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

1. Sanitary Inspection of the Area:

A summary of Inspections by the Public Health Department is given in the statistics at the end of the Report.

2. Water Supply:

A total of 7,146 dwellings with an estimated population of 19,898 are supplied from the public mains.

The South West Worcestershire Water Board is responsible for the maintenance of the public water supplies throughout the area.

The main sources of supply are the Springs supply on Bredon Hill and the Worcester City River Severn abstraction works. Bulk supplies are obtained from the Coventry and Cheltenham Corporations.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

Sewers and Sewage Disposal Works are provided and maintained throughout the District as follows:-

<u>Bishampton</u>	Sewage pumped to upward-flow sedimentation tank; settled effluent passing percolating filter and humus tank before being discharged to stream.
<u>Bredon</u>	The village has been re-sewered and a new sewage disposal works constructed. The plant is of conventional design, but is equipped with mechanically scraped Sedimentation and humus tanks. Sludge is transported by tanker to the Pershore Works for treatment in the Heated Digestion Plant.
<u>Broughton Hackett</u>	Small gravity works, with settlement tank, filter and humus tank.
<u>Comberton, Great</u>	The village is at present being sewered, having been included in the South Eastern Area Sewerage Scheme. Upon completion, the existing Extended Aeration Plant will be removed.
<u>Comberton, Little</u>	Sewage pumped to upward-flow sedimentation tank, settled effluent passing through percolating filter to humus tank.
<u>Crothorne</u>	The Sewage Disposal Works has been extended in order that the flows from the additional villages of Fladbury, Charlton, Bricklehampton, Elmley Castle and Great Comberton may be treated. As in the case of Bredon, sludge is transported Pershore Works for treatment.
<u>Defford</u>	Gravity works with settlement and filtration.

Pershore

Phase 1 of the scheme covering the enlargement of the Sewage Disposal Works at Tyddesley Wood has been completed and the Heated Sludge Digestion Plant is working satisfactorily. Work on Phase 2 of the scheme is now in progress, and this includes the provision of new Sedimentation Tanks, Bacteria Beds and Humus Tanks, and the conversion of the original Humus Tanks to upward flow clarifier. A duplicate Rising Main is also being laid from Defford Road Pumping Station to the works.

Sewerage

Stage 2 of the Bredon Sewerage Scheme has been completed, and work has commenced on Stage 3. This will provide main drainage facilities in the villages of Bredons Norton, Kinsham and Bredons Hardwick.

With the exception of a little work in Great Comberton the South Eastern Area Scheme has also been completed. This scheme has included the enlargement of the existing sewage disposal works at Cropthorne, and the sewerage of Fladbury, Charlton, Elmley Castle, Bricklehampton and Great Comberton.

In Pershore a Relief Sewer has been constructed between the Station Road Housing Estate and the town, and much work has been carried out to separate foul drainage and surface water upstream of the new sewer.

Work has commenced on the construction of a new Trunk Surface Water Sewer to serve the town of Pershore.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

A weekly collection of refuse is maintained throughout the Rural District, the service being controlled by the Engineer and Surveyor's Department. The Council has one controlled tip at Throckmorton.
