GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

General pooling of Hospital accommodation for infectious diseases in the County of Worcester is continued, and works satisfactorily. Cases other than Scarlet Fever and Diphtheria are removed to hospitals outside the area of the local Joint Hospital Board owing to lack of cubicle accommodation, and to shortage of nursing staff.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

Water Supplies.

A total of 1,819 houses is supplied with piped water, derived from springs on the Bredon Hills. A supply to the village of Wyre from the gravel beds of the river Avon serves 75 houses and about 350 persons. The Bredon supply is chlorinated. An arrangement with the Cheltenham Corporation provides an additional supply amounting to about 80,000 gallons daily. 300 persons in about 95 houses are served by standpipes. This represents about 3% of the district population. There is no plumbo-solvency question, and monthly samples have been good.

About 2,320 dwellings - about 60% of the population are solely dependent on well water, a great deal of which is chemically unfit for drinking purposes. It is hoped to supply the great majority of these latter, with piped water obtained from the Coventry Corporation Scheme which will draw water from the River Severn.

Sewage Disposal.

The Consultant's report suggests small schemes to service particular selected areas, as a comprehensive plan is not considered suitable for the whole district.

Housing.

14 Council Houses have been built during the year, and septic tanks with land drainage have been provided for sewage disposal.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Duties under the Food and Drugs Act, 1928/38 are carried out by the Inspector of Weights and Measures. Samples have been taken in addition by the Sanitary Inspector.

No private slaughter houses are in use, all meat being inspected at the Central point in Evesham.

SCARLET FEVER.

Only two cases were notified compared with 13 in 1945.

WHOOPING COUGH.

No notifications were received.

Eight cases were notified, and in two instances the diagnosis was revised leaving a total of 6 cases. One death occurred in a male who came to his home on discharge from the Forces, having been ill for some days. He was not immunised. None of the other cases had been protected. Four cases in children under three occurred in a local Public Assistance Hospital, all of whom made good recoveries, the disease being of a mild type.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION.

241 children in school were given re-inforcing doses during the year. A large number are also primarily immunised by private practitioners. It is estimated that about 75% of the child population between 1 - 14 has been immunised.
