To the Chairman and Councillors of the Peterborough Rural District Council,

Lady and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for 1960.

The health of the district remained good. The birth rate and infant mortality rate are similar to those of the country as a whole, Of the 3 infant deaths, 2 occurred in the first week of life. It is pleasing to note that there were no maternal deaths.

The death rate at 8.3 per 1,000 compares favourable with that of England and Wales generally (11.5).

Very few cases of infectious disease were notified, and there were no deaths from these causes. Two new cases of tuberculosis were discovered. There were fortunately no cases of poliomyelitis.

The Method of Disposal of Condemned Food.

Condemned meat from the three slaughter-houses, which is negligible these days, is disposed of to a firm dealing in wasteproducts.

It was not found necessary to carry out any special examination of a stock or consignment of food.

All ice-cream sold from premises in the district is prepacked and kept in standard type refrigerators.

Annual Report of the Public Health Inspector, Surveyor and Water Engineer For the Year 1960.

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Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my third Annual Report.

Good progress has been made with regard to the provision of main drainage. The scheme for Deeping Gate was completed just before the end of the year and the sewers in Etton are expected to be "live" early in 1961. The bulk of the sewers in Peakirk have been laid and are awaiting the completion of the pumping station opposite the Wildfowl Gardens. Progress in Helpston has been slow due to rock, but this village should be sewered during the summer of 1961.

97% of the properties in Glinton are connected to the sewers and there are only 17 houses remaining to have bucket closets converted to W.C.'s. This good progress has been accelerated by the availability of the Standard Improvement Grant for the provision of modern amenities.

Progress on sewer connections and pail closet conversions at Castor and Ailsworth continued to be good so that there now remain only 27 properties to be connected and 33 to have pail closets converted.

The number of applications for Improvement Grants, more particularly the Standard type, again showed an increase and it is pleasing to report that the standard of housing in the district has been improved considerably as a result.

With the development of private estates at Ailsworth, Glinton, Helpston and Northborough, there was a large increase in the number of private houses erected and approved. This is largely the result of the provision of main drainage and partly due to the fact that there is only limited building land available in the City and the increasing desire to live in the country.

The Council continued with small building schemes and made preliminary investigations into the building of an old people's home with communal facilities in the Parish of Eye.

Work on improving the pre-war Council houses was continued. All houses at Ailsworth, Castor and Glinton how have modern amenities and paving slab paths are being provided over a period of years. Contracts were let for the modernisation of the houses at Etton and Peakirk. A good deal of maintenance work on the older type of house, such as replacement of obsolete sinks and grates, electrical work and the treatment of damp walls, was carried out.

The Council doclared two Clearance Areas, both in the Parish of Eye, affecting seven houses and a number of individual unfit properties were dealt with by way of Closing and Demolition Orders.

Public Health work, such as routine inspections of shops, factories and food promises was again curtailed owing to pressure of other work, but the licensed promises were kept under review and several improvements have been made.

Applications were obtained from the occupiers of all caravan sites in the district under the new Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act 1959. These were passed to the County Planning Committee for their consideration, with the exception of one site at Eye, for which a site licence was issued.

The demand for the cesspool emptying service decreased slightly during the year, due to the provision of main drainage at Glinton.

Public Health Work.

Infectious Diseases.

I was not called on to carry out any enquiries or disinfection work in this connection.

National Assistance Act 1948 (Section 50).

There were no cases dealt with during the year.

Public Health Act - Complaints.

27 complaints were received during the year and these were dealt with by informal action.

Milk and Dairies Regulations.

There is only one registered dairy in the district and this is used only for the storage of bottled milk. All milk sold in the area is bought in bottles from premises outside the district.

Under a new Act, responsibility for the issuing of licences has now passed to the County Council.

Slaughterhouses.

The three slaughter-houses attached to butchers' shops have been kept in a reasonable condition having regard to their age and structural condition. All occupiors have intimated that they are not prepared to bring their premises up to the standard required by the new regulations and if the Council's slaughter-house report is accepted by the Minister, the slaughter-houses will cease to be used as from July 1962.

Meat Inspection.

A total of 201 visits was paid to butchers' shops and slaughterhouses during the year and the following carcases and offal examined :-

Only a few complaints were received and most tenants and owners find it cheaper to carry out their own disinfestation treatments.

Housing. Private Building.

A total of 76 dwellings was completed by private enterprise during the year, an increase of 35 on the figure for 1959. They were distri-buted in the following Parishes :-

Ailsworth 20. Castor 2. Eye 8. Glinton 5. Helpston 2. Marholm 4. Maxey 9. Newborough 7. Northborough 17. Peakirk 1.

The total number of private properties built since 1946 now stands at 387.

There are now 69 properties in the course of erection and these are distributed as follows :-

Ailsworth 13. Deeping Gate 2. Etton 2. Eye 5. Glinton 7. Helpston 16. Marholm 2. Maxey 3. Newborough 1. Northborough 17. Peakirk 1.

