p r e f a c e

Mr. Chairman and Councillors,

I present my Report for 1966 in accordance with instructions issued in Circular 1/67 of the Ministry of Health dated January 1967.

VITAL STATISTICS

Population

This again shows an overall increase in spite of the fact that more people died than were born locally and indicates that 341 persons migrated into the area.

The number of inhabited houses increased by 319 to 12,233 giving an average of 2.358 houses per acre. The number of persons per house dropped slightly to 2.572 indicating that provision of housing outstripped population increase.

Births and Deaths

The Standardised Birth Rate at 16.36 is lower than the National Average of 17.7. Nevertheless there were 387 births registered. The standardised Death Rate at 9.88 per thousand population is again lower than the National Rate of 11.7 per thousand. A total of 518 persons died, an excess of 131 over the number of births.

There were 44 illegitimate births and 7 stillbirths, and 11 children died under the age of one year. Most of the adult deaths were due to heart disease and to cancer, with respiratory illness as a runner-up.

GENERAL HEALTH

Old People's Welfare - National Assistance Act, 1948

It was not necessary to use Section 47 of the above Act during the year.

One burial took place under Section 50 of the above Act.

Meals-on-Wheels

A new kitchen for this service was completed in premises at the rear of Paignton Central Clinic 14 Midvale Road and came into use in November.

Detection of Cancer in Women

The Devon County Council opened a cervical cytology clinic at 14 Midvale Road, beginning in April 1966. All women between the ages of 30 and 60 years are advised to book an appointment for the test. The Clinic Clerk at the Paignton Clinic makes the bookings.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

The Public Health Inspectors again had a very busy year and in addition they "covered" the Brixham Urban District during the illness of the Brixham Inspector. Good progress was made in all sections of their work and in particular with the Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act.

In conclusion I wish to record my appreciation of the co-operation received during the year from Councillors and my Colleagues on the Staff.

INTERNATIONAL CERTIFICATES OF VACCINATION

During the year 1273 certificates of Smallpox and Cholera vaccination in respect of persons travelling abroad were authenticated by the Public Health Department. The large increase in numbers was due to the United Kingdom being declared an "infected area" under the International Sanitary Regulations arising from the smallpox outbreak in the Midlands. All visitors going abroad

needed to produce a valid International Vaccination Certificate against Smallpox. This requirement for travellers to the Continent of Europe was lifted on August 19th 1966 at the cessation of the outbreak in England.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES

Dysentery

In November about 60 children at the Roman Catholic School in Cecil Road were affected by diarrhoea. Early in December several cases were diagnosed as Sonne Dysentery. In retrospect it is considered the other cases were also due to Dysentery. Strict hygiene precautions were carried out by the school and the outbreak terminated by the Christmas vacation. During this time over 300 cases of dysentery a week were reported from other parts of the country.

Prevention of Tuberculosis

The Mass X-Ray Unit continued its fortnightly visits throughout the year. Paignton Council have allocated a site for the Unit in the Car Park at Victoria Park which the Unit occupies for approximately one and a half hours per visit. The Unit was well patronised by members of the general public.

Measles

This disease is endemic and large numbers of cases occur in alternate years. An outbreak began at Paignton in the spring of 1966 and continued for the rest of the year.

A vaccine for protection against measles has been produced but it is not yet generally available and is still considered to be experimental. The method of administration of the vaccine is complicated especially if feverish reactions are to be avoided.

Contact of Smallpox

Arising from cases of smallpox (Variola Minor) in the Midlands one holidaymaker who may have been in contact with a confirmed case of smallpox was kept under observation during her stay at Paignton. She remained in good health all the time.

OTHER DISEASES INFORMALLY NOTIFIED

A total of forty-three cases of illness was notified informally through the school health services and by the Torbay Hospital Annexe. Details are shown below:-

SECTION B

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR PAIGNTON 1966

LABORATORY SERVICE

Laboratory facilities for the bacteriological examination of pathological specimens, samples of milk, water, ice cream and shell fish, are provided by the Public Health Laboratory Service at Church Lane, Heavitree, Exeter. (Telephone: Exeter 77833.)

In emergency, certain (medical) specimens can be examined at the laboratory of the Torbay Hospital, Torquay.

The chemical analysis of water and other samples is undertaken by Dr. Cedric V. Reynolds, Public Analyst, 1 Barnfield Crescent, Exeter. (Telephone: Exeter 72836.)

COUNTY COUNCIL HEALTH SERVICES

The following are some of the County Council Services available under the National Health Service Act, 1946. Full details can be obtained from the County Medical Officer, Health Department, County Hall, Exeter.

