

General Provision of Health Service for the Area.

The Hampshire County Council has officers discharging duties in the area, including the Assistant County Medical Officer, Dental Surgeon, Inspector for Food and Drugs and Health Visitors.

LABORATORY FACILITIES.

The Hampshire County Council provides all facilities for the chemical and bacteriological examination of clinical materials (sputum, swabs, etc.), water, milk and foodstuffs.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

A motor ambulance is available at the Isolation Hospital for infectious cases, For non-infectious and accident cases, two motor ambulances are provided and maintained by the Petersfield Ambulance Committee.

NURSING IN THE HOME.

A District Nurse, who also acts as midwife, practices in the area.

CLINICS AND TREATMENT CENTRES, MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE CENTRES.

A Local Committee of voluntary helpers is responsible for this popular centre which does much good work in the district. The Clinic meets on Wednesdays at Ramshill, has a Medical Officer in attendance and is well attended.

ANTE-NATAL CLINIC.

Held on the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays of the month at Ramshill.

ORTHOPÆDIC CLINIC.

Held Fridays at 2 p.m. weekly. Surgeon's day, 1st Friday of the month at 2 p.m. Alternate at Havant, under the County Council.

TUBERCULOSIS DISPENSARY.

Held on the 1st, 3rd and 4th Saturdays of every month at Havant, under the County Council.

VENEREAL DISEASES.

Treatment is available at Portsmouth.

HOSPITALS.

The Isolation Hospital is under the control of the Petersfield Isolation Hospital Committee.

For medical, surgical and maternity cases, the Petersfield Hospital of 32 beds is maintained on a voluntary basis.

SPECIAL HOSPITALS.

The County Council have made arrangements for beds in other Hospitals for the following medical services, viz., Maternity, Orthopædic, Puerperal Fever and Pyrexia, Ophthalmia Neonatorum.

SMALL POX HOSPITAL.

The County Council provides arrangements for removal of cases to a Hospital at Winchester.

SANATORIA.

Sanatoria for tubercular patients are provided by the County Council at Bishopstoke and Chandler's Ford.

INSTITUTIONAL PROVISION

for Unmarried Mothers, Illegitimate Infants and Homeless Children and Mental Defectives.

The County Council is the Local Authority.

MATERNITY AND NURSING HOMES.

There is one situated in the district which is registered with, and inspected by, the County Authority.

INFANT LIFE PROTECTION.

The County Authority arranges for the regular inspection of boarded-out children and necessary returns of new cases.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

No important changes have taken place during the year.

Housing.

Slow progress has been made with the Council's Scheme at Cranford Road. The streets, sewers, and water mains, have been completed to accommodate approximately 210 houses. A first Contract for forty dwellings, was commenced in May and by the end of the year a start had been made on all the dwellings, and eight had been roofed in.

In August, the Ministry of Works Camp at Oaklands Road was occupied by Squatters. Authority was given to the Council to take it over. As the Camp was unsuitable for the housing of families, the Council obtained the consent of the Ministry of Health to provide water, drainage, Elsan closets, and electric lighting and power to each hut.

The huts are of a light type of construction and it is not expected that they will remain suitable for habitation for a long period. Fifteen families are housed at the Camp.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The existing sewage disposal works are capable of dealing with a flow of sewage from a population of 7,000. As the works are now dealing with a population slightly in excess of this figure, a scheme has been prepared for increasing the capacity to deal with a population of 10,000. In view of labour difficulties it has been decided to defer this scheme until a later date.

WATER SUPPLY.

Mr. R. C. S. Walters, a Consultant Water Engineer, of 65, Victoria Street, Westminster, has been asked to prepare a scheme to deal effectively with the extraction of iron and filtration of the water which is obtained from the borehole supplies.

No difficulties have been experienced as to the quality and quantity of the Council's supplies. Forty-nine samples of water were taken during the year, all of which were satisfactory. More than 99% of the inhabited premises in the Urban District together with a large number of premises in the Petersfield Rural District, are given a constant supply of water direct from the Council's undertakings.
