TO THE CHAIRMAN, AND MEMBERS OF THE PERSHORE  
RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the state of the Public Health in the Rural District of Pershore for the year 1962, and the work carried out by your Health Department.

The Registrar General's 1961 Census figures show that the population of the Rural District increased by an average of 130 persons per year in the period since the previous Census of 1951. The year was quiet for notifications of infectious disease, 58 (162). However, this District was fortunate not to be involved by the effects of the importation of smallpox from Pakistan by air. Five separate cases of smallpox were so imported, there having been an outbreak of the disease in Karachi lasting from November 1961 to September 1962. In all there resulted 62 cases of smallpox in the Country as a result of contact with these five cases - 16 in England and 46 in Wales, of which 24 died.

This smallpox incident was reflected in the figures for vaccination and re-vaccination as shown in this report. They were ten times higher than in 1961. Precautionary vaccination and re-vaccination was offered to possible contacts of cases throughout the Country.

Pershore District Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Scheme was almost completed by the end of the year. At the time of writing the works are functioning and each day more connections are being made to the sewers.

I wish to thank members of the Council and their Staff for their help and consideration during the year.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you the Annual Report on the  
state of the Public Health in the Husbands' District of Haverham  
for the year 1961, and the work carried out by your Health  
Department.

The Registrar General's 1961 Census figures show that  
the population of the Husbands' District increased by an average  
of 1.2 persons per year in the period since the previous Census  
of 1951. The year was quiet for notifications of infectious  
diseases, 25 (1951). However, this district was fortunate not  
to be involved by the effects of the influenza of 1960-61  
as indicated by six. Five separate cases of scarlet fever  
were reported, these having been an outbreak of the disease in  
Haverham lasting from November 1961 to September 1962. In  
all there remained 65 cases of scarlet fever in the County as a  
result of contact with these five cases - 16 in Haverham and  
49 in other parts of the County.
