#### SECTION C.

## Sanitary Circumstances of Area.

- 1. (i) WATER.—No new sources of public supply were brought into use nor any important extensions of the mains carried out during the year. Except in remote areas of the Borough all districts are provided with a piped water supply the quality of which is controlled by filtration and chlorination and frequent bacteriological examinations carried out by the Water Department. In addition 19 samples have been taken by the Sanitary Department, 2 chemical, 17 bacteriological. No district was short of water at any time during the year.

- (iv) SHOPS AND OFFICES.—Informal action taken in the few instances where it was found necessary to administer the provisions of the Shops Act, 1934, resulted in satisfactory arrangements being made.
- (v) CAMPING SITES .- No action taken.
- (vi) SMOKE ABATEMENT.-No action taken.
- (vii) SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS.—The only Bathing Pool within the Borough is, owing to war time conditions, no longer available for the use of the general public.
- (viii) ERADICATION OF BED-BUGS.—Investigations of complaints concerning premises infested by either bugs or fleas made by the Department during the year resulted in disinfestation being carried out at 65 premises. The work in all cases was carried out by the local authority and the methods usually employed were either (1) fumigation by sulphur dioxide gas followed by spraying with one of the proprietory solutions or (2) in cases of mild infestations the use of the second treatment only. 11 premises were found to be infested with bugs and of these 6 were council houses.
- 4. SCHOOLS.—No improvements were effected during the year in the sanitary arrangements or water supply at any of the Council's schools. Action taken by the Council to combat the menace of diphtheria amongst school children is referred to in Section F (i).

SECTION D.

## Housing.

There were no major developments in the housing situation and the unfortunate position of housing refugees in condemned properties was not materially altered during the year. This was due in part to a further shortage of housing accommodation caused by enemy action, for which the Council could not be held responsible. The desirability of finding better accommodation for refugees was however kept before the notice of the appropriate committee.

#### SECTION E.

## Inspection and Supervision of Food.

(a) MILK SUPPLY.—During the year 151 visits were paid to farms and dairy premises. 10 samples of designated milk and 8 samples of ordinary milk were submitted to the Pathological Department of the Royal Cornwall Infirmary, Truro, for bacteriological analysis. In addition 110 samples were taken in connection with the National Milk Advisory Scheme and these were subjected to the Resazurin and Methylene Blue tests at the St. Erth Creameries.

One milk producer in the district was licenced under the Milk (Special Designations) Order to produce T.T. milk and one to produce Accredited milk, whilst two retailers were licenced to sell T.T. milk and two to sell pasteurised milk in the Borough.

(b) MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.—Visits to food premises included 588 to food stores and shops, 351 to markets, 25 to fishmarkets and stalls, besides 2,795 visits to slaughterhouses for purposes of meat inspection. The number of carcases inspected at the time of slaughter or immediately after was:

This table shows a gratifying decrease in diphtheria, scarlet fever, cerebral spinal fever over the cases reported in the preceding year, whilst the number of measles and whooping cough cases showed a remarkable reduction from 417 to 6 and 59 to 16 respectively.

Of the cases shown in the above table as being removed to hospital 37 cases of Diphtheria and 23 cases of Scarlet Fever were isolated at the Borough Infectious Diseases Hospitals at Mount Misery and Madron. The remaining 10 cases of Diphtheria were sent to the County Emergency Isolation Hospital at Truro.

The Council's campaign for Immunisation against Diphtheria which was started in 1941 was continued during the year, regular clinics being held for the treatment of both school children and infants under the age of five years, this work being entirely carried out by the Public Health Department.

During the year 453 children from five to fifteen years of age and 307 under 5 years of age completed the full course of Immunisation. Alum Precipitated Toxiod was the prophylactic used in all cases.

Assistance was also given to outside authorities by permitting children from these areas to attend the Council's Clinics for the purpose of immunisation. 3. Nil Returns.