Home Nursing, Midwifery, Health Visiting and Welfare Centres

There are six District Nurse/Midwives, four Health Visitors and a Nursing Assistant. Child Welfare Sessions are held at 14 Midvale Road, Paignton (Telephone: 59131) on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons; at the Baptist Church Hall, Preston, Paignton on Wednesday afternoons and on Tuesday afternoons at the Devon County Council Clinic, Smallcombe Road, Foxhole, Paignton. (Telephone: 58194.)

Vaccinations, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus and Poliomyelitis Immunisations

A Medical Officer at the Welfare Centres will vaccinate or immunise babies at the request of parents. Family Doctors will also provide this prophylaxis free of charge.

Home and Domestic Help Service

The Devon County Council Home Help Organiser has an office at the Central Clinic, 14 Midvale Road, Paignton (Telephone: 59131).

This service aims to provide essential domestic help in cases of maternity, sickness, convalescence, old age and infirmity. The service is not free, but persons if unable to pay the full charges, are assessed according to their means.

Ambulance Service

The service is under the general direction of the County Medical Officer but the local administration is carried out by the Paignton St. John Ambulance and Nursing Brigade, under an agency agreement with the Devon County Council.

Doctors requiring an ambulance are advised to telephone the Ambulance Radio Control Centre at Torquay, Telephone: 39345. However, it is still permissible to telephone the local Ambulance Station at Littlegate Road, Paignton, Telephone: 57602.

For infectious disease other than smallpox, ambulance arrangements are still made by the Torbay Hospital Annexe (Telephone: Torquay 63254), for cases entering the Hospital from the Paignton area.

Special arrangements exist for the treatment of smallpox at Liskeard Smallpox Hospital, Cornwall. Arrangements for transport of such cases are made through Torbay Ambulance Radio Control Centre and the Plymouth City Ambulance Service who will provide the necessary ambulance facilities.

Hospital Car Services

The Hospital Car Service (organised by the S. J. A. B. , B. R. C. S. , and W. R. V. S.) operates under an agency agreement with the Devon County Council. It transports sitting cases who can enter or leave a vehicle unaided. Arrangements for a hospital car will be made by the hospital, upon application by a Medical Practitioner.

Mental Health

Arrangements for mental treatment on the recommendation of a Medical Practitioner are made by the Social Workers in Mental Health, Miss O. F. Evans and Mr. W. J. Gliddon, 14 Midvale Road, Paignton. (Telephone: 59131.)

HOSPITAL SERVICES

These are provided by the Torquay and District Hospital Management Committee on behalf of the South-Western Regional Hospital Board.

The Paignton and District Hospital situated at Church Street, Paignton is a General Hospital with an establishment of 51 beds.

There is a Recovery Hospital with 24 beds at Kings Ash, Paignton, with a General Practitioner Staff (as for Paignton Hospital).

The District is also served for general cases by the Torbay Hospital, Torquay, whilst cases of infectious disease (except smallpox) are received at the Torbay Hospital Annexe, Torquay.

Emergency treatment in Hospital of cases of Acute Poisoning may be obtained at the Torbay Hospital, Torquay. A Regional Poisons Bureau is maintained at Guy's Hospital, London.

MEDICAL AND DENTAL SERVICES

There are 19 General Medical Practitioners together with 13 Dentists and a School Dental Clinic in Paignton.

OTHER SERVICES

Nurseries

There are three Day Nurseries in the District. One of them is also a residential nursery.

Old People's Welfare

A number of voluntary agencies including the Guild of Social Service (Telephone: 57604) cater for the needs of old people. The service includes a Meals-on-Wheels service, which operates from premises at the rear of 14 Midvale Road.

Chiropody service

A County Council Chiropodist operates a foot clinic at the Central Clinic 14 Midvale Road, Paignton. Treatment is available for handicapped persons, the elderly and any expectant mothers who may be in need of chiropody. Most cases are referred to the clinic by the family doctor, but there is provision for health visitors, district nurses and voluntary agencies to refer cases to the County Medical Officer.

Citizen's Advice Bureau

Sessions are held at the Rest Centre, Bishop's Place, Paignton from 10 a. m. to 12 noon and 2 p. m. to 4 p. m. daily, except at week-ends. Facilities for Marriage Guidance can be arranged.

