SECTION III -- CHARACTER OF SHIPPING AND TRADE DURING THE YEAR

Character of Shipping

This consists mainly of Coastwise vessels carrying cargoes of Coal, Cement and General Goods. Shipping from Foreign Ports arrives almost exclusively from Northern Europe. At Penzance occasionally ships from Scandinavian Canal land cargoes of wood and vessels from Holland and France land cargoes of coal or lead. Belgian, French and occasionally Spanish trawlers and crabbers land fish at Newlyn where an active Fish Market is carried on. Vessels also arrive at Newlyn to load with stone for European and Home Ports. Salt for use in the Fishing industry is imported at Newlyn from Spain.

Nature of Trade

Imports Coal (for bunkers and local use. General merchandise from Home ports, Flowers and Vegetables from the Isles of Scilly.

Exports

General goods to the Isles of Scilly and Stone from the Newlyn Quarries to home and foreign ports. Pilchards to Italy. Bunker Coal to shipping. There is an active

ship-repairing industry for small ships at Penzance. The only Passenger traffic from Penzance is by the R.M.S. "Scillonian" to and from the Isles of Scilly. There is no Passenger traffic between your Ports and any foreign port

2. Radio Messages to Ships at Sea All received and sent via Lands End Radio Station. During the year 1956 Medical advice was given by Radio to ships at sea. Of these several were instructed to put into Mounts

Bay where they were boarded by the Deputy Medical Officer of Health who superintended the landing of cases of Sickness or Accident for admission to the West Cornwall Hospital, Penzance.

3. Notifications other than by Radio are made to the Medical Officer of Health either by H. M. Customs or the Local Shipping Agents.

4. Mooring Stations There is a special Anchorage designated for ships in quarantine for major Infections Diseases at Gwavas Pool, off Newlyn Harbour

5. Arrangements for Infectious Diseases other than Smallpox
(a) Hospital Accommodation - The County Infectious Diseases (Isolation) Hospital, Truro.
(b) Surveillance and follow up of contacts by Hospital Authority.
(c) Cleansing and Disinfection of ships etc. No facilities available.

SECTION VII - SMALLPOX

1. Cases of Small Pox would be sent to the County Isolation Hospital -- Truro.
2. Ambulance Transport and vaccinal state of ambulance crews is the responsibility of the Ambulance Service of the Cornwall County Council
3. The County Medical Officer of Health - who has a panel of four Consultants - would be requested to supply the services of a Smallpox Consultant.
4. Facilities for Laboratory Diagnosis of Smallpox are available at the Royal Cornwall Infirmary, Truro

SECTION VIII - VENEREAL DISEASE

There is no local clinic readily available for the diagnosis and treatment of Venereal Disease. Any cases arising would be sent to the Port Medical Officer of Health or his Deputy.
