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

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
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
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REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1925.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

With the consent of the County Council I was on the 8th. March 1926 appointed Medical Officer of Health for the Pershore Rural District. My first duty is to refer with deep regret to the death of your Medical Officer of Health, Dr. G.H. Fosbroke.

Dr. Fosbroke was appointed on the 26th. August 1873 as Medical Officer for the Stratford on Avon Combined Sanitary District. He also acted as Medical Officer for the Pershore Rural District since 1891.

Dr. Fosbroke was a pioneer in the Public Health Service and his influence on the health of the County is proved in a remarkable degree by the great decrease in mortality rates.

The Ministry of Health require the Annual Report for 1925 to be a Survey Report so that it is necessary for me to deal as far as I can with progress made in the last five years, and to indicate where necessary any developements of Public Health Services.

Collectively these Associations employ four District Nurses each of whom undertakes General Mursing, Midwifery work and also visits school children, infants and cases of Tuberculosis on behalf of the County Council.

For these services the total amount of the County Council grant to the Associations is £167 per annum.

There are seven midwives practising in your area and this number includes four district nurses.

All the Nurses (together with the midwifery work of the district nurses) are supervised by the County Council.

#### Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

As I have so recently been appointed Medical Officer for the Area it is impossible for me to give in this report the full details asked for by the Ministry of Health but as the Sanitary Inspector has made a fairly comprehensive report on these matters I refer you to the Appendix where his Report will be seen.

#### Water Supply.

In reference to the water supply the Council will remember that on the 4th. February 1926 the Ministry of Health held an enquiry into an application by the District Council for sanction to borrow £42,000 for water supply works, There was little opposition to the scheme and the only point of controversy was the question of the estimated share of the cost to be borne by the parishes concerned. It was pointed out that Eckington would have to pay a very much higher price for its water on the present basis, ie. assessable value, than if the calculation was based on population. The need of a proper water supply was not challenged, but numbers present even asked whether this scheme would allow of a drainage scheme to follow, and also for possible future detelopments in the area.

The scheme affects the parishes of Holy Cross in Pershere, St. Andrew in Pershere, Eckington and Pinvin, upon which the cost would fall.

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#### Inspection and Supervision of Food.

#### Factories and Workshops.

Five defects were found in the Factories and Workshops in the district during the year and these were all remedied.

It was not necessary to refer any nuisance to H.M. Inspector during the year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR 1925. To the Chairman and Members of the Pershore Rural District Council. Mr. Chairman. My Lord, Ladies and Gentlemen, I beg herewith to present to you my second annual report of the work carried out in my department during the year 1925. Water Supplies. The water supply of the district remains, heretofore, shallowwells being the main source of supply. I am gratified to be able to say that the scheme for a supply of water from Overbury is meeting with the approbation of the bulk of the Townspeople of Pershore, and disentients to it are almost negligible this is marked advance in the progress of public opinion here when compared to their attitude to a number of suggested schemes during a period of over 30 years, and it is earnestly hoped that the present scheme will ripen into fruition. The Wyre water supply has continued satisfactory, the supply being abundant for the needs, and no serious trouble was experienced. The Bishampton water supply has continued satisfactory, and the filtering plant has received regular attention. were received during the Sewers.

No works of any magnitude have been done to the sewers in the town of Pershore, slight repairs have been carried out where necessary, road gullies trapped, obstructions cleared, and two manholes were provided to the sewer in Head Street, as it continually gave trouble owing to insufficient fall.

In certain places in the Town the shallow depth of sewers renders it impossible for the bouse drains to be laid with a sufficient fall. It is to be hoped that the Council will be able to give the question of sewerage and sewage disposal their attention when the water scheme is completed.

#### Workshops.

The usual visits of inspection have been paid to them and occupiers have readily carried out any necessary cleansing or repairs.

#### Slaughterhouses.

Two new registrations of slaughterhouses have been made during the year, and one ligcensed slaughter-house has been discontinued.

There are now 11 registered and 2 licensed slaughter-houses in the district. They are all well conducted, and no seizures were made during the year. One carcase of beef affected with generalised tuberculosis was surrendered and destroyed.

#### Scavenging.

The staff for the collection of nightsoil and house refuse in the town of Pershore, still remains 6 men (3 day, 3 night) one of the day men is continually employed at the refuse tip. The question of disposal has been the subject of repeated

Mr. Chairman. My Lord, Ladies and Centlemen,

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reports to the Parochial Committee, and the purchase of the whole of the land adjoining the refuse tip has been investigated by J.C. Dawes, Esq. Inspector to the Ministry of Health. When this matter is settled and the new roadway to land is made, tipping will be carried out in accordance with the Ministry of Health's regulations, and so do away with the existing abominable conditions.

Conversion of privies to pail closets isstill being proceeded with, but considerable opposition is still met with, as owners are hoping for the introduction of proper sewerage

when the water scheme is completed.

#### Housing.

Inspections under the Housing Acts have been carried out as time would permit, increasing duties and responsibilities render it impossible to give the amount of time necessary for this branch of work.

There is a large number of old and worn out cottages scattered throughout the district, most of which are let at very low rents, and in a number of cases no increase in rent has been made over the rental paid in 1914. A large number of them have fallen into a bad state of disrepair, and the question of now putting them into anything like an habitable condition, is practically impossible without the expenditure of more than they are worth. Further than this it has been the repeated experience that the tenants who are agricultural labourers cannot afford to pay any increase in rent, and where they have been compelled to take a Council Houses, the rent has had to be paid at the expense of their stomachs.

The alternative grant of a lump sum subsidy of £75, has certainly been a great inducement to private owners to build their own cottage, and ten applications for the lump sum subsidy

were received during the year.

A large number of cottages are still required to meet the needs of the population, and I hope the Council now they have adopted The Housing (Financial Provisions) Act 1924, will with all possible speed proceed with the erection of cottages in the various parishes where same are needed.

#### Pea and Hop Pickers.

No infectious disease occurred amongst this class of people. The quarters provided for them were found to be clean and improvements recommended have been made.

#### Isolation Hospital.

No alteration has been made in the staff of the Isolation Hospital, but additional nursing staff has been obtained when necessary.

No alterations to the buildings were made, but some alterations were necessary to the disinfector. This is found had not been provided with any means of cleansing the boiler, and I have had the necessary work done.

In conclusion I should like to express my regret at the sad loss by death of Dr. G.H. Posbroke. His kindly and valued advice and assistance, which he was always ready to give are much missed.

Also I beg to thank Dr. M. Clover who has been acting as Deputy M.O.H., for his able guidance and help, and to the Members of the Rural District Council for the confidence they have reposed in me during my year of office.
