To the Mayor, Chairman, Aldermen and Councillors of the  
Oswestry Borough and Rural District Councils.

Mr. Mayor, Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present for your perusal my Annual  
Report for 1955.

The contents include the information requested by the  
Minister of Health.

The Birth Rate for the Oswestry Borough and Rural Health  
Districts was 13.9 per 1,000 which is 0.3 higher than that for  
1954, and 1.1 lower than the National figure for 1955.

The Infant Mortality Rate was 22.7 per 1,000, 5.0 lower  
than that for 1954, and 2.2 lower than the National figure  
for 1955.

The Death Rate was 12.8 per 1,000, compared to 14.4 in  
1954, and was 1.1 higher than the National figure for 1955.

The Tuberculosis Rate was 0.06 per 1,000 compared to the  
National figure of 0.13.

This year I am glad to be able to report again that no mother lost her life in childbirth, that the Still Birth Rate was 0.31 per 1,000 (National Rate 0.34) the Infant Mortality Rate was 22.7 per 1,000 live births (National Rate 24.9), and the Neo-Mortality Rate (including deaths of infants under one month) was 16.0 compared to 27.7 last year.

The low figures in these tables are a reflection on the careful work of doctors, and midwives both in the Hospital and at homes in ante-natal and intra-natal care of the mothers and their infants.

Last year I reported that Cancer had increased and I must do so again this year, 74 deaths having been notified. It is tragic that a disease, curable if detected and treated in its early stages, should be allowed by many through ignorance or fear to continue until it has spread so that cure is impossible.

Once again cancer of the lung and bronchus has claimed an increased number of victims (11 as against 8 in 1954).

On page 16 is a graph showing the steady increase in cancer of the lung and bronchus. The graph also shows how, in recent years, deaths due to cancer of the uterus and breast (sites where early diagnosis should be possible) have declined.

Much research into the cause of cancer is being carried

out, and so far results show that certain substances (particularly derivatives of soot, tar, and tobacco) acting over a period of twenty or more years are commonly found in the history of a case of cancer of the skin or lung. A blow on the breast may result in the discovery of a cancerous growth fifteen or twenty years later, and a gastric ulcer may after many years show malignant change.

Unfortunately many people have such a fear of cancer that they delay seeking medical advice till too late for a complete cure and other cases who have obtained early treatment fail to publicise the fact that they have been cured.

The spring and summer saw a considerable epidemic of measles, most of the cases being mild, and a mild outbreak of whooping cough.

Food Poisoning has increased. Several of the cases were doubtless due to the unusually warm summer promoting quicker reproduction of bacteria in food (meat cooked at home and consumed after an interval), but one was due to contamination with mouse typhoid organisms.

May I say that I am indebted to the general practitioners for the notification of infectious disease as it occurs in their practices, and their cooperation by the earliest possible

notification (in certain cases by telephone followed by the customary form) enables the Health Department to initiate preventive measures and to follow up contacts or suspects without delay.

Much time has been devoted to the survey of the older and low-rated property requested by the Minister of Housing and Local Government, and in the text of the report will be found the numbers of houses regarded as of low standard.

A Clearance Area was declared in July by the Oswestry Borough Council in respect of the area lying between Castle Street, Beatrice Street, Albert Road and including the houses on both sides of Cripplegate. This covers the most densely populated area of the town, and one where many of the houses are totally lacking in amenities and the structure and layout are most unsatisfactory.

In the Rural District, the substandard houses are scattered, and it will be found more practicable to deal with them individually.

The completion of new houses has enabled many families living in substandard houses and hutments to be rehoused in Council houses, and their previous homes have been condemned and closed or demolished.

I hope that 1956 and 1957 will see an increased number of houses available for rehousing families from existing houses which are unfit for human habitation.

The low rainfall of 1955 has made a heavy drain on our resources, and increased amounts of water were purchased from Liverpool Corporation.

In the Rural District new mains carry water from the new reservoir at Moelydd to parts of Nantmawr, Treflach, Trefonen and Whitehaven.

The new sewage works at Morda are in operation.

