Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the health of the District for the year 1967.

On March 31st, 1968, I completed three years as your Medical Officer of Health. I am, therefore, now familiar with the area and its officials, to all of whom I express my thanks.

POPULATION:

The estimated population for mid-1967, according to the Registrar-General is 9,280 - an increase of 250 on last year's estimate of 9,030.

STATISTICS:

The live birth rate of 19.3 per 1,000 population, is below that of 1966, which was 21.3, but is higher than the rate for England and Wales as a whole, which is given as 17.2. The birth rate in the Peterborough Rural District is usually higher than that for the country as a whole.

The infant mortality rate of 22.3 per 1,000 live births is somewhat above the rate for England and Wales, which is 18.3. It is unusual for our rate to be above the national rate.

The death rate of 10.1 per 1,000 is above the figure for last year, when our rate was 8.7. It is, however, below that for England and Wales as a whole, which is estimated as 11.2.

Twelve deaths were due to malignant disease, including two deaths from cancer of the lung. Coronary disease and angina accounted for twenty-five deaths, and other heart disease for eighteen. There were, again, no deaths from tuberculosis disease. There were two deaths from suicide, and two from motor vehicle accidents.

CONCLUSION:

As will be noted from the statistics given above, the health of the district was satisfactory in 1967, and calls for no comment.

The illegitimate live births per centage of total births is rather high - 7.8%, compared with 6.7% in the previous year.

I should like to express my thanks to the Clerk of the Council, the Public Health Inspector, and to the Chairman and Members of the Committee for their continued help and co-operation.

I have the honour to present my 3rd Annual Report in respect of the year 1967 as follows:-

NUISANCES

REFUSE COLLECTION

Collection of household refuse is carried out by a private contractor under the terms of a three year contract, with vehicles provided by the Council. The contract provides for 50 collections per year, and tipping is carried out by arrangement at the Peterborough Corporation tip in the City of Peterborough.

PETROLEUM ACTS 1928 etc.

48 current annual licences are now in force in respect of the bulk storage of petroleum mixtures at 48 premises, being one less than in the previous year.

14 inspections were carried out during the year.

IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

The number of applications represent a 47% increase over the previous year.

CARAVAN SITES

7 sites are currently licenced under the terms of the Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960, 4 in respect of single caravans.

The three multiple sites are situated in the village of Eye, and are licenced for (a) 6, (b) 15, and (c) 100 caravans respectively.

The licence of site (a) expired on 31st December 1967. Application for re-newal has not been made, and the site will now be cleared.

Site conditions in respect of site (b) have not been complied with, and statutory enforcement action is pending.

21 inspections were made during the year.

RODENT CONTROL

The Annual Report in the form required by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food is presented as Appendix II.

Most occupiers again found it cheaper to carry out treatments for themselves than to request this service from the Council, which is carried out on a re-chargeable basis if request is made. I am doubtful whether reports of rodent infestation are made as frequently as they would be if this service was provided free to occupiers of domestic properties, and with existing staffing resources it is not possible to carry out extensive routine inspections throughout the district.

This water was of suitable chemical quality for human consumption, domestic use and dairy purposes.

Plumbo-solvency - Chemical analysis of a sample of water taken after contact with lead service pipe for 21 days showed that the sample contained Lead (as Pb) - less than 0.01 mg. per litre, which is within accepted permissible limits.

## OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

29 inspections were made. The Annual Report in the form required by the Ministry of Labour is presented as Appendix III.

## DRAINAGE & SEWERAGE

The sewerage system has again worked well in all the parishes where main drainage has been provided.

I must again make reference to the urgent necessity for a main drainage scheme at Newborough. Current planning applications are being refused as a matter of policy, but it is a matter for concern that 90 sites have existing planning permission and must be dependant upon septic tanks in a locality where such tanks are likely to result in nuisance due to the high water table. No progress can be reported since my last report except to re-iterate that the draft scheme prepared has been held up until satisfactory outfall facilities are available within the City boundary, and these cannot be finalised until details of the City expansion programme are settled.

## CESS-POOL EMPTYING

Cess-pools and septic tanks continue to be emptied by contract which provides for two free emptyings per year where the properties are more than 100 feet from a main sewer.
