SECTION III - CHARACTER OF TRADE AND SHIPPING DURING THE YEAR

Character of Shipping - The shipping using Penzance Harbour comprises mainly small Coastwise vessels up to approximately 500 net registered tons. There is a passenger and cargo service to the Isles of Scilly, which is daily in summer and three-times-weekly in winter, and additionally there is a Trinity House Depot and a Lighthouse Tender based permanently in the Harbour area. There is a Dry-Dock which can accommodate ships of up to 240 feet in length which is continuously in use and the Wet-Dock is used for repairs for ships afloat. At Newlyn small coastwise and foreign going vessels call to load crushed stone from the Newlyn Quarry. At Newlyn, British, French and Belgian trawlers and small French crabbers land fish for sale at the Fish Market there and generally use Newlyn Harbour as a Harbour of refuge. The locally registered fishing fleet now comprises 108 vessels from 70 foot downwards, engaged in fishing operations from middle water trawling to local crabbing and long lining. This figure appears to be decreasing slowly.

Character of Trade - Imports at Penzance are Coal, Cement, artificial manures, and general goods from Home and Foreign ports, and



general goods from Home and Foreign ports, and flowers and vegetables from the Isles of Scilly. Exports from Newlyn are crushed stone of Home and Foreign ports and shell-fish (lobsters) to Franco. Exports from Penzance are general goods to the Isles of Scilly. There is an active Fish Market at Newlyn Harbour. The only passenger traffic in the Port Authority Area is that to and from the Isles of Scilly in the R.M.S. "Scillonian" and "Queen of the Isles". There is no passenger traffic between your ports and any foreign port.
