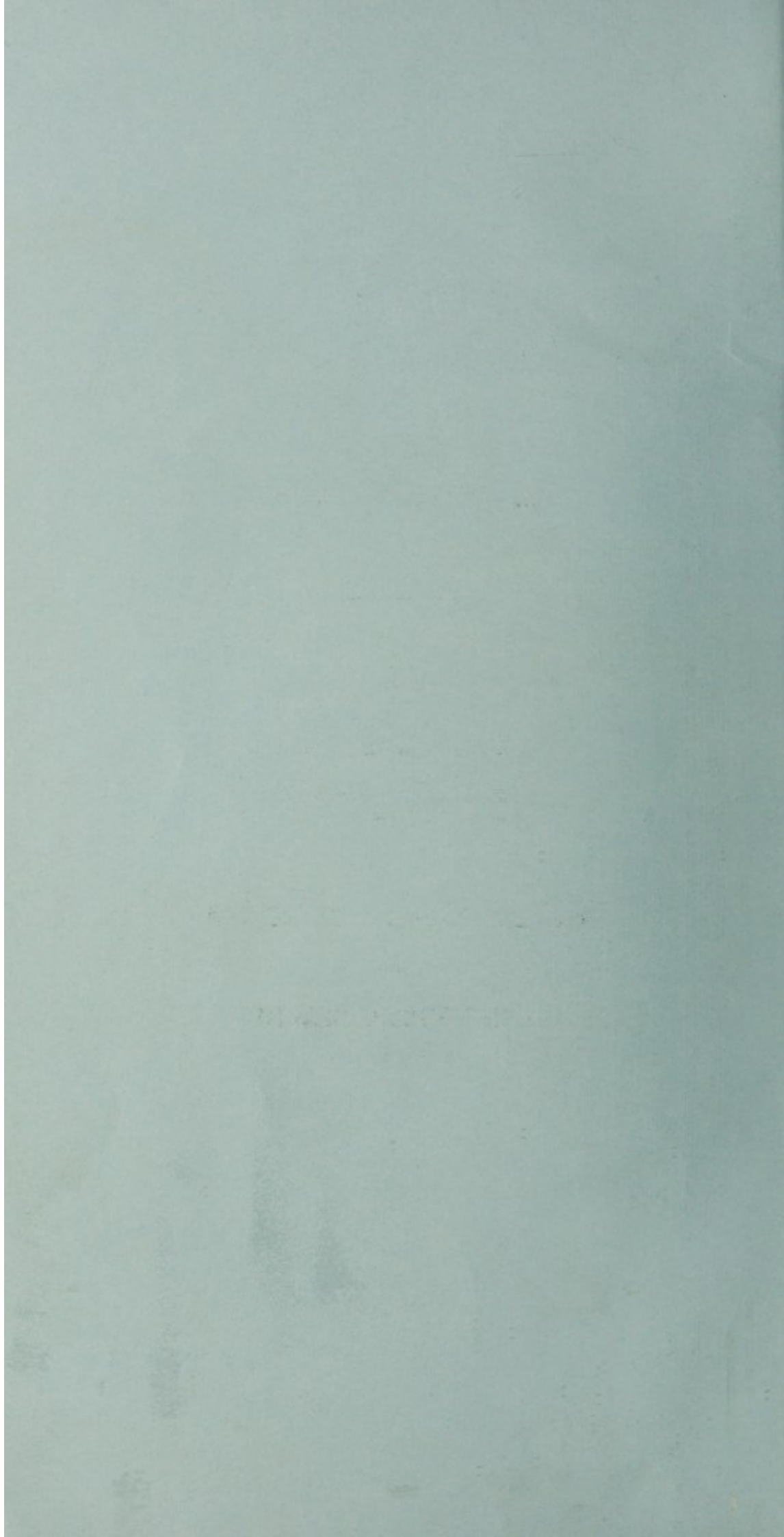

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

The tabulated summaries of the work of the Department in the years 1962, 1963 and 1964 are here brought together under one cover for record purposes. They cannot be expected to do more than give a skeleton outline of the work done in a three year period, which saw the final closure of the last slaughterhouse within the borough boundaries, and the beginning of work under the Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act of 1963 - in the last eight months of 1964 nearly 600 visits to premises registered under the Act were made.

