TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE  
MELTON & BELVOIR RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present herewith my Annual Report on the Health of the District for the year 1967. This has been compiled in accordance with the instructions of the Minister of Health.

A satisfactory state of health prevails in the District.

The population has increased by 50 since the previous year. There has been a decrease in the Birth Rate from 17.5 to 14.3 and a further decrease in the Death Rate from 10.4 to the very low figure of 6.2.

The Infant Mortality Rate has increased from 6.6 to 15.0 but still compares favourably with the national figure of 18.3. One must also realise that this figure represents an actual increase of 2 infant deaths, caused by Congenital Malformations.

The Illegitimate Birth Rate shows a further increase from 5.6 in 1966 to 6.3 in 1967. There were 6 Stillbirths as compared to 4 the previous year, the rate being 22.0 and the national rate 14.8.

I am pleased to report, once again, that there were no Maternal Deaths during the year.

The chief causes of death were, Cardio-vascular lesions or diseases, Cancer, Bronchitis and Pneumonia, in descending order of frequency. The greatest single cause of Cancer deaths was lung cancer, twelve men and one woman dying from this disease. Bronchitis is still amongst "the great killers" but of course the amount of ill health caused by it must be far greater than that suggested by the mortality rate. The greatest challenge facing health educationists today is to stop or prevent the socially acceptable habit of cigarette smoking. Atmospheric pollution is being controlled but not so the much more intimate and personal pollution of smoking.



There were 191 cases of notifiable infectious diseases during 1967, an increase of 88 over that of the previous year and accounted for mainly by measles. It is to be hoped that more parents will have their children vaccinated against measles so preventing much ill health.

I am indebted to Mr. Milburn, your Chief Public Health Inspector for the latter part of my Report dealing with environmental hygiene. This contains a wealth of interesting and factual information, making it unwise to single out items for comment. Taken as a whole, it displays the great amount of effort and energy spent in maintaining high health standards in the community.

I express my thanks to Mr. Milburn and other members of the staff for their willing and efficient assistance. May I also express my gratitude to the Council Members for their support during the year.

### Existing Water Supplies

There is a public piped supply of water to every Parish, and the only village not served is Buckminster which has its own supply and service mains to every house. The Kesteven Water Board has prepared a scheme to serve Buckminster, and it is hoped that work on same will commence within the next 12 months.



## Existing Water Supplies - cont'd

The greater part of the District is now supplied with water from the River Dove. Stand pipes are not provided, the services being laid to consumers premises.

There is no indication of any tendency to Plumbo Solvency in the piped supplies.

The fluoride content of the water supplied in any part of the district is less than 0.2 p.p.m.

During the year under review there were no shortages, and the use of hosepipes was not banned.

## DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

### Western Area

Phase I - This scheme is to serve the villages of Asfordby, Kirby Bellars, Frisby-on-the-Wreake and Rotherby, was commenced during the year.

### Eaton and Branston

The Ministry of Housing & Local Government approved this scheme in principle and authorised the Council to invite tenders.

### Burton Lazars

A scheme has been submitted to the Ministry of Housing & Local Government for approval.

### Twyford & Thorpe Satchville

This scheme is ready for submission to the Ministry.

## Sanitary Accommodation

There were only 24 applications for a pail conversion grant received and approved, and during the year 41 conversions completed.

This is disappointingly low especially now that the Council have raised the maximum grant payable to £30. for conversion, with the addition of £50. towards the cost of installing a septic tank to properties that cannot be drained to a sewer.



## Public Cleansing

Refuse is collected from all households at intervals of seven working days.

Nightsoil is collected weekly from 48 villages and 3 part villages, in the remaining 14 villages and 3 part villages no collection is made because these have a mains water supply and an efficient Sewage Disposal Works available.

A fleet of modern vehicles is maintained comprising:-

2 - S.D. 16/18 cu.yd. refuse collectors with Fore and Aft Tipping Bodies.

3 - S.D. combined nightsoil and cesspool emptiers, 800 gall. capacity.

1 - S.D. refuse collector as a "stand by".

1 - S.D. cesspool emptier as a "stand by".

Household refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping and no difficulty has been experienced. The levelling is carried out by means of a blade etc., attached to a tractor. Part-time attendants are also employed at the tips. The system has been found satisfactory.

The disposal of nightsoil is to farms where it is ploughed into the land as manure. There is at present no difficulty in disposal, and in view of the amount of ploughed land it is not anticipated that this will create a problem for the next year or two.

The present system of conversion is by voluntary methods and has resulted in the conversion of 41 pail closets and privies to water closets during the year.

The Council is continuing to empty house cesspools on request from the occupiers at a standard charge of 10/- per dwelling. Cesspools at trade premises are emptied at a charge of 10/- per hour.
