RURAL DISTRICT OF PETERBOROUGH.Abbreviated Report for the year 1939.

The Birth rate of 17.0 is 2 per 1000 more, the Death rate of 11.9 is 0.2 less and the Infantile Mortality Rate of 45.4 is 4.6 less than the corresponding figures for England and Wales.

LABORATORY FACILITIES.

Great use was made of the Emergency Public Health Laboratory Ministry of Health. A contract for examinations of throat swabs, blood, urine and faeces, has now been made with the Medical Research Council at a rate of £10. 0. 0. per annum. Specimens are sent to Dr. Fulton, The Emergency Laboratory, Peterborough Memorial Hospital.

The plan is excellent and is of great benefit.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

There has been little infectious disease during the year: 11 cases of Scarlet Fever and 1 of Diphtheria. Hospital accommodation is provided at the Peterborough Isolation Hospital at a weekly charge of £3. 3. 0. per patient.

Accommodation has proved adequate.

EVACUATION SCHEME.

Some 300 evacuee children were billeted in the District; there was no increase of infectious disease compared with the normal and no undue amount of illness.

HOSTELS AND SICK BAYS.

This Council, in conjunction with the Rural District of Barnack and the Borough of Stamford opened Barn Hill House, Stamford as a Sick Bay and Hostel for children in their area.