Infertility and Family Planning Clinics

Clinic sessions at 14 Midvale Road, Paignton are held regularly by the Torbay Branch of the Family Planning Association. Interviews are arranged by appointment. Telephone Paignton 43343 between 9 and 10 a. m. on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

SECTION C

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

WATER SUPPLY

Source of Supply

Water is supplied by the South West Devon Water Board. In general the water supply to Paignton is derived from two moorland catchment areas known as Holne and Swincombe. Holne is an impounding reservoir of a capacity of 190,000,000 gallons and Swincombe is a river intake which is piped to Holne via a 24 inch diameter bitumen lined steel main.

During the summer months water is also obtained from the South West Devon Water Board's Radial Collector above Totnes Weir, and is pumped to Paignton through a 15 inch diameter concrete lined main.

Treatment

All the water is treated with chlorine before use, and where necessary it is also filtered or undergoes pH correction.

Quality

Regular testing showed that the water was of excellent quality. A total of 84 samples comprising 38 from reservoirs and 46 from taps was examined.

Chemical

The result of a chemical analysis of the treated water on 2nd March 1966, taken from a storage tank in a nursing home, was as follows:-

This sample is practically clear and bright in appearance, neutral in reaction and free from metals apart from very minute traces of iron and copper. The water is very soft in character and has a fairly low content of mineral and saline constituents. It is of a high standard of organic quality.

These results indicate a water which, from the aspect of the chemical analysis, is pure and wholesome in character and suitable for drinking and domestic uses. The very minute traces of iron and copper in this sample would be insufficient to cause brown or green staining.

A fluoride estimation done some years ago showed that the water contained 0.096 parts per million of natural fluoride - less than one tenth of the recommended amount.

The treated water is not plumbosolvent.

REFUSE, SEWAGE DISPOSAL AND DRAINAGE

Refuse collection and Disposal

Household refuse is collected weekly, free of charge. A charge is made for the collection of trade refuse and any additional collection from private households.

It is disposed of by controlled tipping in part of the Clennon Valley. This is part of a long term plan to reclaim land which will ultimately be used for sporting facilities.

Sewage Disposal

Sewage flows to the sewage pumping station in the Clennon Valley, whence it is pumped into a trunk sewer which discharges into the English Channel off Sharkham Point, Brixham (outside Torbay). No foul sewers from Paignton discharge into Torbay.

Public Conveniences

Free hand washing facilities are provided at 12 men's and 14 women's conveniences out of a total of 19 men's and 19 women's conveniences in the District.

PUBLIC HEALTH

Drainage and Sewerage Inspections

244 new dwellings were completed during the year and considerable time was given to the supervision of the design and construction of drainage systems. The tests and inspections carried out are classified as follows:-

Camping Sites

There were 41 sites occupied during the year by tents, caravans and chalets. Three sites, Waterside, Grange Court and Bay Tree Cottage site are owned by the Paignton Council.

284 visits were made to the camping sites during the year. With generally good co-operation from those concerned, improvement in general facilities for the camper continues.

Swimming Pools

There are six swimming pools at holiday camps, two at hotels and five at schools in the Urban Area. All are equipped with filtration and chlorination apparatus.

Swimming Pool Samples

Nine samples of swimming pool water were tested bacteriologically. Eight of the samples were satisfactory. One was unsatisfactory but was subsequently remedied by increased chlorination.

Scrap Metal Dealers Act, 1964

Three persons are registered as Dealers in Scrap Metal in accordance with the provisions of Section I of the scrap Metal Dealers Act, 1964.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

Rodent Control

In accordance with the instructions issued by the Infestation Control Division of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, ten per cent of the sewers in the District are test-baited annually. From evidence based on the results of this test two maintenance tests were carried out in the early spring and autumn.

The tests emphasise that very few rats are to be found in the sewers in the elevated parts of the town. Takes were recorded in the sewers in the low-lying parts and although it does not seem possible to eradicate the rats completely from this area, there is no evidence to show that their numbers are increasing.

Treatments to private houses were free of charge, but a charge is made for treating business premises.

The following Table summarises the incidence of infestation and action taken and is based on returns submitted to the Minister of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food.

