> PHYSICAL FRATURES AND CHARACTER AND GENERAL STATISTICS OF THE DISTRICT.

Natural and Social Conditions of the District.

The Pocklington Rural District is situated in the East Riding of Yorkshire, having York to the West and Great Driffield and Deverley to the East. It comprises 31 parishes, the total area of which is 101,521 acres, or 158 square miles. The total population at the census of 1931 was 12,723; estimated at midsummer 1941 13,360. The number of inhabited houses is 3,759 and the number of families or separate occupiers is 3,759 (normally). The assessable value is £44,088 the sum represented by a penny rate being £185. 14. 0.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

The District is almost entirely and the chief occupation agricultural, and the chief occupations are in connection with that industry.

The 31 parishes comprising the District also form the area of the rockling.

The number of deaths from Tuberculosis was 2 and the number notified was 6. The cases of Tuberculosis are usually always notified but if not it is generally where a case is rapidly moved for sanitorium treatment, cases notified in previous years, or where a resident of the District dies outside the District.

In regard to number of deaths from pneumonia and the number notified it would appear that some practitioners are not notifying all the cases which come under their care.

CAUSES OF SICHNESS

Nork.

Medical men in the District can have becteriological examinations made free of charge.

The Council supply diphtheria antitoxin to any practitioners in the District who require it.

During the year 65 bacteriological examinations were made.

Fower

There is no fever hospital in the District, but the County provide an Isolation Hospital for the District at Driffield, which has accommodation for 62 beds.

Ambulance Facilities for infectious cases. A motor ambulance is provided from the Driffield Isolation Hospital by the County Authorities.

SANITARY CIRCUMETANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

Tater Supply.

The whole of the District with the exception of Goodmanham and Market Weighton, Pocklington and Londesborough is supplied by the Regional Scheme from the springs in the chalk wolds. The supply is pure and abundant and is adequately protected from every source of pollution. The excepted villages have their own supplies. Chlorination is still being carried out at the

springs. The weekly consumption of water including that supplied to other Districts is about two and a half million gallons.

Satisfactory results have been obtained on the examination of bacteriological and chamical analyses. The later is not liable to have plumbo-solvent action.

Every village in the District has a mains water supply and the only houses not supplied are isolated farmhouses and cottages and, during the year, the Council considered these and approved schemes for extending the mains to within striking distance of every occupied dwelling. No scheme had been approved by the year end. About 3200 houses are supplied leaving about 559 mostly isolated buildings still dependent on other means. Now formers Every village in the District has a mains water still dependent on other means. Many farmers fotch drinking veter from the nearest mein and use well veter only for washing purposes.

In the more populated villages stand pipes are in use which are common to a block of houses but wherever the size of the house permits the Council encourages the installation of a scullery sink with water laid thereto. But for the ar the installction of hot water with boths and indoor senitation would have gone on apace and many sought authority to proceed with this work during the year.

A salvage of waste scheme was put into operation in the early part of 1940 and curing this year 40 tons of salvage were collected and disposed of for 2274. This is a decrease on previous years partly because certain items were no longer required by the Country. Tins and small scrap tent first and scrap rubber followed and gradually item after item faded out as salvage but became prominent throughout the District as refuse. The result of this was that a refuse collection scheme gradually evolved and towards the year end more bear about the refuse then salvage was being collected and disposed

with the Wholesale Dairies is entered into till the Council is satisfied that conditions of production are satisfactory. A certain relaxation of peace time standards had to be made where structural alterations were involved but in the greater number of cases the necessary improvements were gradually carried out.

Moat.

Central slaughtering has taken the place of the individual slaughterhouses. The slaughtering establishment is not within the Council's area.

Systematic inspections are made from time to time of all butchers' shops, fish shops, bake shops, common loaging houses, milk and meat purveyors, follmongers' premises etc.

A large amount of work has been done in connection with the War but, in spite of this, a large number of improvements have been carried out.

The children in the District are being immunised in accordance with Public Health Regulations.
