The population in the age group 0 - 14 has been estimated to be 3,426. This means that at least 64% of children living in the district are protected against diphtheria.

General Provision of Health Services in the District.

NURSING. A domiciliary nursing and midwifery service is available throughout the District as part of the County Council Scheme, under the National Health Service Act.

District Nurse/Midwives are stationed at Pocklington, Shiptonthorpe, Wilberfoss, Driffild and Harlthorpe near Foggathorpe.

LABORATORY FACILITIES. Bacteriological samples are examined at the Public Health Laboratory situated at Hull.

Routine samples of water are sent to this Laboratory for examination.

AMBULANCE SERVICE. Ambulances based at Pocklington and Market Weighton are available.

TREATMENT CENTRES AND CLINICS. Child Welfare Clinics are held fortnightly at Pocklington and Market Weighton, and monthly at Stamford Bridge, Warton and Melbourne.

An Ophthalmic Clinic is held monthly in Pocklington.

Orthopaedic Clinics are held at York, Drifffield and Beverley.

Tuberculosis Clinics are held at Drifffield, Beverley and York.

Venereal Diseases Clinics are held at York and Hull.

HOSPITALS. General medical and surgical cases are admitted to hospitals at York and Beverley.

Maternity cases go to Westow, Drifffield or Beverley.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948.

It has not been necessary to take any action under Section 47 of this Act during the year.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

Water Supply.

Pocklington, Market Weighton and Goodmanham receive their supplies from private undertakings and the water from these, and the principal Council undertakings is chlorinated.

Work in connection with the Agricultural Extensions which started in the Summer of 1951 continued, but, due to the slow delivery of pipes, a delay was caused and the work was still in progress at the end of the year. By then, however, the majority of the work had been completed and many farmers had taken advantage of the new mains for farm and field connections.

During the year, the laying of two co-ordination mains was proceeded with and at the end of the year all the piping had been laid and chlorination of the mains was taking place. The neighbouring Authorities of Howden and Beverley will benefit from the increased supplies in these mains.

The existing supply to neighbouring Authorities and throughout the area was well maintained during the year. 96 water connections were made and the total of metered supplies is now 900.

One hundred and ninety-two samples of water were submitted for bacteriological examination during the year. The following is a detailed analysis of the reports:-

Public Cleansing.

The collection of house refuse is carried out weekly in two parishes, Market Weighton and Pocklington, and fortnightly throughout the remaining parishes.

With the exception of Market Weighton, where refuse collection is carried out by a Contractor, the district is served by two side-loading vehicles of 7 cubic yards capacity with 2 loaders and a driver loader on each. Three tips are used to dispose of the refuse.

During the first three months of the year, much waste paper was salvaged and sent to the Mills, but the demand stopped abruptly and it became increasingly difficult to get rid of this material. Prices fell and it became an uneconomical procedure to the extent that very little collecting of waste paper was done towards the end of the year. The financial return for the amount disposed of was £376. 17. 7d.

Sewage Disposal.

In the early part of the year, work was commenced on the construction of a new disposal works at Bishop Wilton.

Housing.

During the year under review, the Council made preparations for a speed up in housing and layouts were prepared for the erection of 172 houses in the parishes of Pocklington, Market Weighton and Stamford Bridge. It is hoped that approximately 60 will be erected and occupied before the end of 1953.

Visits of inspection were made to a number of houses occupied by tenants who were applicants for Council Houses. Some houses were found to be in very poor condition and were earmarked for action when the housing situation improves. In other cases, minor repairs were carried out by informal action.

It is probable that the increased rate of house building and the provision of houses in bulk as proposed for 1953, will make great inroads on the Council's housing list and by the end of the next year it may be possible to start rehousing people from areas where the houses are ripe for demolition.

All complaints were investigated and informal action taken in all cases.

No application for Improvement Grants under Section 20 of the Housing Act, 1949 was received.

New Housing.

During the year, 26 permanent houses were completed by the Council and 14 houses completed by Private Enterprise. A further 30 houses were under construction at the end of the year.