New legislation includes the Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955, the provisions of which are to be enforced by all local authorities. These lay down standards for cleanliness of food premises and the people who work in them. Included in the regulations are instructions as to the provision of sanitary conveniences and washing facilities which are to be kept clean and in efficient order. Near every sanitary convenience a notice requesting users to wash their hands after using the convenience is to be displayed.

I would like again to express my thanks to the Chief Sanitary Inspectors of the Borough and Rural Districts, to

the other members of the Public Health Departments, and also to my colleagues in the other departments for help given throughout the year and for their contributions to this report.

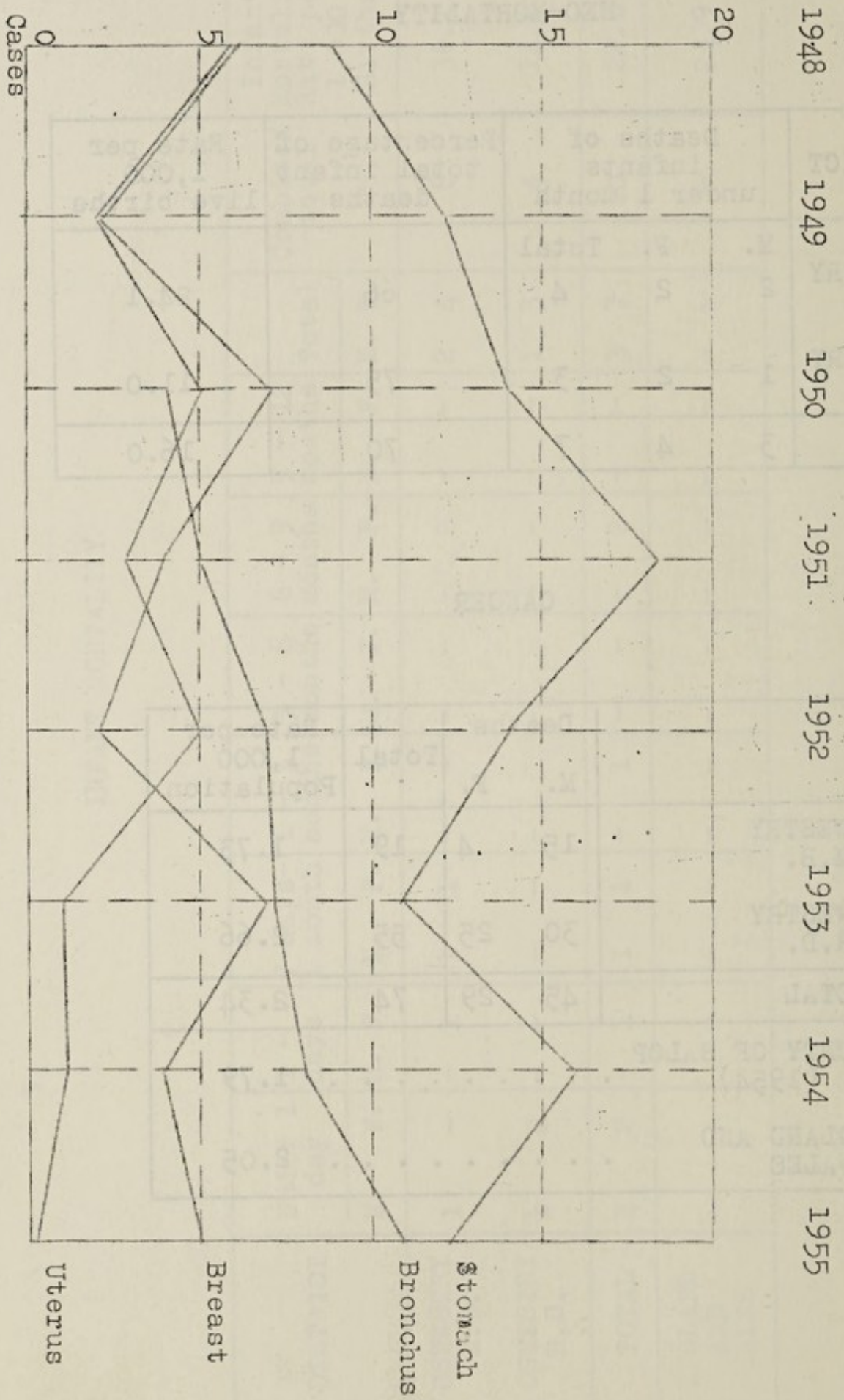

## INFECTIOUS DISEASE AND IMMUNISATION

Apart from an isolated case of Diphtheria in 1952 this disease has not occurred in Oswestry since immunisation was introduced: Immunisation is now accepted by the vast majority of parents as a safeguard to their children's health, and few have to be pressed to bring their infants for immunisation and for a booster dose when starting school.

