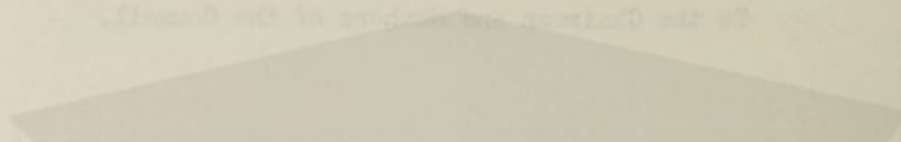

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD SUPPLIES

This particular branch of the work has occupied considerable time during the year, the manufacturer and the retailer of food supplies have become more conscious that good presentation and cleanliness is the best media for increasing sales.

Food presentation, deep freezing, freezing, chilling, canning and preserving, the "seasons" have become to be of little importance in making the public decide what particular food shall be consumed. In view of this the general public are demanding all types of food with increased quality at an economical price.

It is with this in view that the retailer should be more conscious of hygiene than ever before.

There are no dairies in the District, and no milk samples have been taken.

Six samples of ice cream were taken, three of which were unsatisfactory and three satisfactory.

Water Supply General

The Ryedale Joint Water Board is responsible for the supply and distribution of water throughout the Rural District, except of course where private supplies still exist. The private supplies are usually unsatisfactory in their quantity or quality, sometimes in both.

Boiling orders have been issued under the direction of the Medical Officer of Health where any excessive degree of contamination has been found.

Refuse Collection

The Council operates a roadside collection throughout the District. All bins are emptied once a fortnight where on classified roads. Two Vehicles are in operation. Two men Crews are employed to each Vehicle. Bins are put out and replaced by the residents. Intermittent complaints occur relating to getting out and replacing the Bins, particularly from new residents.

Tipping is by crude tipping. No constant labour or supervision takes place on tips. Levelling is carried out periodically by hired bulldozer. Sites of tips are isolated and very little nuisance occurs.

Sewerage

There are now four sewerage schemes in operation in the District serving a total of approximately 675 houses. They are situated as follows:-

These receive daily attention and samples taken by the River Pollution Board, where applicable, ensure that this work is done methodically and satisfactorily.

A sewage Pump which is mobile is now available throughout the area for the work of this nature.

The work to provide a Sewerage Scheme at Newton was completed during the year. It is hoped to follow on with a Scheme in Rosedale in 1965 to serve the Hill Cottages Area.

The Local Authority reviewed the remainder of the Area which is not sewered and considered a Report prepared by the New Consultant Engineer. Priorities were discussed taking into consideration the Rivers (Prevention of Pollution Act, 1961), and general development.

The Consultant Engineer has been engaged to prepare a detailed Scheme to serve parishes of Ebberston, Allerston and Wilton, embracing 285 properties at an Estimated Cost of £144 Gross.

Salvage

The sale from waste paper during the year under review amounted to £38. 0s. 6d.

Rivers (Prevention of Pollution Act, 1961)

Application has been made to the River Board for consent to village drains and sewers to discharge watercourses as required by statute.

Public Lavatories

These are situated in the Parishes of Thornton Dale and Rosedale Abbey, and cater for the visitors to the District.

The one at Rosedale is closed for the winter months.

They are supervised by direct labour.

No charge is made for admission and no serious damage has been committed.

Licensed Premises

There are twenty-one Licensed Premises in the area and improvements have been made in two cases.

Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960

Three sites were licensed during the year.

There are now fourteen sites licensed in the area involving twenty-three caravans.

One site has been withdrawn.

HOUSING

IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

From information provided below it will be seen that considerable benefit has been derived from the favourable attitude the Local Authority adopts towards Improvement Grants.

Up to date three hundred and twenty-nine houses have been brought up to modern standards in this district with financial assistance from the Authority involving grants of £52,812.

At the present time it is entirely obligatory upon the owner to carry out improvements and then only with the tenant's consent. Legislation is pending however, which will involve compulsory powers being given to a Local Authority to enforce improvements.

Improvements can only come to pass however at such a rate as the building industry is geared to cope with, having regard to new development and industrial buildings.

Twenty-six applications for Improvement Grants have been made to the Local Authority.

Thirty-five enquiries have been dealt with and thirty proceeded with.

Twenty-nine grants have been paid involving £7,707.
