the following number of licences had been granted by the Council under the Milk and Dairies Acts and Regulations :—

Sampling.—Four samples of ungraded milk and one sample of "Pasteurised" milk were submitted for bacteriological examination. Of these, the sample of "pasteurised" milk was found to be satisfactory, while two only of the ungraded samples were satisfactory.

Three samples of milk were also submitted for biological examination, in all of them there was no evidence of tuberculosis infection.

2. *Ice-Cream*.—There is only one manufacturer of ice-cream within the district and during the year more satisfactory equipment was installed at these premises to conform to the requirements of the Ice-Cream (Heat Treatment) Regulations, 1947.

Of the 15 premises registered for the sale of ice-cream, at only two is loose ice-cream sold.

During the year 3 samples were submitted for bacteriological examination, 1 sample was Grade 1, while the other two, both of which were from the same manufacturer, fell into Grades 3 and 4.

3. *Meat*.—There is no slaughterhouse within the district. Notification was received of only 3 pigs slaughtered under the self suppliers scheme, each one was examined. The butchers' shops in the district were inspected regularly and, in most cases, were found to be very satisfactory.

PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

Scarlet Fever.—6 cases of Scarlet Fever were notified during 1950, as against 20 during 1949. None of the cases were removed to hospital.

Diphtheria.—It is pleasing to note that for the third year in succession there were no cases of diphtheria notified.

Diphtheria Immunisation.—During the year, 152 pre-school children, and 59 school children completed the full course of primary immunisation. In addition 402 children were given a secondary or reinforcing injection.

Pneumonia.—There were five cases of Pneumonia notified during 1950.

Measles.—44 cases were notified during the year, as against 54 during 1949.

Whooping Cough.—There was a decrease in the number of cases notified, 13 cases compared with 36 during the preceding year.

Erysipelas.—There was only one case of Erysipelas notified during the year.

Food Poisoning.—It is pleasing to note that there was no outbreak of food poisoning during the year.

Disinfection.—If the necessity for steam disinfection arises the apparatus at Whelley Hospital may be utilised.

Cancer.—16 deaths were certified as due to cancer during the year.

Radium treatment is available to Orrell residents at the Radium Institute, Manchester, and at the Wigan Infirmary.

Tuberculosis.—This service is under the control of the Regional Hospital Board and patients attend at the Dispensary, Millgate, Wigan.

Nine new cases were notified during 1950, all being cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis. There was one death from Pulmonary Tuberculosis during the year.

Notification of the disease in the district is satisfactory, and no action was necessary under the provisions of the Public Health Act, 1936, relating to compulsory removal of patients to hospital.