Unfortunately I find that the small number of school entrants who have not been immunised is increasing, and that this is due in the majority of cases to indolence on the part of the parents, who readily consent to immunisation once the child has started school when it can be done without causing them any trouble.

Unfortunately among cases of diphtheria in certain areas many of those infected were children in the 1 - 5 year age group who had not yet been immunised.

Immunisation against Whooping Cough is being asked for by many parents.

Those cases of whooping cough who had previously been immunised were mild in severity, and in most cases occurred when the child was over 3 years old, and so better able to stand the strain of the disease.

## VACCINATION

It is a matter of regret that, whereas immunisation is sought after, vaccination against smallpox is only performed in less than half the infants.

Now that air travel from the East and Middle East, where smallpox is endemic, is so common, the unvaccinated members of the population are vulnerable should a case of smallpox develop in this district.

Vaccination performed in early infancy causes a minimum of disturbance and renders revaccination at a later age less likely to evoke marked general effects.

Unfortunately the Mobile Mass X-ray Unit based on Stoke-on-Trent was not able to visit Oswestry this year.

The importance of good housing and an adequate diet in the prevention of this disease has been mentioned in earlier reports.

To this I would add the desirability of adequate rest in the group of young people aged 15 - 30 which is the common age of onset.

Education is given at the Chest Clinic and Sanatoria by doctors and nurses in the hope of preventing further cases arising in the patient's family or visiting friends. Unfortunately where the patient cannot have a bedroom to himself, passage of infection becomes more probable.

B.C.G. vaccination to protect young children and infants where there is a family history of Tuberculosis is being used in certain cases under the care of the Chest Physician; and the disease itself is being treated by the drugs introduced during the past 10 years.

Monkmoor Hospital, Shrewsbury, admits other cases of Infectious Disease such as Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Measles, Whooping Cough, etc.

Other hospitals which provide accommodation for the district are:-

The Royal Salop Infirmary, Shrewsbury.

The Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital, Shrewsbury.

The Robert Jones and Agnes Hunt Orthopaedic Hospital,

All these hospitals are administered by the Birmingham Regional Hospital Board which was constituted in accordance with the National Health Service Act.

#### AMBULANCE SERVICES

Under the National Health Service Act it became the duty of the County Council, the Local Health Authority under the Act, to make provisions for securing that ambulances and other means of transport are available for the conveyance of persons suffering from illness or mental defectiveness and expectant mothers or nursing mothers, from places in their area to places in or outside their area.

#### LABORATORY FACILITIES

These are available at the Public Health Laboratory, Royal Salop Infirmary, Shrewsbury. Telephone: Shrewsbury 4389.

The Bacteriologist is Dr. A.C. Jones, and the Pathologist Dr. G. Grant.

This Service is based on the Royal Salop Infirmary and

undertakes work for Local Authorities free of charge in so far as it is relevant to diagnosis. It is invaluable particularly in the expeditious dealing with the bacteriological examination of food samples.

### BLOOD TRANSFUSION SERVICE

The Blood Transfusion Service Unit based on Birmingham visits Oswestry twice each year when a large number of public spirited citizens attend.

New volunteers are constantly required to take the place of those leaving the district or reaching "retiring age", and to keep pace with the increasing demand for blood transfusion as a part of Hospital treatment.

Rainfall at the Penygwely Reservoirs for the year was 32.39 inches. Consumption for the year 157,699,000 gallons.

During July, August, September and October the rainfall was 5.77 inches compared with the average of 13.72 inches.

May was the wettest month with 4.73 inches.

The houses supplied by wells are isolated dwellings on the outskirts of the town some considerable distance from the mains.

The water has been satisfactory both in quality and quantity.

