I herewith submit my Annual Report for the year 1946. The high birth rate of 21.3, low infantile mortality rate 22.3 and an exceptionally low incidence of infectious diseases, with only a slightly higher death rate in spite of a severe winter, show that the health of the community has been very satisfactory.

SECTION 3. GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES OF THE AREA

# 1. (a) LABORATORY FACILITIES

By contract with Emergency Public Health Laboratory, Peterborough Memorial Hospital, at £10 per annum.

# (b) AMBULANCE FACILITIES

Infecticus cases are removed by the Peterborough City Isolation Hospital ambulance.

Non-infectious cases rely on ambulance from Peterborough. No ambulance service is provided by either the County or District Council.

### (c) NURSING IN THE HOME

No provision is made by this Council for either General Nursing or Nursing of Infectious Diseases.

General Mursing

Castor & District Mursing Association provide one District Murse whose services are available for the villages of Castor, Ailsworth, Upton, Sutton, Marhelm and Helpston. The Association is maintained by voluntary effort and receives an annual grant of £20 from the County Council.

from the County Council. A District Mursing Association providing the much needed service of one nurse has now been formed in the Glinton group of villages.

(d) TREATMENT CENTRES AND CLINICS

No centre or clinics in the District.

(e) HOSPITALS

Non-Infectious cases are admitted to the

Peterborough Memorial Hospital Infectious cases - Patients suffering from notifiable infectious diseases are admitted to the Peterborough City Isolation Hospital, at a weekly charge of £3.3.0. per case, with additional charge for the use of ambulance.

# SECTION C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

1. (1) WATER. A piped supply obtained from the Peterborough City Corporation mains is provided for every village. Water has been adequate in quantity, no chemical or bacteriological tests have been made directly on behalf of the Council.

> It is estimated that 1430 or 75% of the houses occupied by approximately 4,290 inhabitants are supplied direct from water mains, the remaining 25% of houses occupied by some 1,431 persons obtain water from stendpipes.

# (2) DRAINAGE AND SEWAGE

Eye - Sewage disposal plant satisfactory.

One village only, Eye, has a water carriage system of sewage disposal, the remainder use cesspits and old parish drains. Preliminary plans for the sewerage of the whole district have been prepared and sent to the Ministry of Health. Final plans are being prepared.

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## PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Collection of house refuse and night soil is carried out by contract.

No provision for a controlled Bradford system for disposal of house refuse exists owing to difficulties of obtaining the necessary site. Disposal by either controlled tipping or incineration is necessary.

With no diptheria and only three cases of Soarlet Fever and 6 Whooping Cough, the incidence of infectious disease in the District during 1946 has been the lowest on record.

A small outbreak of dysentery was investigated in Jenuary. The 15 known cases, all in one village, were mostly amongst children. Two children, positive to Sonne organisms were found.

# HOSFITAL ACCOMMODATION

Cases are admitted to Peterborough Isolation Hospital at a weekly charge of £3.3.0. per patient; no particular number of beds being guaranteed. During the year, all requests for admission have been granted.

## DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION

Free immunisation is provided by the County Council for all children of school and pre-school age.