With the cessation of meat inspection as such, there was understandable pressure to reduce the Public Health Inspector establishment to two, and this was done in September, 1962, when Mr. Warburton left to take up another appointment and the vacancy was not filled. I considered this a misguided economy for the major town of this very important holiday area, where an adequate Public Health Inspector coverage is an essential insurance, and the Council showed its agreement with this view in appointing Mr. Kerswell as third Inspector in June, 1964.

In the three year period there were 766 live births and only one maternal death. Immunisation of children against smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, poliomyelitis and tetanus under County Council arrangements continued at a high level and out of all these diseases there were only 8 notifications of whooping cough - continuing example of how preventive medicine can alter the whole face of disease. Not that this should lead to any feeling of complacency, for while none of the more serious infectious diseases occurred in the town, their appearance in other parts of the country led to the surveillance of contacts and others coming from infected areas on a number of occasions. Thus in 1962, with smallpox in the Midlands and in South Wales during the rugby touring season, much follow-up work was necessary. In 1963 the typhoid outbreak in Zermatt, Switzerland, was followed by small outbreaks of typhoid and paratyphoid in various parts of England and Wales, and in June parties of Swedish students visiting the town came under surveillance when Stockholm was declared a locally infected area for smallpox. Then in 1964 came the major typhoid outbreak in Aberdeen, leading to withdrawal from sale of certain batches of corned beef and tinned tongue, in which the Department was of course directly involved. The occurrence of this outbreak on the threshold of the holiday season naturally caused concern to hotels and others expecting visitors from the North and to those who had visited Aberdeen, but no cases resulted.

The usually less sensational, but none the less important diseases of dysentery and food poisoning made sporadic appearances locally during the three years under review, but the Flexner type of dysentery which made its sharp appearance in 1961 did not recur. In June 1962 an elderly resident of St. Michael's Old People's Home died from food poisoning: ten other residents and a member of the staff were affected and I was able to trace the causal organism and its source to home prepared tongue. In another small outbreak in October involving three families, imported tinned chopped pork was suspected and the Ministry of Health were informed: the link was in all probability a single damaged tin, which shows how vitally important it is to maintain the highest possible standard of food

hygiene control. In May and June 1964, there were sporadic cases of dysentery (Sonne) among pupils of Newlyn Infants' School. Some twenty-five families were investigated, and a number of symptomless excretors were found in addition to eight cases amongst the pupils themselves.

In 1964 there were a number of developments of special significance to the future, including a proposal by the County Council that the three Health Areas in the Western part of the County should be amalgamated into two Areas. The effect would be to put a greater load on your own Medical Officer, and the matter was still under consideration at the end of the year. Also in 1964 the County Council required head-teachers to report cases of diarrhoea and vomiting in schools to the Secretary of Education and not to the Medical Officer of Health on the spot - the inevitable result was a slowing down of the arrival of vital information in his hands.

Of more local interest was the report by the Council's Consulting Engineers on two possible ways of dealing with the sewage at present discharged from a number of outfalls above or near the tide line. Both envisaged pumping to one point and then disposal either to sea via a submarine pipe-line, long sea-outfall, or to an inland disposal works. The cost in either case was discouraging, but the Council at least showed itself prepared to look what is a national problem in the face, and one must hope that this will prove merely to be the first step to action on a serious problem.

One cannot conclude this brief glance at the public health situation in the years 1962-64 without recalling that in 1964 Dr. F.D.M. Hocking retired after giving many years of helpful support and advice to this Council and their staff on the bacteriological and chemical aspects of their work: in his place came a new Public Health laboratory in the grounds of the Royal Cornwall Infirmary, Truro, with a full-time bacteriologist, Dr. G.I. Barrow, and staff. Arrangements for chemical analyses were made with Dr. Reynolds who, at his laboratories in Exeter, already acts for a number of Authorities in the West.
