PETERBOROUGH RURAL DISTRICT

I took up my duties as Medical Officer of Health to the Peterborough Rural District on April 1st, 1965, on my appointment as an Assistant Medical Officer of Health to the Huntingdon and Peterborough County Council.

Prior to my appointment, Dr. George Nisbet, the County Medical Officer, had acted as District Medical Officer of Health, since March, 1962. I should like to take this opportunity to express my thanks to Dr. Nisbet for his help and advice.

Population

The estimated population for mid-1965 is, according to the Registrar-General, exactly 9,000, an increase of 240 on last year's estimate of 8,760.

Statistics

The live birth rate of 20.3 per 1,000 population is higher than that of the previous year which was 20.0, and also again higher than the rate for England and Wales, which is provisionally given as 18.1.

The death rate of 8.6 is slightly above the figure for 1964, which was 8.2 per 1,000 of population, but is well below the rate for the country as a whole, which is 11.5. Twenty-three of the 78 deaths which occurred in the district in 1965 were due to malignant disease and leukaemia, five of the deaths being due to carcinoma of the lung or bronchus. Fifteen deaths were due to coronary disease, nine to vascular lesions of the nervous system, and nine to other heart disease. These 56 deaths account for approximately 72% of the total.

It is most satisfactory to report that there were no deaths in infants under one year of age. The infant mortality rate is, therefore, zero (0.0) compared with a rate of 19.0 for England and Wales as a whole.

Conclusion

The health of the District in 1965 was most satisfactory, as it shown by the above statistics.

As a new comer to the area I have greatly valued the help given by my colleagues, the Clerk of the Council, by members of the Committee, by Mr. Dunford and the clerical staff of the County Health Department, to all of whom I express my thanks.

I have the honour to present my 1st. Annual Report in respect of the year 1965 as follows:-

REFUSE COLLECTION.

Collection of household refuse is carried out by a private contractor under the terms of a three year contract, with vehicles provided by the Council. The contract provides for 50 collections per year, and tipping is carried out by arrangement at two tips, one situated outside the rural district.

A pilot scheme using paper sacks is in operation on one council housing estate and appears to be working well. It is considered that this scheme should be extended gradually to include other small council estates in other parishes.

PETROLEUM ACTS 1928 etc.

50 current annual licences are now in force in respect of the bulk storage of petroleum mixtures at 50 premises.

14 inspections were carried out during the year.

IMPROVEMENT GRANTS.

CARAVAN SITES.

11 sites are licenced under the terms of the Caravan Sites and control of Development Act, 1960.

The three principle multiple sites are situated in Eye being licenced respectively for 6, 15, and 100 caravans. The site licence conditions have been re-viewed with a view to improving site standards, but the new standard has still to be implemented by the site operators.

Contract works to improve the supply situation at Eye are in progress and when completed will make adequate provision for the new development in that village.

WATER CONSUMPTION.

Bulk water consumption for the district was 137.009 million gallons equivalent to 43 gallons per head per day for all purposes. Bulk consumption shows an increase of 4.5 million gallons over last year.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

No investigations were required to be made during the year.

No call was made on this service during the year.

During the year all food premises were provided with a notice for display, requesting customers not to allow dogs in premises in which food is sold. Proprietors were also supplied with an explanatory leaflet setting out the provisions of the Food Hygiene Regulations.

DRAINAGE and SEWERAGE.

The sewerage schemes for the villages of Marholm, Maxey and Northborough were completed during the early part of the year. Newborough is now the only parish of appreciable size not provided with sewerage facilities, and a report from the Consulting Engineers on the sewerage of this parish has been accepted.

Trouble has been experienced at Peterborough Road, Eye pumping station largely due to the fact that the capacity of the Peterborough Corporation sewer at Newark is insufficient to cope with the combined output from the Eye pumping station, at times of heavy storm. This has necessitated adjustments to the overflow weir at the Eye station which has on occasions resulted in pollution of the ditch into which the overflow is connected. Joint meetings have been held between the two Authorities to discuss the problems involved, and the Nene and Welland River Authority are aware of the situation.

73 properties have been connected to main sewers during the year.

CESS-POOL EMPTYING.

Cess-pools and septic tanks continue to be emptied by contract which provides for two free emptyings per year where the properties are more than 100 feet from a main sewer.

305 tanks were emptied during the year, a decrease of 145 from the previous year.

NIGHT SOIL COLLECTION.

This service is provided by contract in the parishes of Newborough, Borough Fen, Maxey and Northborough. As sewers are now available in Maxey and Northborough the service will cease in these parishes in September 1966. The number of properties then receiving the service will be approximately 70.

The Technical Assistant at Peterborough Rural District Council was also appointed jointly to both Authorities in the capacity.

The Resident Engineer (now that existing contracts are coming to and end) is to be appointed Building and Works Inspector.

These arrangements appear to be working well.
