To the Chairman and Members of the Urban District Council of Padiham. Lady and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my twenty sixth Annual Report dealing with the health of the inhabitants of Padiham during 1951.

Acting on the instructions of the Ministry of Health, this report will be an interim report, confined to essential or urgent matters which have affected the Public Health during the year, such as outbreaks of infectious diseases, overcrowding, sanitation, and distribution of clean food, etc.

# SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE AREA.

Unemployment was again a more or less negligent factor during 1951.

Most of the mills and factories are running their own canteens and these should be encouraged and used more than they are, by the workers. Probably they would be more frequented if special catering could be adopted for people suffering from Diabetes, Duodenal Ulcerand Gastric Ulcers, Nephritis, etc. In this way absenteeism due to sickness from these diseases could be considerably reduced.

Three premises under the control of the County Council are doing valuable work looking after children (under school age) of woman engaged in industrial occupations. There is still a need of another nursery in Clay Bank W ard.

During epidemics of the various diseases, stricter supervision of the children attending these nurseries is essential and the \_ provision of observation rooms would be beneficialand thereby reduce the risk of spreading infection.

All the schools in the area provide dinners for the scholars, and

this also is to be highly commended.

The health of the inhabitants has been remarkably good during the year and so far as recreations are concerned, full advantage was taken of the facilities controlled by the Local A uthority and the various Sunday Schools, etc.

In connection with the welfare of the old people, a Voluntary Association has been set up and is doing valuable work such as letter writing, doing shopping where necessary, giving advice, andarranging

for domestic help in cases of sickness

SANITARY COMDITIONS OF THE AREA.

Water supply: - The water supply has been good in both quality and quantity. Bacteriologically and Chemically the water has been much better than in previous years.

The following are the results of the Bacteriological and Chemical

examinations carried out on one of many occasions in 1951:-

# DERATISATION.

300 visits were made to 144 premises and properties for alleged rodent infestation, and 51 were treated by the Rodent Operator. Sausage rusk to which is added Zinc Phosphide was used for bait purposes and occasionally damp bread mash bait and Arsenous Oxide poisen.

## DISINFESTATION.

12 premises were dealt with for vermin, 4 for bugs and 8 for cockroaches. The refuse tip at Lumb Wood was periodically dusted with D.D.T. powder to ensure cockroach and cricket control.

## INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

All the activities associated with the inspection and supervision of food have been closely watched by the Sanitary Inspector during the year.

Particular attention has been made to the premises concerned in the manufacture and sale of I ce Cream, and any contraventions are duly noted and reported on to the persons concerned. There were no cases of genuine food poisening during the year.

## BAKEHOUSES.

The number of Bakehouses on the register is 15. These premises were regularly visited and no contraventions were observed.

## MEAT REGULATIONS.

All the activities associated with this were closely followed up by the Sanitary Inspector, and in only one case was a contravention noted and the butcher was duly warned.

#### FOOD PREPARATION.

Particular attention was paid to this important subject.
Regular and frequent visits were made to food preparing premises, and in no single case was it necessary to make any official representation:-

## COMMON LODGING HOUSES.

There is one Common Lodging House in Padiham and this was inspected frequently during the year. The supervision and control of this house still leaves a lot to be desired, and it is hoped that the adoption of the bye-laws which has been applied, will ensure better control in future.

# SMOKE OBSERVATION.

No serious smoke nuisances were observed although it was found necessary to visit two factories and draw attention to the emission of black smoke.

This can best be answered by stating that approximately 100 married people are without houses, and that approximately 250 married people require modern houses with baths, wash-houses etc.

# PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

1951 was more or less a normal year apart from three small outbreaks of Measles, Whooping Cough and Chicken Pox. The type in each of these outbreaks was generally mild and no deaths were recorded. No case of Diphtheria was reported during the year and this is to be highly commended and shows the good efforts of immunisation against this scourge.

# TUBERCULOSIS.

Nine cases of Tuberculosis were reported during the year - 8 Pulmonary and 1 Non-Pulmonary. Mass Radiography is certainly playing its part in this dread disease and is to be encouraged.

In conclusion I would like to render thanks to the Sanitary Inspector for his loyal help and cop-operation with me during the year. It is our duty to ensure that the inhabitants of P adiham shall enjoy all the blessings of Public Health administration, especially regarding Sanitation, Good Housing C onditions, Pure Water Supply, and more especially the provision of good clean wholesome food, and we expect co-operation from the shopkeepers and the Wholesale Distributors, and I don't think they will fail us.