Improvement Grants. (a) Discretionary Grants.

A total of 16 applications for improving 17 properties was approved during the year, a decrease of 6 on 1959. The total amount approved for Grant was £5,321 (an average of £332 per dwelling).

8 grants were for tenanted properties and 8 for owner/ occupiers.

At the end of the year work was completed at 4 properties and in progress at 9 others. 1 application was refused.

(b) Standard Grants.

A total of 37 applications was received and 36 were approved for the following amenities to be provided :-

> Baths 25. Washbasins 25. W.C.'s 35. Hot-water supplies 29. Larders 19.

17 applications were for tenanted properties and 20 for owner/ occupiers.

Work was complete at 20 properties and in progress at 9 others.

The houses concerened were distributed in the following Parishes :-

Ailsworth 1. Castor 5. Deeping Gate 1. Eye 2. Glinton 16. Holpston 5. Maxoy 1. Peakirk 1. Sutton 5.

Council Houses. (a) Building.

14 houses were built during the year. 8 were at Eyebury Road, Eye; 4 at Willow Drove, Borough Fen and 2 at Thorolds Way, Castor.

38 dwollings were under construction at the end of the year. Eye 22 houses (including 16 with garages and 2 two-bedroom type in The Crescent); 4 houses at Deeping Gate; 6 houses and 4 bungalows at Worrington Bridge Road, Newborough, and 2 bungalows at Peakirk.

Land was purchased at Hodney Road, Eye, with a view to the crection of a grouped home scheme for old people and negotiations were in progress for land at Stocks Hill, Castor and a small site at Peakirk where it is proposed to rebuild following demolition of three sub-standard properties.

(b) Improvements.

W.C.'s and washbasins were instabled in all pre-war houses at Ailsworth, Castor and Glinton. The work of installing washbasins in 59 pre-war houses at Eye was substantially completed at the end of the year.

Paving slab paths were laid to pre-war houses at Ailsworth, Borough Fen, Castor and Newborough.

A contract was let to provide washbasins and W.C.'s in the prewar houses at Etton and Peakirk and plans and specifications were prepared for similar work to the houses in Helpston.

(c) Maintenance.

There was no external painting carried out during the year.

The work of replacing obsolete shallow sinks by deep sinks and the bringing up to standard of electric wiring, was continued.

Slum Clearance.

Two clearance areas affecting 7 properties, all in the Parish of Eye, were declared and confirmed by the Minister.

Plans under Building Byelaws.

209 plans were submitted under Building Byelaws compared with 181 in 1959.

A large number of these were for new dwellings, particularly in the Parishes of Glinton, Helpston and Northborough and this reflects the rapid growth of the district.

Public Cleansing.

(a) Cesspool Emptying.

The scheme again ran smoothly, apart from a few occasions when the vehicle was off the road for repairs, but considering it is ten years old, it still gives good service.

The number of tanks emptied during the year was 617. Of these, 260 were at Council houses, 5 in adjoining districts and 352 at private houses in this district, distributed as follows :-

The tanker has also been used for flushing sewers and drains and the emptying of sumps at sewerage pumping stations.

(b) Night Soil Collection.

The Council ceased collecting night soil in Ailsworth and Castor on March 31st. The work is being carried on privately to cater for the few properties still with pail closets.

The Council gave notice of termination of the service at Glinton as from March 31st. 1960 and this will be followed shortly by similar notice for Etton, Helpston and Peakirk.

Few complaints were received during the year.

(c) Refuse Collection.

The collection of house refuse is carried out fortnightly by contract. Few complaints were received, but several householders objected to the fact that paper and cardboard are not collected under the terms of the contract.

Drainage and Sewerage Disposal.

The scheme for Deeping Gate was completed at the end of the year and a few houses were connected up.

90% of properties in Glinton are now connected to the sewers and there remain only 17 to have pail closets converted to W.C.'s.

There remain only 27 properties at Ailsworth and Castor to be connected to the sewer and 33 (excluding those scheduled for slum clearance) to have pail closets converted to W.C.'s. The laying of sewers in Etton was completed and work was substantially complete at Peakirk. Progress in Helpston was slow because of rock, but it is anticipated that these three villages will have main drainage working by the Summer of 1961.

The scheme for the Parishes of Marholm, Maxey, and Northborough was ready to submit to the Ministry, but was delayed pending consultations with the Planning Authority as to the future growth of the villages.

Water Supply.

The total quantity of water purchased in bulk from the City of Peterborough was 94,951,000 gallons, a decrease of a little over 2 million gallons on that purchased the previous year. It must be remembered, however, that the figure for that year was abnormal due to the very dry summer and the large number of burst mains.

47 licences were issued during the year to store petroleum spirit for private use and sale and the total fees collected amounted to £33. 10. Od.
