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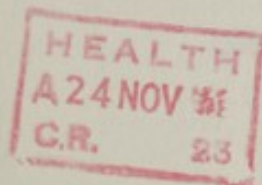

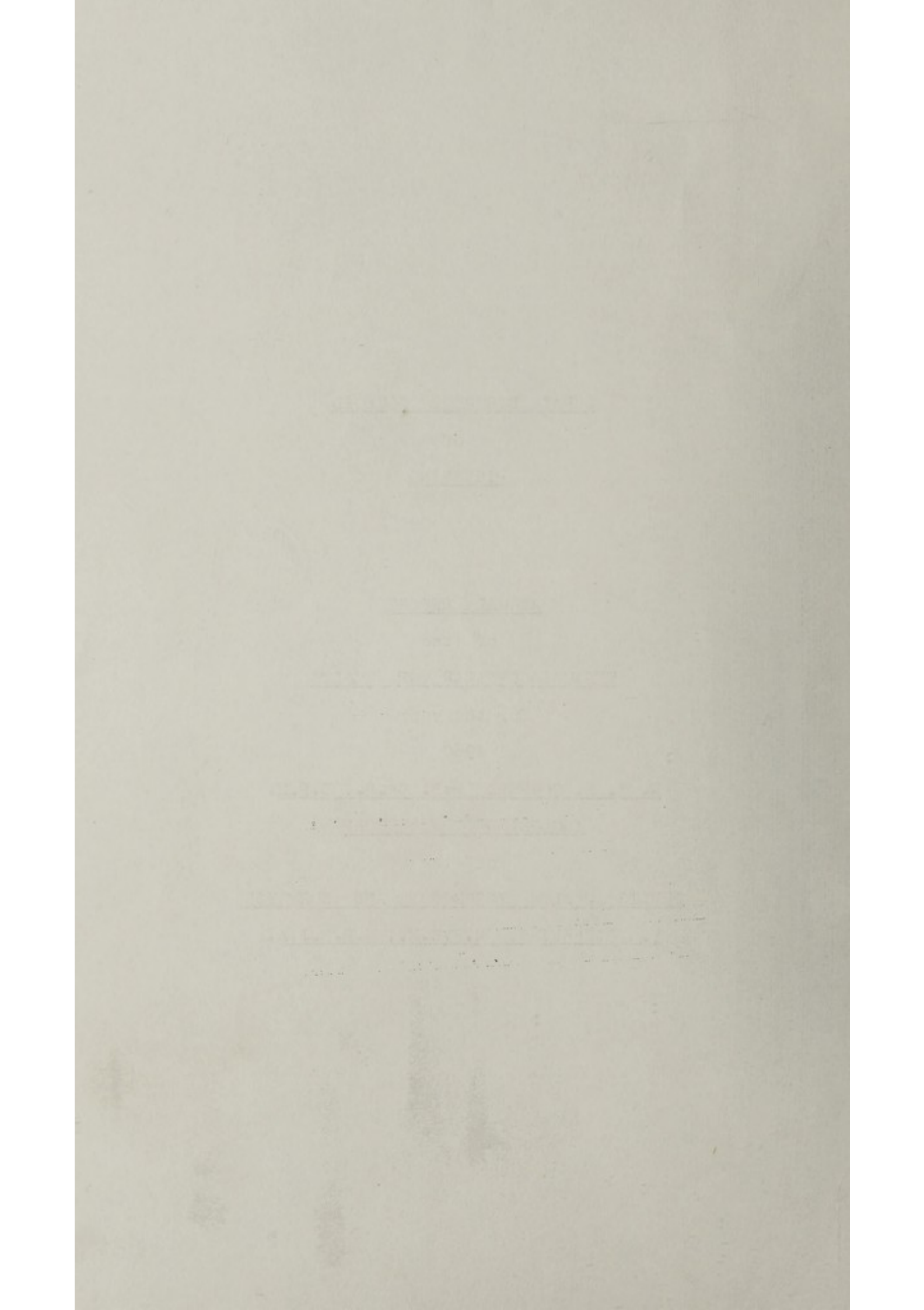

Slaughter of Animals Act, 1933.

Twenty one licences have been issued during the year under Section 3 of the Slaughter of Animals Act, 1933, mostly for the purpose of slaughtering cottagers pigs.

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

A trained Rodent Operator is employed by the Council. His services are available free to householders and, at a small charge to owners or occupiers of business premises.

The following works on water supplies have been carried out within the area.

Cropton, Cawthorne, Extension.

A scheme to lay 5,362 yards of 4" main at an estimated cost of £7,750 was completed during the year. This scheme provided water to the northern parish of Middleton, and Cawthorne, and will subsidise water to Cropton in drought periods.

Kirbymisperton Link Main.

A short length of 3" main has been laid at Kirbymisperton to the boundary of the Parish and to link up with the Urban District Council. This will enable flows of water to be reversed in emergencies.

Low Marishes.

This is the only Parish within the Rural District that is not adequately served with a mains supply. It is hoped this position will be remedied in the near future.

Maintenance.

Taking the water supply from Ryedale Joint Water Board to serve the Parish of Newton has considerably reduced maintenance during the year.

Lockton and Levisham gave considerable trouble during the months of July and August when frequent shortages occurred due to bursts on the system.

A proposed spring to serve Rosedale Abbey has been located. Tests and gaugings have still to be carried out.

Bursts.

Twelve burst mains were repaired throughout the area chiefly by our own labour. Seventeen services and communication pipes required attention.

New Connections.

Thirty three new connections have been made to mains during the year and eighteen more houses have a piped water supply than the previous year.

Meters.

There are 230 meters in operation throughout the area. Nine meters have been repaired. Meters are read twice a year throughout the area, and more frequent visits are paid where the occasion arises.

Salvage

The sale of waste paper during the year under review amounted to £132. 0s. 9d. This is equivalent to a 1d. Rate.

The sale of scrap metals etc. amounted to £21. 0s. 9d.

Your workmen are to be complimented on this very good effort.

Sewerage

There are two Sewerage Schemes in operation in the district situated in Middleton and Thornton Dale and one under construction at Sinnington. These require daily supervision and samples taken by the River Pollution Board have been generally good, showing the work is being carried out correctly.

Sewerage Schemes are needed in various villages throughout the area.

Three water closets have been installed during the year to replace earth closets, with the the assistance of grants under Section 47(4) of the Public Health Act, 1936.

Open Ditches, Sewers, Watercourses.

In many instances sewage from the villages is discharged into a main drain or sewer and from there into open ditches. These are cleaned out by direct labour as far as possible. Nuisances arise on occasions due to lack of proper treatment.

Public Lavatories, Thornton Dale.

These require daily attention including Sunday. They have proved to satisfy a public need, particularly in holiday periods. It will probably produce a further demand in other Parishes.

Licensed Premises.

There are twenty Licensed premises in the area, and improvements have been made in four cases.

HOUSING.

Eleven houses were commenced during the year by private enterprise. The bungalow type of dwelling seems to be more popular than the detached house.

There were no houses built by the Local Authority during the year. Proposals have commenced to erect 16. Here again from applications received the bungalow proves to be popular.

Distribution.

There are 148 Council houses under the control of the Local Authority scattered over 15 Villages. 82 of these houses will be shortly connected to a main sewerage system, the remainder are served by septic tanks.

Considerable work has been carried out during the year on maintenance work by both private and direct labour. I have set out overleaf under various sections a summary of details of upkeep which have been found necessary with a comparison for last year.
