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ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1966

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE PERSHORE
RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the state of the Public Health in the Rural District of Pershore for the year 1966 and the work carried out by your Public Health Department.

The statistics indicate a generally satisfactory state of health in the District, the standardised death rate and the infant mortality rate being below the national average. With reference to the major causes of death, although the number of cases is small, the rising death rate from lung cancer reflects a national trend.

There were no outbreaks of serious infectious disease. There were no cases reported of smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough or poliomyelitis, but if this is to be maintained, full use must be made of the facilities available for immunisation either by family doctors or at the County Council clinics.

I acknowledge with thanks the assistance I have received from Mr. R.G. Warren, Chief Public Health Inspector, and his staff, in the preparation of this report, especially the substantial part of it which is concerned with environmental hygiene.

I should also like to thank members of the Council and their staff for their co-operation and help.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

1. Sanitary Inspection of the Area:

A summary of Inspections by the Public Health Department is given in the statistics at the end of the Report.

2. Water Supply:

A total of 6,261 dwellings with an estimated population of 19,307 are supplied from the public mains.

Local springs on Bredon Hill are augmented by bulk supplies obtained from Cheltenham, Worcester and Coventry Corporations, all of whom extract from the River Severn. The Spring supply obtained from the Overbury side of Bredon Hill is chlorinated before distribution.

There is no evidence of plumbo-solvency in the District.

The results of the analyses of water samples taken during the year are tabulated below.

As in previous years samples were taken of the raw water prior to chlorination and this accounts for the unsatisfactory samples from the Overbury and Westmancote supplies. The remaining unsatisfactory reports relate to two small mains extensions, laid to serve new housing estates, where it proved unusually difficult to obtain a satisfactory report prior to giving permission for the use of same before occupation and connection of the houses.

In addition chemical analyses were carried out both to assist in the detection of mains leakages and complaints of taste. These latter arise solely in the parts of the district supplied with River Severn water.

SECTION C

LABORATORY INVESTIGATION OF THE AREA

1. Laboratory Investigation of the Area:

A summary of investigation by the Public Health Department is given in the statement at the end of the report.

2. Water Supply:

A total of 6,262 dwellings with an estimated population of 19,707 are supplied from the public mains.

Local springs on Brecon Hill are augmented by public supplies obtained from Cheltenham, Worcester and Coventry Corporations. All of which except from the River Sever. The Sever supply obtained from the Coventry side of Brecon Hill is chlorinated before distribution.

There is no evidence of ground-water in the district.

The results of the analysis of water samples taken during the year are tabulated below.

As in previous years, samples were taken of the raw water prior to chlorination and this accounts for the bacteriological results from the Coventry and Worcester supplies. The remaining bacteriological results refer to two well water examinations, both to serve as backup samples, where it proved necessary to obtain a bacteriological report prior to giving permission for the use of same before distribution and consumption of the houses.

In addition chemical analyses were carried out both to assist in the detection of water leakage and quantity of water. These latter analyses in the case of the district supplied with River Sever water.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

Sewers and Sewage Disposal Works are provided and maintained throughout the District as follows:

<u>Bishampton</u>	Sewage pumped to upward-flow sedimentation tank; settled effluent passing percolated filter and humus tank before being discharged to stream.
<u>Bredon</u>	Village sewered on 'combined' system. Sewage received, primary settlement and effluent is then discharged by feed channels for land treatment.
<u>Broughton Hackett</u>	Small gravity works, with settlement tank, filter and humus tank.
<u>Crothorne</u>	Crude sewage pumped to upward flow sedimentation tank; settled effluent passing through percolating filter and humus tank before being discharged to river.
<u>Defford</u>	Gravity works with settlement and filtration.
<u>Drakes Broughton</u>	Settled effluent pumped for filtration, followed by settlement of humus.
<u>Eckington</u>	Partially separate system. Sewage pumped to horizontal-flow sedimentation tanks, settled effluent gravitating to percolating filters, followed by settlement of humus.
<u>Kington</u>	Settled effluent pumped to percolating filter, followed by humus settlement.

Sewage from the parishes of Pershore, Pinvin, Wick and Wyre Piddle is delivered to a main pumping station in Defford Road, Pershore, from whence it is pumped via a 12" diameter Rising Main to the Sewage Disposal Works at Tiddesley Wood. Here it is passed for treatment through upward-flow sedimentation tanks, bacteria beds and humus tanks before being discharged to Bow Brook.

Sewerage

The Council's Consulting Engineers are preparing major sewerage and sewage disposal schemes for the undermentioned areas in the Rural District, viz:-

- a. Fladbury, Charlton, Elmley Castle and Bricklehampton.
- b. Bredon, Kinsham, Bredons Norton and Bredons Hardwicke.
- c. Drakes Broughton, Wadborough, Stoulton, Peopleton, Norton and Whittington.

a and b are to be the subject of Enquiries by the Ministry early in 1967 and it is hoped that these will be allowed to proceed. The provisions of main drainage facilities in the above areas will solve drainage problems which up to date have proved insoluble.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Refuse Collection and disposal was carried out throughout the District under the direction of the Engineer and Surveyor's Department. Fortnightly collections were given throughout the country districts and weekly collections in the town of Pershore and at Strensham Service Area.

The contract for refuse collection was also continued with the R.R.E., Pershore.

The Council is in the process of supplying Dust Bins to householders throughout the District to ensure a standardised refuse receptacle and to limit the use of unsatisfactory containers.
