Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present this Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Conditions of the Urban District of Padiham, for the year ending 31st December, 1967.

There is a small decrease of 10, in the estimated mid-year population, not a lot, but both surprising and a little worrying, after eight years steady growth. The cause for concern is that the fall is despite the new private housing estates, bringing in new residents, and a natural increase, or excess of births over deaths, of about 30. The loss of population from East Lancashire, of which so much is heard, could be due to the educational opportunities available now for children. When they get their degrees, diplomas and other various qualifications, there is not the diversity or number of posts in their home areas, to absorb them all, so they are obliged to remain away, settling in the larger commercial and industrial centres.

On the last day of 1966, one of the staff of the Day Nursery was notified as suffering from Dysentery. By the end of the first week in January, other members of staff and children had succumbed, and all the rest had been tested to determine whether they were symptomless carriers of the disease. More and more children fell ill, and an extensive epidemic was feared, as contacts, and even contacts of contacts became positive. That only 34 cases was the final total, was entirely due to painstaking (and abuse-taking) contact tracing, collecting samples, record keeping and sheer determination by the Chief Public Health Inspector. A specimen of faeces had to be collected from each contact, and successive samples from treated patients until three consecutive ones proved negative. Over 500 faecal samples were collected and sent to the Public Health Laboratory.

Advantage is still being taken of the Council's generous interpretations of the Standard Grant schemes for the modernisation of dwelling houses. A further 57 applications for grants were approved in 1967, bringing the grand total to 500 - 13% of the houses in the District. The Government has ambitious plans for urban renewal, and it is anticipated that the Council's progressive policies will continue, even if drastic measures are required - demolishing houses to shorten terraces, demolishing terraces to provide gardens, light and air, and demolishing areas for landscaping, trees and playgrounds. "Operation Springclean" started towards the end of the year, and plans were made to clear some of the little patches of dereliction, of which there are too many, and for which the North is unhappily noted.

Several samples of unpasteurised milk were found on examination, to be infected by Brucellosis (Undulant Fever) bacteria. Hitherto, reliance had been placed on the persuasion of milk producers to put things right. Clearly this had been a failure, and it is now our policy to take legal action to ensure that milk from cows known to be, or suspected of producing polluted milk, is heat-treated before being sold to retail consumers.

I acknowledge, with sincerity, the continued good work of my colleagues in the Public Health Department, and thank the Committee for their interest and advice.

# TUBERCULOSIS

# NEW CASES AND MORTALITY DURING 1967

No new cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis were notified during the year. Two males aged 60 and 70 were taken off the Register as Recovered, one male aged 81 was removed from the Register as deceased and one male aged 52 removed out of the District and was struck off the Register.

All these four were Pulmonary cases.

#### VENEREAL DISEASE

Treatment is a function of the Manchester Regional Hospital Board, and inquiries or cases brought to our notice are directed to the clinic in Burnley.

#### ILLEGITIMATE CHILDREN

The Burnley and District House of Help act as agents for the County Council, and carry out all the necessary arrangements, combining efficiency with understanding.

# LABORATORY WORK

This work is carried out at the Public Health Laboratory, Meadow Street, Preston as and when necessary.

The Lancashire County Council provides and maintains the following, with delegation to the No. 6 Divisional Health Committee, on which Padiham Urban District has representation.

AMBULANCE SERVICE. The District is served by the purpose-built County Ambulance Station at Altham, and there are five vehicles providing day and night cover. The average time taken to reach a patient, after receipt of an emergency call in 1967, was 8 minutes, and to hospital, 25 minutes.

CHILD WELFARE SERVICE. The Infant Welfare Centre and School Clinic for the Urban District is at Parish Street.

MIDWIFERY SERVICE. There are two District Midwives assigned to Padiham, who reside within the District, namely Miss. R. M. S. Catterall and Mrs. S. H. Murphy.

HOME NURSING. This service is in the capable hands of Sisters K. M. Cox and A. Goodwin, and Nurses Gears and Townes.

#### SANITARY ADMINISTRATION

WATER SUPPLIES. Padiham is supplied with a constant supply of water from the mains of the Calder Water Board and there were no new sources of supply during the year. The water is of good quality and in good supply. All dwelling houses within the District, except four, are supplied direct from public mains. The four exceptions, which are supplied by spring water are isolated farm dwellings and are a considerable distance from the nearest public main.

SUPPLIES TO HOUSES. The number of houses supplied direct from public mains is 3895.

WATER SAMPLING. Number of Bacteriological examinations.

Public Mains. Results:-12 Satisfactory. 2 Unsatisfactory.

> The Calder Water Board were informed of the two unsatisfactory samples.

SWIMMING BATHS. At present there is no Swimming Bath within the District. The Council, however, now have a Swimming Bath under construction and this should be completed in March, 1969.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL. The sewage is carried by gravity feed to the Disposal Works, just outside the District Boundary, at Altham. Treatment is by means of screens, detritus tanks, settlement tanks, sprinkler filters and contact beds. The effluent from the works is discharged into the River Calder.

## SANITARY ACCOMMODATION.

Number of Privy Middens. Nil.

Number of Pail Closets. There are five only at isolated dwellings and these are emptied by the tenants.

Number of Fresh Water Closets. 5871.

Number of Waste Water Closets. 577.

Conversions during the year.

Chief Sanitary requirement of the District. The conversion of all waste water closets to the fresh water system. The Council, pay a grant of £15., and £20 if an inspection chamber is provided.

PUBLIC CLEANSING. This is carried out by direct labour with two vehicles, a Karrier 12 cu. yard Fore and aft Tipper, and a Karrier 20 cu. yard continuous loader.

> Domestic and Trade refuse is collected weekly, and in some instances when requested, trade refuse is removed three times per week.

All refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping on the Council's Tip at Lumb Wood. The tip has an estimated life of about 18 months but the Council is endeavouring to make alternative disposal arrangements and leave this site during 1968.

Number of Moveable Dustbins.

SALVAGE. In September the Salvage Depot was severely damaged by fire and had to be completely re-roofed and re-wired. This had an adverse effect on the output of baled waste paper. During April the market value of tins, carpets, mattresses etc., really slumped and it became impossible to dispose of these items for salvage purposes. Consequently, the salvage figures are again down on the previous year.

## DISINFESTATION.

Sixteen dwellings were treated during the year, nine for cockroach infestation, four for flea infestation, two for buge, and one for beetles. D. D. T. powder with Pyrethrum, Multispray and Gammexane Smoke Generators were used.

CAMPING SITES AND MOVEABLE DWELLINGS. There are no caravans or sites
licensed under the Public Health Act, 1936, and no
licenses have been applied for under the Caravan Sites
and Control of Development Act, 1960.

## HOUSING

CONDITION. The majority of the houses are stone built and of the terraced type. This type of property is on an average 70/80 years old and in general are quite well maintained, due to the fact that quite a large percentage of them are owner occupied. However, some of the landlords of tenanted property only carry out the minimum amount of maintenance and a careful check is kept on these properties.

NEW BUILDINGS. During the year 10 houses were completed by private enterprise and 4 by the Local Authority.

OVER-CROWDING. No new cases were reported during the year.
