TO THE MEMBERS OF THE PETERBOROUGH RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the health of the district for the year 1969.

As I leave to take up another appointment I should like to take this opportunity to express my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Committee for their ever ready help during the four years I have been the Medical Officer, and also to the Clerk of the Council and the Public Health Inspector for their support and advice. My years here have been very happy ones.

POPULATION

The estimated population, according to the Registrar-General, for mid-1969 is 9,980- an increase of 260 on last year's estimate of 9,720.

STATISTICS

The live birth rate of 19.3 per 1,000 home population is higher than in 1968, which was 18.1, and is again above that of England and Wales as a whole, where the rate is 16.3. This follows the usual trend, as our birth rate is usually higher than that of the country as a whole.

It is very satisfactory to report that there were no deaths of infants under one year of age. The infant mortality rate for England and Wales was 18.0.

The stillbirth rate of 15.0 is slightly higher than that of the country as a whole, where it was 13.0.

There were exactly the same number of deaths in 1969 as in 1968, viz. 92, giving a crude death rate of 9.2 per 1,000 home population, compared with a rate of 11.9 for England and Wales. 25 of the 92 deaths were due to malignant disease, six of these being attributed to malignant disease of the lung and bronchus.

CONCLUSION

As will be observed from the foregoing statistics, the health of the district was satisfactory in 1969, and call for no special comment.

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the health of the district for the year 1969.

As I leave to take up another appointment I should like to take this opportunity to express my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Committee for their ever ready help during the four years I have been the Medical Officer, and also to the Clerk of the Council and the Public Health Inspector for their support and advice. My years here have been very happy ones.

POPULATION

The estimated population, according to the Registrar-General, for mid-1969 is 9,980 - an increase of 280 on last year's estimate of 9,700.

STATISTICS

The live birth rate of 19.5 per 1,000 home population is higher than in 1968, which was 18.1, and is again above that of England and Wales as a whole, where the rate is 16.5. This follows the usual trend, as our birth rate is usually higher than that of the country as a whole.

It is very satisfactory to report that there were no deaths of infants under one year of age. The infant mortality rate for England and Wales was 18.0.

The stillbirth rate of 15.0 is slightly higher than that of the country as a whole, where it was 13.0.

There were exactly the same number of deaths in 1969 as in 1968, viz. 92, giving a crude death rate of 9.2 per 1,000 home population, compared with a rate of 11.3 for England and Wales. 52 of the 92 deaths were due to malignant disease, six of these being attributed to malignant disease of the lung and bronchus.

CONCLUSION

As will be observed from the foregoing statistics, the health of the district was satisfactory in 1969, and will for no special comment.