The Corporation gathering grounds and impounding reservoir at Penygwely, together with the storage reservoirs at Mount Road do not normally provide a sufficient supply for the requirements of the town, but it is possible to augment this by drawing 250,000 gallons per day from the Liverpool Corporation Lake Vyrnwy Aqueduct, this latter supply being obtained under powers granted by an Act of Parliament.

The treatment given consists of an average period of seven days storage followed by rapid filtration with the prior addition of lime and coagulant, lime and calgon after filtration, and chlorination by the Chloramine system.

The water supply to all parts of the town is constant and more than 99 per cent. of all dwelling houses have direct supplies or stand pipes within easy reach.

This sample shows only slight opalescence and carries only a trace of matter in suspension. The water is neutral in reaction, very soft in character, contains no excess of salinity or mineral constituents in solution and it is free from metals apart from negligible traces of iron and manganese. It shows noticeable but not marked colour and is of satisfactory organic quality for this raw water. Similarly bacterial impurity indicative of contamination by matters of excremental origin is confined to the presence of Bact. coli in very moderate number. No exceptional difficulty would be anticipated in the treatment of this water for the production of a public supply.

In July 1955, the Council declared their first Clearance Area, comprising 125 houses and 15 other buildings, and covering an area of 4.16 acres.

During the year a great deal of time was spent inspecting food premises and carrying out the Health Education which does not hit the headlines but which counts most of all - 'on the spot' advice to food handlers, in their day-to-day surroundings. Pressure on food traders brought about structural improvements.

Unfortunately, the housewives do not show the constant desire for clean food trading which the activities of their various organisations suggest - how else can one explain the large quantities of cooked meats which are bought after standing in a shop window in summer, or on the counter of a warm store.

### FOOD POISONING

The eight cases in the year involved eight households, and detailed investigation was possible in five cases involving two households. In the other three cases time and distance factors meant the cases were not purely local.

1. Mr. A. Taken ill at work, prompt notification by family doctor. Food eaten during previous few days, with accent on meals within previous 24 hours, suggested that meat pasties might be the cause, as Mr.A had been taken ill during the afternoon and for midday meal had had pasties which his wife had bought and warmed in the oven. One pasty, not eaten, had been broken in two and thrown into the dustbin, and this one, together with two others of the same batch obtained from the baker, was submitted to the Public Health Laboratory. This seemed, from the doctor's report and from the patient's symptoms, to be a "text-book case" of enterotoxin food poisoning caused by contamination of a made-up meat product with the bacterial growth accelerated by warming. The Laboratory reports did not support this supposition and the case remained unsolved.

2. Mr. and Mrs. B. son and daughter. Taken ill during Monday night, notification received Wednesday, then visited. One meal taken away from home since Saturday evening.

Joint cooked on Saturday and stored in 'meat safe', being eaten cold for Sunday dinner, Monday dinner and tea. Gravy, made from the meat fat and jelly, was served on Sunday and Monday middays. No portion of the remains of the meat could be obtained, but the meat jelly and fat used for gravy making was submitted to the Public Health Laboratory. There had originally been a layer of fat over the meat jelly, but on Sunday the removal of some of the fat exposed the surface of the meat jelly, the surface exposed on Sunday being used on Monday to make gravy. The Laboratory reports supported the supposition that the family illness could have been caused by contaminated meat jelly.

The two slaughterhouses which were operated as a unit by the Ministry of Food continued after decontrol as the slaughtering premises for the Oswestry Butchers Wholesale Meat Supply Co. Ltd., and this Company continues to serve a slightly larger area than before. Three other small private slaughterhouses are licensed; one is used regularly three times a week for killing cattle and sheep; one is used regularly twice a week for killing sheep and sometimes cattle. The third has not been used.

There is a very great need for modern premises if slaughtering is to continue in Oswestry for any appreciable period. Oswestry, since decontrol, has maintained its position as the central slaughtering point for the rural areas around. This is in keeping with the town's history as a market town serving the Welsh hills to the West and the Shropshire Plain to the East.

I am grateful to my Rural District Colleagues for continuing the sharing of meat inspection duties at the Willow Street premises.

Public Water Supplies.

