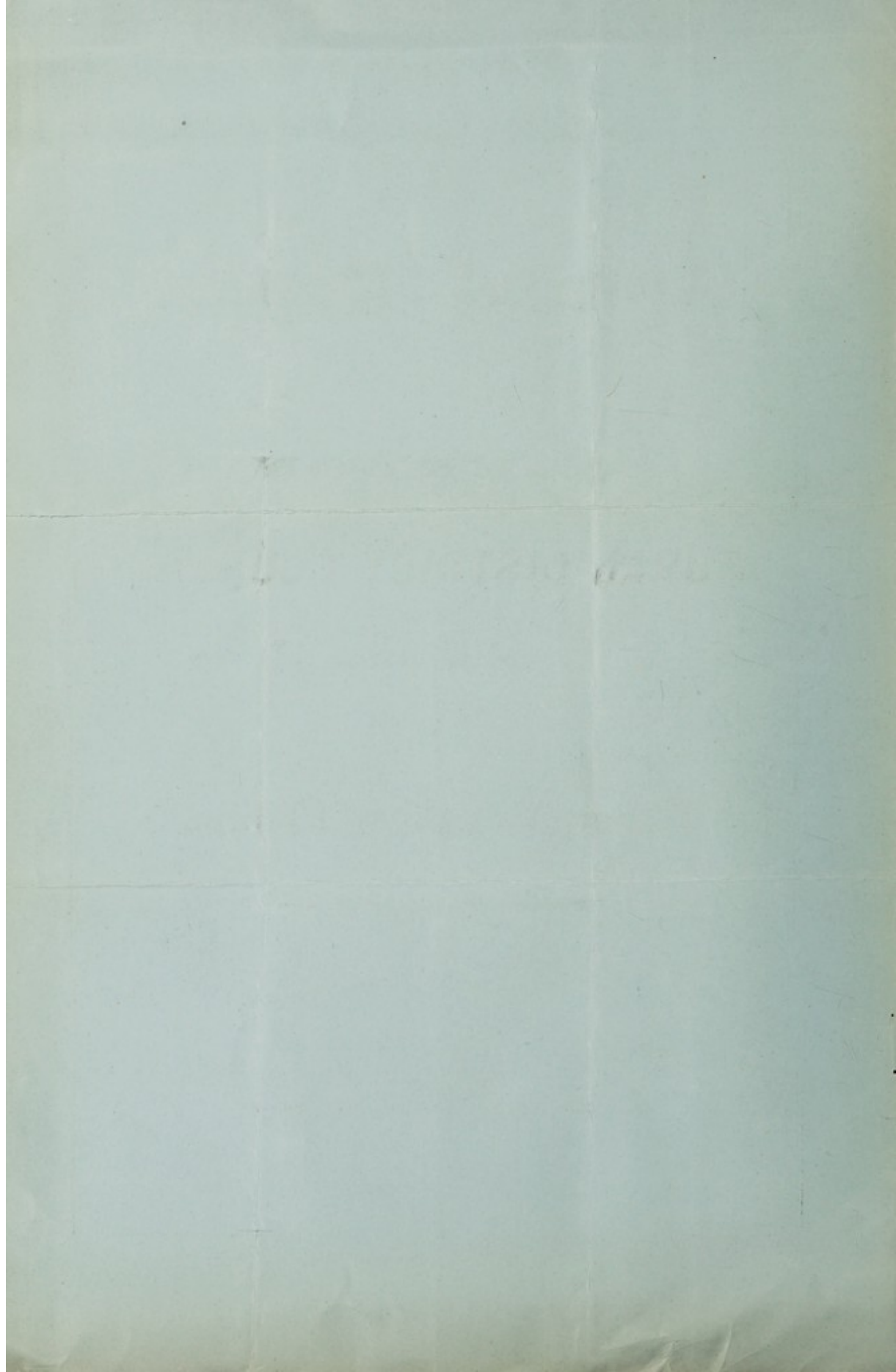

THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH'S REPORT

FOR 1895.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the pleasure of presenting you with my Report upon the health of the District during the past year. I am happy to say the health of the District has been good, the general death rate being only 13.61 per thousand, while the birth rate is 20.74, these figures being taken on the numbers of the 1891 census, as in my opinion the population in the rural districts does not increase, the migration to towns equalising the excess of births over deaths.

Infant mortality under one year 72.91

The area of the district in acres is 32991. The population at the census of 1891 was 4627.

BIRTHS AND DEATHS FOR 1895.

The number of births was 96—females 56, males 40. The number of deaths was 63. Of these, 7 were under one year; 1 between one year and five; 1 between five and fifteen; 1 between fifteen and twenty-five; 22 between twenty-five and sixty-five, and 31 from sixty-five and upwards.

The chief causes of death were: Phthisis, 5; Heart disease, 11; Acute Lung Diseases, 15; Suicide, 2; Cancer, 6; Old Age, 9.

