

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1969

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE PERSHORE
RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the state of the Public Health in the Rural District of Pershore for the year 1969, and the work carried out by your Public Health Department.

The statistics indicate a generally satisfactory state of health in the District, and compare favourably with the figures for England and Wales as a whole.

There were only 2 notifications of measles as compared with 104 in the previous year, but we had 56 notifications of infective jaundice. This was the first complete year of notification of this disease, and we have no previous figures for comparison, but I think that the disease was unusually prevalent in this District in the early months of 1969. The number of cases of infective jaundice notified in England and Wales in 1969 was 11,926.

I acknowledge with thanks the assistance I have received from Mr. R.G. Warren, Chief Public Health Inspector, and his staff, in the preparation of this report, especially in the large part of it concerned with environmental health.

I should also like to thank Members of the Council and their staff for their continued co-operation and help.

2. Water Supply:

A total of 6,860 dwellings with an estimated population of 20,650 are supplied from the public mains.

With the formation of the South West Worcestershire Water Board on the 1st April, the Council ceased to be responsible for the maintenance of the public water supplies throughout the area.

The main sources of supply continue as in previous reports, the S.W.W.W.B. having assumed responsibility for the Springs supply on Bredon Hill and also the Worcester City River Severn abstraction works. Bulk supplies are still obtained from the Coventry and Cheltenham Corporations.

Water Supply

A total of 6,500 dwellings with an estimated population of 30,000 are supplied from the public water.

With the formation of the South West Water Board on the 1st April, the Council ceased to be responsible for the maintenance of the public water supplies throughout the area.

The main sources of supply continue as in previous reports, the S.W.W.B. having assumed responsibility for the sewage supply on Freedom Hill and also the Worcester City River Sewerage Station works. Data supplied are still obtained from the Council and Gloucester Corporation.

Sewage from the Parishes of Pershore, Pinvin, Wick and Wyre Piddle is delivered to a main pumping station in Defford Road, Pershore, from whence it is pumped via a 12" diameter Rising Main to the Sewage Disposal Works at Tyddesley Wood. Here it is passed for treatment through upward-flow sedimentation tanks, bacteria beds and humus tanks before being discharged to Bow Brook.

Work commenced on Phase I of the scheme which covers the enlargement of the Sewage Disposal Works at Tyddesley Wood, and which includes the provision of Heated Sludge Digestion equipment. Phase I should be completed during the latter part of 1970, and it is intended that Phase 2 shall follow almost immediately.

Several and Sewage Treatment Works are provided and maintained throughout District as follows:-

- Thompson
Sewage pumped to upward-flow sedimentation tank; settled effluent passing through percolating filter and human tank before being discharged to stream.
- Eden
Village Sewer on 'combined' system. Sewage received, primary settlement and effluent is then discharged by tank channels for land treatment.
- Southon Road
Small gravity works, with settlement tank, filter and human tank.
- Wharfedale, Great
A 'combined' small Extended Section filter, followed by an upward flow clarifier.
- Wharfedale, Little
Sewage pumped to upward-flow sedimentation tank, settled effluent passing through percolating filter to human tank.
- Southon
Small Sewage pumped to upward-flow sedimentation tank; settled effluent passing through percolating filter and human tank before being discharged to river.
- Ilford
Gravity works with a filter and filtration.
- Wharfedale, Great
Sewage pumped to duplicate upward-flow sedimentation tanks, followed by filtration and settlement of human tank.

Sewage from the houses of Parkside, Ilkley, which was taken to a main pumping station in Parkside Road, Ilkley, from where it is pumped via a 12" diameter main to the Sewage Disposal Works at Wharfedale Wood. There it is passed for treatment through upward-flow sedimentation tanks, human tank before being discharged to the Brook.

With reference to Item I of the report which covers the improvement of the sewage treatment works at Wharfedale Wood, and which includes the provision of a new sewage treatment plant. There I should be corrected during the latter part of 1970, and it is intended that Item 5 shall follow almost immediately.

Sewerage

Work commenced on both the Bredon and the South Eastern Area Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Schemes. In neither case has provision been made for the treatment of sewage sludge, it being intended that the crude sludge shall be transported to the Pershore Works for treatment in the Heated Digestion Plant.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Refuse collection and disposal is controlled through the Engineer & Surveyor's Department.

During the year, a weekly collection of Refuse has been maintained throughout the whole of the Rural District.

The Council has one centralised controlled tip at Throckmorton.
