Local springs on Bredon Hill are augmented by bulk supplies obtained from Cheltenham, Worcester and Coventry Corporations, all of whom extract from the River Severn.

There is no evidence of plumbo-solvency in the District.

It will be noted that of the few remaining private supplies only one was satisfactory, bacteriologically, and this was a spring water.

The water supply to a childrens paddling pool was found to be heavily contaminated, and in order to improve matters was disconnected and arrangements made for a supply to be afforded from the public mains.

Seven Chemical Analyses were carried out on waters suspect for reasons varying from possible burst mains, to complaints of taste or deposits.

Local springs in the area are augmented by bulk supplies obtained from Gillingham, Rochester and County Corporation, all of which extend from the river Sever.

There is no evidence of plumb-solvency in the District.

It will be noted that of the few remaining private supplies only one was satisfactory, bacteriologically, and this was a spring water.

The water supply to a building adjoining road was found to be heavily contaminated, and in order to improve matters was disconnected and arrangements made for a supply to be obtained from the public mains.

Seven chemical analyses were carried out on waters sampled for reasons varying from possible iron content, to complaints of taste or deposit.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

Sewers and Sewage Disposal Works are provided and maintained throughout the District as follows :

Pershore and District Sewerage Scheme

This scheme has now been completed, and provides main drainage facilities for the parishes of Pershore, Pinvin, Wick and Wyre Piddle. Sewage from these parishes is delivered to a main Pumping Station at Defford Road, Pershore, and is then pumped to a Sewage Disposal Works at Tiddesley Wood, where it is passed for treatment through upward-flow sedimentation tanks, bacteria beds and humus tanks.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

Refuse Collection and disposal was carried out throughout the District under the direction of the Engineer and Surveyor's Department. Fortnightly collections were given throughout the country districts and weekly collections in the Town of Pershore and at Strensham Service Area. Three refuse collection vehicles were in use during the year.

The contract for refuse collection was also continued with the R.R.E., Pershore.

Paper continued to be salvaged during the year, the revenue amounting to £188.13.9d., compared with £371.0.0d. during 1963. Scrap metal and other materials were also recovered.