There were no deaths from infectious diseases in the District. I only heard of 7 cases of infectious disease, viz: Scarlatina at Kelmarsh. Fortunately it was of a mild type and no deaths occurred. The source of the outbreak was clearly traced to a neighbouring Urban district. The percentage of infectious disease per thousand in the district was 1.51, but these figures may not be quite accurate, as your Board do not care to use the "Notification of Diseases Act," and in consequence I am dependent to a great extent upon the kindness of neighbouring medical gentlemen for early intimation of infectious disease in the District.

Vaccination, I am sorry to say, is practically a dead letter in the District. From September, 1894, to September 31, 1895, only 5 children were returned as vaccinated. I should consider it of great advantage to the District if the Vaccination Acts could be enforced, but presume you are waiting, like so many other Councils in the country for the result of the Report of the Royal Commission on Vaccination.

Anthrax among cattle was reported to me on four occasions: May 28th, Marston Trussell; June 21st, Arthingworth; July 19th, Marston Trussell; August 4th, Braybrooke.

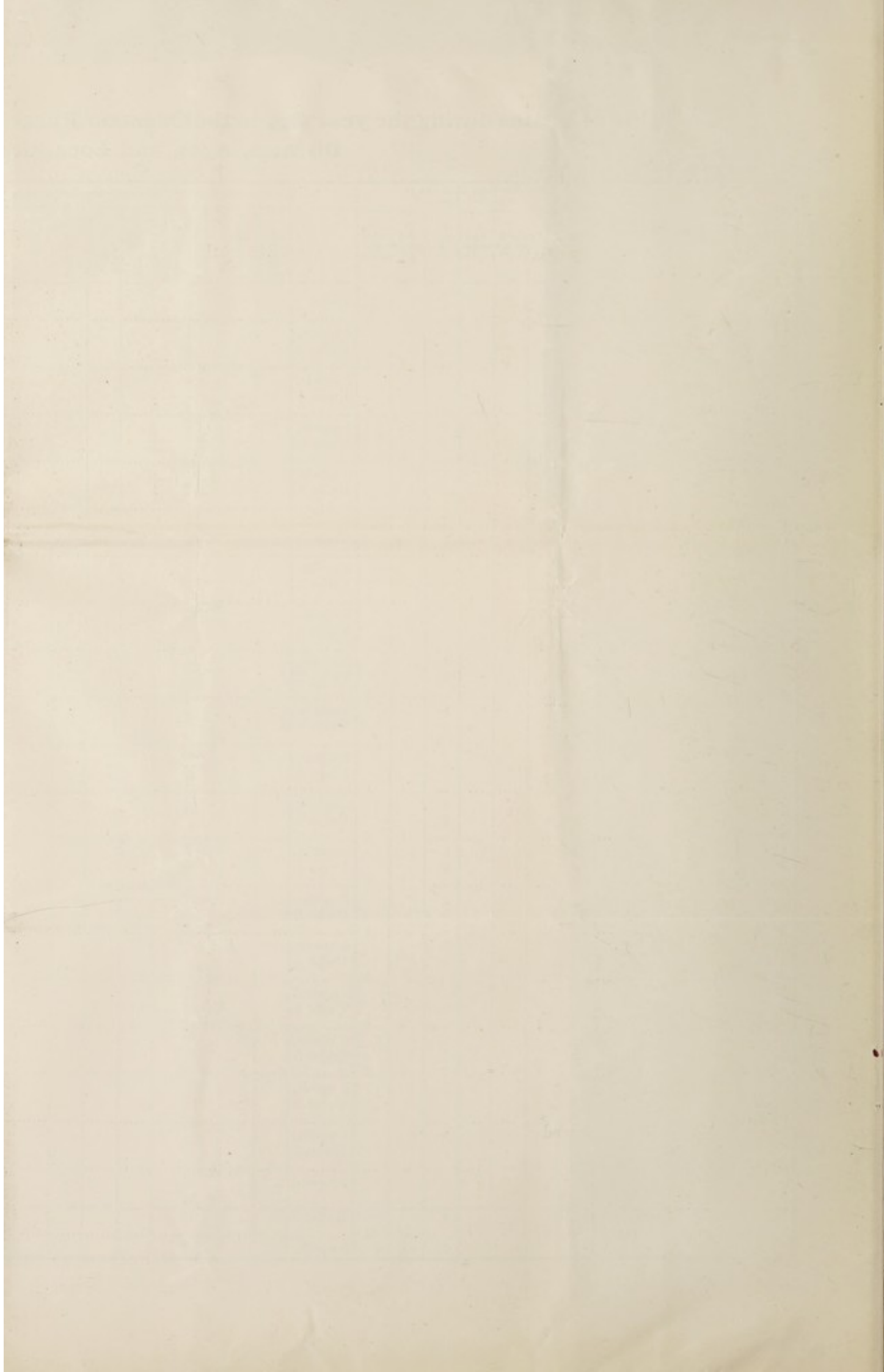