The year has more or less seen the completion of the priority part of the comprehensive water scheme. Areas now served include the Racecourse, Pantglas, and Treflach. Selattyn which has had a very poor quality water in the past is now connected up to the Mardy source and the old works disconnected.

The supply of water to Molverley, Kinnerley and Edgerley districts has been under consideration by the Council for some time. Eventually it is intended to serve these areas from

the headworks at Ruyton XI. Towns, but the Council appreciating the desperate need for water in these areas have negotiated with the War Department with a view to obtaining a supply of water from a camp borehole as a temporary expedient until such times as the water from Ruyton is available. These areas are in urgent need of a piped water supply as also is Ruyton and West Felton. The population of Ruyton, Molverley, and Edgerley, at the present time depend on local supplies from dairies, wells, and springs, but in the main, drinking water is obtained from the Council who deliver water twice weekly to the districts by means of a tank mounted on a motor lorry. The householders store the water in churns and other similar receptacles and often complain about stagnation, during the summer months in particular.

### Private Water Supplies.

Sixty five samples of water for bacteriological examination were taken during the year.

16 Satisfactory.

49 Unsatisfactory.

Private supplies have had considerable attention during the year, particularly where applications have been received for Improvement Grants. Before applications are brought to the notice of the Council, samples of water are taken where

wells etc. are involved and the applications put forward when the water has been rendered satisfactory and regarded as safe.

The lack of a wholesome and adequate water supply is proving an obstacle in many instances where owners wish to improve cottages, and this of course, is another very good reason for a piped water supply being available in all parts of the district.

### SLUM CLEARANCE

During the year a quick survey of houses previously placed in category 4 was made and a total of 428 houses were considered to be of sub-standard. A schedule of the houses was submitted to the Council and it is anticipated that the question of Demolition Orders and rehousing will be considered in the near future.

### REFUSE AND SALVAGE COLLECTION

Refuse collection is carried out by direct labour and 3 vehicles and 9 men are employed on the work. A collection is made in 11 of the 13 parishes, and a daily collection from a large military camp. Disposal is by means of tipping in disused ponds and gravel pits, and the time has now arrived when a suitable site must be provided for the northern part of the area. The Council has given instructions for the survey of the existing sewage disposal works at Weston Rhyn with a view to using it as a refuse disposal site when abandoned as a sewage disposal works. This site would serve the Gobowen, St. Martins, and Weston Rhyn areas.

Salvage is still collected in conjunction with refuse and to stimulate collection of this material the workmen receive an incentive bonus.

### ATMOSPHERIC POLLUTION

Although it is often stated that one cannot make a comparison between atmospheric pollution in large towns and Rural Districts, the need for a clean atmosphere is equally important, and when pollution does occur from the industrial chimney the problem is equally as difficult to deal with. In this district pollution has arisen from industrial chimneys, spoil banks at a colliery, and dust from quarries. During the year conversion from solid fuel to oil fired boilers has taken place at a large dairy and the amount of smoke now emitted from the chimney is almost negligible. A similar conversion is in progress at similar premises.

Fumes and smoke from a colliery spoil bank have given considerable trouble. The only solution to this problem has been the use of water sprays which carried out constantly has helped considerably to minimise the nuisance. However, it is not likely that the bank will be in use much longer. The National Coal Board have decided to commence a new tipping site and it is hoped that most combustible substances will be picked out before reaching the tip. The new site will mean the abandonment of the present bank and, therefore, there should be no further nuisance arising from smoke and fumes.

## OSWESTRY RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL

The quarry which is troublesome has very old cupolas, and the solution to the present problem arising from the emission of dolomite dust is not an easy one. The Company concerned has informed us that they have in mind extending the quarry, which if carried out, will mean reconstruction and new plant. Until this is done every effort is being made to reduce and confine the dust to as small an area as possible.

Pollution from domestic chimneys cannot be overlooked and as more urbanised areas are developed within Rural Areas, the need for keeping a watching brief over the type of grate fixed becomes greater.

### PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

The provisions of the above Act are exercised as in previous years by a Joint Committee of the Oswestry Borough and Oswestry Rural District Councils. Two men are employed full time and treatment of premises carried out by contract. No free service is given to private dwellings. Servicing companies also operate in the district.
