GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

The Infectious Disease Hospitals are under the control of the Regional Hospital Board.

No difficulty has been found in obtaining admissions, and the transport system is satisfactory.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

WATER SUPPLIES.

A total of 2,808 houses with a population of 9,432 is supplied from public mains.

2,098 dwellings with 6,952 persons are dependent on well water supplies. Many of these are unfit for drinking.

Piped water from Cheltenham and Worcester Corporations augment the local main supply.

The River Severn supply for Coventry, will, it is hoped, assist in supplying some villages now using well water.

There is no evidence of plumbo-solvency in the district.

Approximately twelve houses are supplied with stand-pipes.

A scheme for a supply of water to the Parishes of:- Spetchley, Bredicot, Broughton Hackett, Upton Snodsbury, Grafton Flyford, North Piddle, Dormston, Kington, Flyford Flavel, Naunton Beauchamp, Abberton, Bishampton, Throckmorton, Hill and Moor, Fladbury, Cropthorne and Charlton has begun. Some sections are nearing completion and will, it is hoped, begin supplying in 1954.

It is estimated that upon completion of the entire scheme 3,000 persons will have access to piped water.

HOUSING.

During 1953, the Council erected 86 houses, making a total of 427 constructed since the War. 35 were built privately.

The nissen huts occupied by six families at the W.A.A.F. Site, Pinvin are gradually being demolished as houses are found, seven families having been re-housed during the year.

It is noted that about 300 dwellings in the district are in a bad state of repair, forming part of a national problem, the solution of which is at present very difficult.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

In addition to the Inspector of Weights and Measures, samples are taken by the Sanitary Inspector's Staff under the Food and Drugs Acts, 1928 - 38. There are thirty registered premises for the sale of ice-cream which are regularly supervised.

There are no slaughter houses in this area.

No cases of food poisoning were reported during the year.

This case was of a man in an agricultural hostel who was notified after he had attended Hospital for slight muscular weakness of the left lower leg. He had no history of any previous constitutional disturbance, nor had there been any contact with any other cases, as far as could be ascertained. He made a complete recovery.

The death rate - 9.6 - is the lowest recorded since 1940, 66% of the deaths were of persons aged 65 years and over.

The birth rate was 15.5 as against 15.3 for the preceding year.

The number of infants deaths for every 1,000 births was 34 as against the previous annual figure of 29. The actual number of deaths was 10.

The number of cases of tuberculosis notified was 15 against 14 and the number of deaths 2 as against 3 in 1952.

The Housing programme is pursued energetically and is undoubtedly a prime factor in the improvement and maintenance of personal and public health.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN.

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the Sanitary work undertaken by Officers of my Department during the year ended 31st December, 1953.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

The following schemes have been constructed during the year:-

Broughton Hackett.

Scheme for the village involving settlement and aeration.

Defford.

Duplication of existing works to give facilities for 28 houses.

Eckington.

The scheme for the village involving pumping, settlement and rotary distribution is nearing completion.

Pershore.

The scheme for the Town of Pershore is still under consideration.

Bredon.

A complete new disposal works is urgently needed to deal with the combined foul and surface water system.

Pershore (Abbey Grounds).

The disposal works serving the Council's development on the Abbey Grounds Estate is in urgent need of enlargement.

DRAINAGE.

Naunton Beauchamp.

Approximately 170 yards of 12" and 9" sewer were laid to overcome a nuisance near the highway.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

The work of cleansing septic tanks and small sewage disposal works was carried out under Contract at quarterly intervals by a private contractor, namely - Messrs. C.W. Harrison (Contractors) Ltd., of Headington, Oxford.

The County Council undertake the cleansing of street gullies in the Town of Pershore at the moment.

REFUSE AND SALVAGE.

The new tip at the Brickworks (dis-used), Drakes Broughton was opened during the year. Fly nuisance was experienced during the summer months, but in view of improvements effected at the tip, it is hoped this will be diminished.

Contracts have been undertaken with the Royal Engineers and the Worcestershire Regiment for the twice-weekly removal of refuse from their camps at Norton Barracks.

A further contract has been undertaken with the Royal Air Force Station, Pershore, for the thrice-weekly removal of refuse.

SALVAGE.

Owing to the decline in the market price of paper, the revenue was £472, compared with £581 during 1952 and £1,413 in 1951.

Scrap metal and other materials continue to be salvaged.

WATER SUPPLY.

The water supply taken from Overbury Springs is of good quality, this water supply is untreated. The supplies obtained from neighbouring Corporations has similarly been of good quality.

The number of new consumers connected to the mains during the year is 75.

Trouble was again experienced with the maintenance of the public supply due to the inadequacy of the Pershore service reservoir.

The Regional Water Supply Scheme is nearing completion in the northern part of the district.

DISINFECTION.

Approximately fifteen disinfections were carried out using formaldehyde gas and formalin spray, primarily as a result of Scarlet Fever and Tuberculosis.

Arrangements for steam disinfection of bedding and clothing were made in several instances.

The service has continued to operate smoothly, the Operative using A.N.T.U., Red Squill and Zinc Phosphide poisons.

Public Abattoir.

Slaughtering and allocation has been carried out at Stratford-on-Avon during the past year. No trouble has been experienced.

The Ministry of Food have intimated that centralized slaughtering will cease in July, 1954. It is hoped to arrange meetings between the Butchers' Association and the Local Authorities concerned to discuss the arrangements to be brought into force when control ends. It is anticipated that no more than four Butchers in the Pershore Area will wish to undertake individual slaughtering. It appears that local arrangements will present no great difficulty.

HOUSING ACT, 1949.

Eight applications for Improvement Grants were approved during
the year. (one brought forward from previous year).

There has been a reduction in the number of applicants for new houses, but the total on the list is still in excess of 400.

The proposed scheme of sewerage and sewage disposal for the Town of Pershore is of prime importance.

A priority list of village sewerage and sewage disposal schemes was considered by the Council during the year and it is hoped that sewerage schemes for certain of the villages in which housing is required will be proceeded with in the near future.

Although all household and trade refuse is at present being disposed of satisfactorily at Drakes Broughton it is anticipated that the old workings will be completely filled in three to four years time and the question of disposal will again arise.

The solution is probably the construction of a refuse destructor, possibility in conjunction with adjoining Authorities.