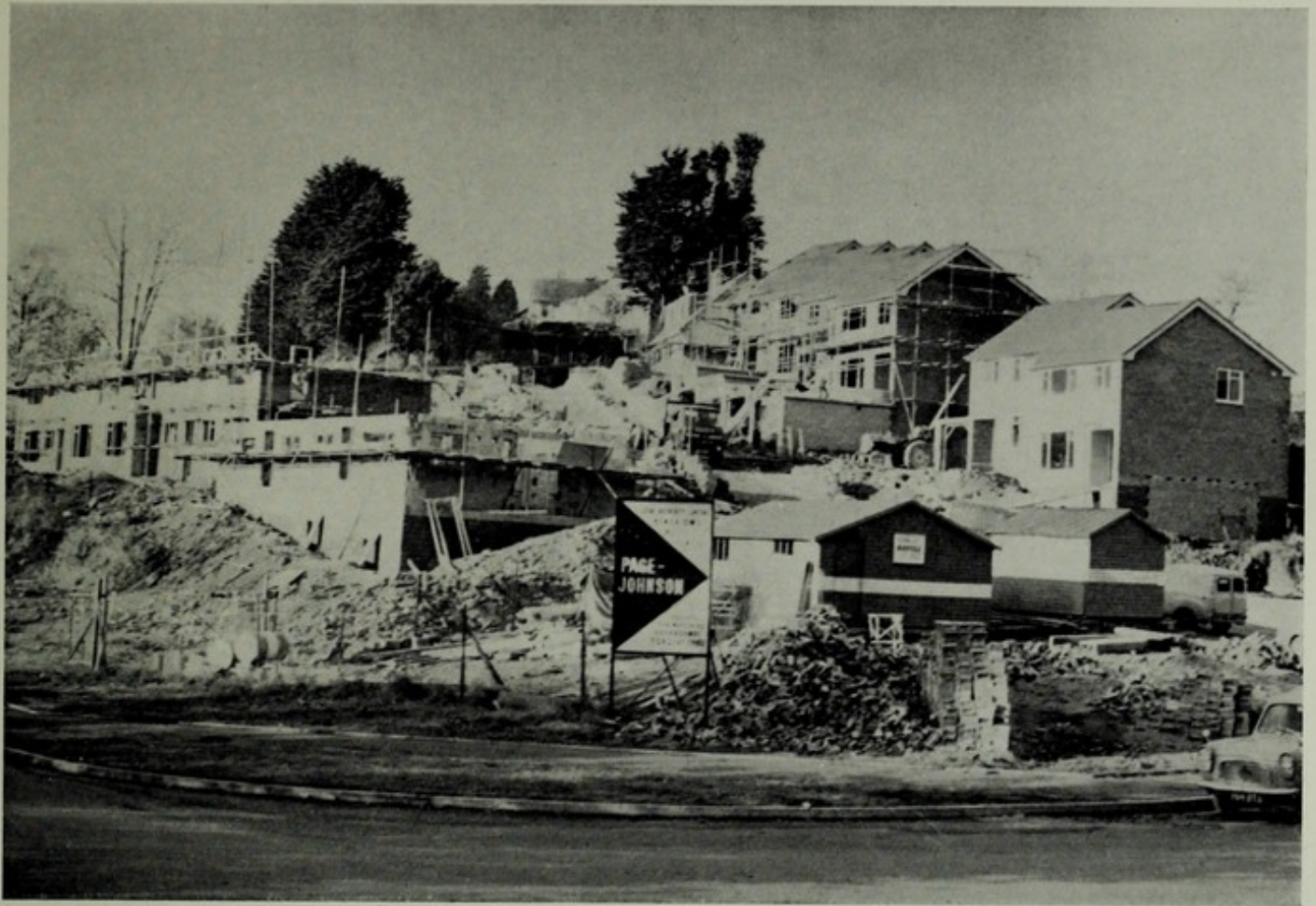

25 samples of ice cream were tested bacteriologically. 15 of these samples were placed in Grade I (satisfactory), 2 in Grade II (only fair), 6 in Grade III (unsatisfactory) and 2 in Grade IV (very bad).

The Council is responsible for the administration of the whole of the provisions of the Shops Act.

Informal action was taken in respect of Seven reported infringements of closing hours. There are 601 shop premises in the area.

One Order made by the Devon County Council has been adopted by this Council thus continuing a policy that has been in operation since 1912. This Order, made under Section 40, suspends the weekly half-holiday closing during the four months June to September.

The Council by an Order made under Section 41 of the Act substituted the hour of 9.30 p.m. for the general closing hours. The Order is applicable to part of the Urban District and is operative for the four months June to September each year.

Sunday Trading Order, 1962

In 1962 a further Order made under Section 51 of the Shops Act, 1950, permitted certain Sunday trading within parts of the Urban District on eighteen specified Sundays.

ANIMAL BOARDING ESTABLISHMENTS ACT, 1963

There are two premises licensed under this Act, and both are managed in a satisfactory manner.

RIDING ESTABLISHMENTS ACT, 1964

This Act came into operation on 1st April, 1965. Satisfactory Veterinary Reports were received in respect of four premises which were licensed under the above Act.

AGRICULTURE (SAFETY HEALTH AND WELFARE PROVISIONS) ACT, 1956

5 Farm Inspections were carried out under this Act.
