

SECTION C.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

(i) WATER: No new sources of public supply were brought into use nor any important extensions of the mains carried out during the year. Except in remote areas of the Borough all districts are provided with a piped water supply, the quality of which is controlled by filtration and chlorination and frequent bacteriological examinations carried out by the Water Department. In addition 26 samples have been taken by the Sanitary Department, 3 for chemical and 23 for bacteriological examination. No district was short of water at any time during the year.

(ii) DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE: No important extensions of the sewerage and drainage arrangements were carried out during the year.

- RIVERS AND STREAMS: These were kept under constant supervision and any complaints as to pollution were promptly investigated.

- (iv) SHOPS AND OFFICES: In the few instances where non compliance with the requirements of the Shops Act occurred, informal action resulted in satisfactory provision being made.
- (v) CAMPING SITES: No action taken.
- (vi) SMOKE ABATEMENT: No action necessary.
- (vii) SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS: The only Bathing Pool within the Borough is, owing to war time conditions, no longer available for the use of the general public.
- (viii) ERADICATION OF BED BUGS: Investigations of complaints concerning premises infested by either bugs or fleas made by the Department during the year resulted in disinfestation being carried out at 69 premises. The work in all cases was carried out by the local authority, and the methods usually employed were either (i) fumigation by sulphur dioxide followed by spraying with one of the proprietory solutions or (ii) in cases of mild infestations by the use of the second treatment only. There was a gratifying decrease in premises infested with bugs, only four cases being discovered, two of which occurred in Council houses, but there was an increase in flea infestation.
- 4. SCHOOLS: Water supplies to all the Council Schools are adequate and satisfactory, provision in this respect having been made from one or other of the Council's main supplies. Sanitary arrangements in most instances are satisfactory and no improvements have been carried out during the year.

SECTION D.

Housing.

There has been no material alteration in the housing situation since I made my annual report for 1942.

SECTION E.

Inspection and Supervision of Food.

(a) MILK SUPPLY: During the year 271 visits were made to farms and dairy premises, 14 samples of designated milk and 3 samples of ordinary milk were submitted to the Pathological Department of the Royal Cornwall Infirmary, Truro, for bacteriological analysis. In addition 257 samples were taken in connection with the National Milk Advisory Scheme and of this number 80 were subjected to resazurin and methylene blue tests at the St. Erth Creameries.

As a result of discussions with milk producers much improvement could be seen in milking technique at many farms, but the evidence adduced from the tests carried out both in our own department and at the St. Erth Creameries shewed that much greater improvement was required before the ultimate objective of a clean wholesome supply of milk for all could be achieved.

Two milk producers in the district were licenced under the Milk (Special Designations) Order to produce T.T. milk and one to produce Accredited milk, whilst one retailer was licenced to sell T.T. milk and two to sell pasteurised milk in the Borough.

(b) MEAT AND OTHER FOODS: Visits to food premises included 445 to food stores and shops, 377 to markets, 55 to fishmarkets and stalls, besides 3,348 visits to slaughterhouses for purposes of meat inspection. The number of carcases inspected at the time of slaughter or immediately after was:

The incidence of Diphtheria has shown an appreciable increase over the preceding year despite the continued campaign for the immunisation of children under school age. This increase may be indirectly attributable to this campaign as a number of carriers have been discovered amongst those immunised. It is believed that immunisation has reduced the virulence of the disease as the percentage of deaths is much lower.

Of the cases shown in the above table as going to hospital 15 cases were admitted to Penzance Isolation Hospital and the remainder were treated at the County Isolation Hospital, Truro. The County Council has been made responsible for the provision of isolation hospital accommodation and in consequence of this the Borough Isolation Hospital at Mount Misery was closed as from the 30th March, 1943.

Regular clinics for the immunisation of children were continued to be held during the year and at the end of 1943, 75 per cent. of children under 5 years of age, and 93 per cent. between 5 and 15 years of age had completed the full course of immunisation. During the year 431 children from 5 to 15 years of age and 378 under 5 years of age were immunised at the Council's Clinic; and Alum Precipitated Toxoid was the prophylactic used in all cases.
