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

To the Oundle Urban District Council.

GENTLEMEN.

In presenting my Annual Report, I have pleasure in again testifying to the satisfactory state of the public health of your district.

Births and There is an increase in the birth-rate, unfortunately marred Deaths. by a large infantile death-rate, and also an increase in the death-rate from last year.

The births number 44, the total deaths 50; as, however, eleven of these latter were deaths of non-residents in the locality, the total deaths of the district number 39, giving a death-rate of 16'2 per 1000, higher than our decennial average. The birth-rate is 18'3 per 1000. Of the deaths 8 were those of children under one year of age, the largest infantile mortality since 1892, three deaths being due to premature birth, and a fourth to the effects of premature birth. There was one death from diphtheria, 3 from phthisis, free from other tuberculous causes, 2 from cancer, 2 suicides, and one death from accident.

There were 15 deaths among persons aged 68 years and upwards, 3 of these being upwards of 80 years of age.

Zymotic

Excepting a small and mild epidemic of Scarlatina, we have Diseases. been very free from zymotic diseases. Measles, which for the past two years was very prevalent, was only present in very few cases.

> Enteric Fever was, as in 1902, absent, a good testimonial to our excellent drainage, water, and milk supply.

There was one case of Erysipelas and two of Diphtheria.

Scarlet Fever.

On April 6th a sporadic case of the disease occurred at the Workhouse, in a child attending the National School. On May 11th another case occurred in a child at the same school, followed at short intervals by 9 other cases, one of which was a scholar at the British School. The disease died out in August, but a fresh, and in my opinion, sporadic case occurred in November, the boy being a scholar at the British School.

The children were all isolated, at considerable inconvenience to the fathers, who took lodgings in the town, and no untoward event occurred.

Diphtheria.

In October a mild case of this disease occurred in the Stoke Road, no cause for it being found. On December 30th a fatal case occurred in Havelock Cottages, the origin of this case also not being discovered, but the drains in this block of cottages are rendered offensive by the occupants throwing vegetable and other decomposing matter into them and blocking them; this fact may have helped to cause this attack.

Small-pox.

We fortunately escaped an epidemic of this disease. As I mentioned in my report of last year, our danger of an epidemic lies in the tramps sleeping at the Union. I saw several men during the year at the Union who had marks of recent small-pox on them, and it is purely a matter of good luck that we have escaped having one of these men with the disease breaking out on him in our Union. It has been suggested to me that should

an outbreak of small-pox occur amongst tramps in any Union, all tramps should be compulsorily detained in the different Unions in the Kingdom in which they happened to be sleeping at the time for a period of one to three months. This is very drastic, and I am afraid of too impractical a character to be carried out. We have a Hospital Tent, which has been erected at Wakerley Cottage, and put up when cases of small-pox appeared in the county. In April a contact from one of the Kettering cases slept at a lodging-house in the town. We received information from the police, visited the premises, which were in good order, and gave directions for all bedding, &c., used by the contact to be burnt. The house was closed for two nights and thoroughly disinfected.

Overcrowding.

There have been no cases reported.

Drainage.

The sewerage and drainage of the town have been very satisfactory and several fresh connections have been made with the main sewer.

Water supply.

The supply is excellent in quantity and quality, the latter is rather hard, and schemes are under consideration for softening it; so far we have not arrived at a satisfactory solution, the expense being very great.

Slaughter Houses. Bake Houses.

These have been regularly inspected and found in good condition.

Factory Acts.

The Workshops have been visited and found satisfactory as to lighting, air space, ventilation, and sanitary appliances. A Register of Workshops is appended.
